Henry Ford visited Pinckney Saturday to inspect the work that has been done on his dam and noted how well the dam has stood since rebuilding and with the added pressure of the higher, water level.

In conversation with J. C. Dinkel, who has sold some Pinckney property to Mr. Ford, the latter stated that he was very highly pleased with the Pinckne water power and that he was at work designing a special caterpillar dredge to deepen the creek east of the mill two feet and straighten it through his property to the Dexter road, nearly a half-mile.

Mr. Ford stated that the machine would be ready to start work as soon as warmer weather made conditions, favorable and that the work would be rushed through. He was informed by Mr. Dinkle that one or two options had as yet not been taken up on account of the abstracts of title not being ready. Mr. Ford had not been aware of these conditions, but supposed the matter had been arranged.

So that now it seems that all that can prevent work on the Ford project going ahead early this spring is the deeding over of a small piece of the land already covered by options. Surely nobody in Pinckney wishes any further delay so, no doubt, this small matter will be straightened out at once.

### ORDERED DISCHARGED

John Bezzek and Joe Pusta who ve about 1 1-2 miles west of town appeared for trial before Judge Colins in the circuit court Monday and pleaded not guilty to the charge of violating the state prohibition law. They were arrested at their home some time ago and a still and quantity

of liquor was taken with them. Their attorney L. E. Howlett, point-

ed out to Judge Collins that the warrant issued was faulty as it was issued without sufficient evidence. Judge Collins, after a delay investigating this new legal angle, decided that the point was well taken, ordered the prisoners discharged, and according to those who were there, orederd that the alleged booze and paraphernalia for its manufacture should be returned to the accused.

Trifon Pian, who lives about a mile north of Pinckney was next arranged and he too was released for insufficient evidence.

Pian claims that an old broken still or rather, parts of one, a hog feed cooker and a quart of whiskey hought in Detroit, belonging to someone else was all the evidence against him. He alleges spite was the cause of his arrest, and that his premises had been searched before.

### MAIN FLEET OFF NEW YORK

Prohibition Officials Plan to Centralize Activities There, With Squadron

On Florida Coast.


Washington - The prohibition 'navy" will be ready for operation in Atlantic coastal waters in search of liquor smugglers some time this month, it was declared March 5 at enforcement headquarters.

Arrangements have been completed, officials said, whereby the prohibition bureau is to have the use of submarine chasers not now being used by the coast guard. Nine of these little craft, former navy terriers, are said to be immediately available for transfer to dry law commanders.

Prohibition Commissioner Haynes declared it would take about two weeks to man and equip the sub chasers for duty as a prohibition sea patrol, but declined to divulge his plans for meeting in their own element the swarms of rum runners said to infest the Atlantic coast lest valuable information reach the ears of wily liquor skippers.

It was learned, however, that prohibition authorities contemplate a screen of swift ships operating from Maine to Florida and in the Gulf of Mexico to prevent the landing of illicit alcohol. Sub chasers to form the prohibition fleet, officials said, are being lent by the coast guard, as it is unable to commission them for this service because of lack of funds and reports from southwest. trained personnel.





New York office of the United States secret service was to order the arrest of two Italians, Vincenzo Lupo and Guiseppe Morello, on charges of manufacturing and passing counterfeit money. But the Sicilians, anticipating such a move, had taken care that their trails were well covered, and at the trial they produced a flock of witpesses who swore to alibis which effectually prevented a conviction.

As Morello and his companion passed out of the courtroom, after the case against them had been dismissed, Lupo remarked in a volce loud enough for Flynn to overhear: "Those pigs of American detectives haven't the brains to get the evidence they need. They'll never land us."

### SERVED AS FIRST ASSISTANT

Is First Medical Man in Cabinet; Department Now Has Two Vacant Posts to Be Filled.

Washington-Dr. Hubert Work, first assistant postmaster general, was nominated by President Harding and confirmed by the senate last week to be postmaster general.

Dr. Work, whose home is Pueblo, Colo. took over the postoffice portfolio March 4, when the resignation of Mr. Hays became effective.

Final announcement of the designation of Dr. Work came as no surprise, his name having been connected with the office since the prospective retirement of Mr. Hays was announced several weeks ago.

Two Vacancies in Department.

The elevation of the Coloradoan to the postmaster generalship leaves the position of first and second assistant postmaster general to be filled, E. H. Shaughnessy, who was second assistant postmaster general, having lost his life in the knickerbocker theater disaster.

The new postmaster general is 61 years old and was born in Marian

Pennsylvania and began the practice of medicine in Greely, Colo. When appointed first assistant postmaster general he was Republican national committeeman for Colorado.



If a person contracts a cold, i should never be regarded contemptu ously. The individual who is really "not quite well" will conserve time and health by complete relaxation and rest. In fact, a thorough rest indulged in early enough may prevent pneumonia. Even if pneumonia does develop, the rest will have helped to conserve the body's resistance, every ounce of which will be needed before the patient recovers.

Finally: dress to suit the thermometer, and not the calendar; eat heartily and wisely; sleep with the windows open, ventilate the house several times daily.

## EIGHTEEN-FOOT BRIDGES ON FEDERAL AID ROADS

Few highway bridges with a width of roadway less than 18 feet are now being constructed on improved roads. according to engineers of the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture.
