STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Allegan—Elmer Hayes is held in the county jail in default of \$500 bail to appear for examination on a charge of wife desertion. He was arrested at the home of his father, near Bellaire, by Sheriff Ben Lugten.

Bay City—Andrew Lapinski, 77 years old, dropped dead while attending mass at St. Stanislaus church here Thanksgiving day. Coroner I. M. Simon said that heart disease was the cause of the death. Lapinski leaves his widow and four sons.

Kalamazoo—J. M. Bigelow, 69 years old, well known farmer residing near Bangor, was brought to a hospital here suffering from a fractured skull, broken nose and jaw, as a result of being kicked by a horse. It is feared his injuries will prove fatal.

Rockford—A proposal to bond \$21,000 for installation of a new water works system here lost by two-thirds of a vote. There were 445 votes cast out of a possible 650 or 700 the proposal polled 295 of the 445 but needed 296 2/3 to make the necessary two-thirds vote to carry it.

Marquette—For the first time since the State undertook the enlargement of the Marquette Branch Prison, the institution is housing more convicts than it has cells for. A recent count showed a population of 752. More than 30 men are sleeping on cots placed in cell block corridors.

Cassopolis—A reward of \$1,500 is being offered here for the capture and conviction of the five armed bandits who escaped last week, after unsuccessfully trying to crack the safe in the First National bank here. Of that amount \$1,000 is offered by the bank and the remainder by Sheriff Earl Sill, of Cass county.

Vassar—Mr. and Mrs. Chap S. Cottrell, Tuscola township, celebrated their golden wedding recently at the home of their oldest daughter, Mrs. Norman Blaylock, of Tuscola township. They were married on Cottrell's birthday and he was 76 years old. Mr. and Mrs. Cottrell have lived on the same farm 42 years.

Albion—County School Commissioner Deland Davis, who is also county agent for corrections and charities, will give a talk on "Juvenile Delinquency," before the Albion Boosters and Knockers. Harry D. Morse will be the chairman. The program has been arranged by Superintendent of Schools Don Harrington.

Grand Rapids—James M. Travis, 82 years old, one of the few survivors possessing personal and intimate memories of Abraham Lincoln, died at Reeds Lake Sanitarium recently, after a residence of Grand Rapids of 55 years. As a boy, Travis frequently saw Lincoln as a guest in the home of his father, John W. Travis, in Paris, Ill., and delighted in telling anecdotes of the great man.

Monroe—It is expected that the viaduct over the Pere Marquette tracks north of here, used in connection with road M-10, better known as the new Dixie highway, will be finished by the end of the week, the bridge across the River Raisin and race adjoining being near completion. Traffic between Toledo, Monroe, Dearborn and Detroit probably will be opened at the end of next week.

Grand Rapids—Little hope is held for the recovery of Mrs. Edna Keen, 23 years old, wife of Cecil Keen, who is said to have taken poison following an argument with her husband about a dog. She is being treated at the Butterworth Hospital. According to the police, Keen disposed of the dog Thursday afternoon. During the evening his wife sent him on an errand to a nearby store. She swallowed the poison during his absence he said.

Ionia—Taxpayers again will have the opportunity to swell the coffers with winter tax money about December 10. Mrs. Bessie M. Gallawa, county treasurer, has added the amounts of taxes to be collected and notified the township treasurer of the collections to be made. The total taxes to be collected this year for all funds is \$316,078.20, or \$102,357.44 below 1924-25. The total for all sources last year was \$418,435.64 and in 1923 23, was \$446,970.07.

Marshall—Albert M. Smith, Jr., of Kalamazoo, was successful in the civil service examination held in the third congressional district for appointment of United States military academy at West Point, and Ronald D. Salmon, of Pittsford, for appointment to the United States naval academy at Annapolis, according to an announcement made by United States Representative Joseph L. Hooper. The alternates to West Point are Mills H. Sampey, of Osseo, first, and William G. Foard, Jr., of Kalamazoo, second.

Grand Rapids—Miss Betty Quinlan, 16 years old, daughter of Senator James C. Quinlan, was injured severely and two other young persons were hurt when an automobile in which they were riding slid from the road near Ada and rolled over. Miss Quinlan was taken to Blodgett Memorial hospital and recovered consciousness two hours later. Charles McDermott, 17 years old, junior college football player, driver of the car, suffered a fracture of the leg and Miss Dorothy Brechtling, 15 years old, suffered from the shock.

Battle Creek—The school board has decided to put to the voters on Dec. 7 the question of whether \$450,000 in bonds shall be issued for a new junior high school building here.

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Port Huron—Charles L. Stecher, 48 years old, a veteran Grand Trunk car inspector, died in an I. O. O. F. lodge meeting last week. Heart trouble brought on by climbing two flights of stairs was responsible.

Jackson—Value of farm lands and buildings in Jackson county shows a decline of more than \$6,000,000 during the five year period between 1920 and 1925, according to a report of the department of commerce of the government, following the census of the farms of the county.

Mt. Clemens—It is announced by members of the Halfway Commission that Detroit water mains will be laid into the village by December. With extension of Mt. Clemens gas mains to the village, it is said Halfway will have the same modern conveniences as the other parts of the metropolitan area.

Ionia—Thanksgiving will be a day of rest and recreation for the inmates of the Michigan reformatory, who number more than 1,600. A special dinner will be provided and a movie program will be given in the auditorium during the day. Rev. J. H. Green, pastor of the Ionia Presbyterian church, will deliver the Thanksgiving sermon.

Grand Rapids—Responding to widespread protest against continuance of Eastern standard time in Grand Rapids throughout the winter months, the city commission this week probably will reconsider its former action and vote on a resolution which would return the municipality to Central standard time next Saturday night at midnight.

Saginaw—Patrick Kain, 74 years old, chief of police here for many years prior to his retirement in 1919 and one of the veteran officers of the country, is dead after an illness of more than a year. Chief Kain started his career in the lumber days when the patrol wagon was a wheelbarrow and lumberjacks were hauled through the street in that manner.

Lansing—Pears that Lansing will fall in its efforts to obtain accommodations for the 2,400 delegates to the Older Boys' conference here the latter part of the week was expressed by the committee in charge. About 500 boys are yet to be accommodated. A house to house canvass is to be started if sufficient rooms have not been promised before that time.

Jackson—Patrons of music in Jackson will have the opportunity of hearing Cecilia Hansen, the Russian violinist, who comes here under the auspices of the Jackson Civic Music association, the evening of December 3. Miss Hansen has been playing in the United States for the last two seasons and has won ovations in New York, Chicago, Syracuse and many other music centers.

Lansing—Sale of the Y. M. C. A. property at 210 South Capitol avenue to the First Presbyterian church is being considered by the association as the result of an offer submitted by a church committee recently. The church offers \$60,000 for the property. The church made the offer after a meeting of its congregation. The building would be used to house the Sunday school, Boy Scouts and other organizations.

Ironwood—A searching party is combing the woods in the vicinity of Lake Gogebic in search of Bert and William Jacsin, of Ironwood, brothers, who have been lost since Sunday. They were hunting deer in the vicinity of the lake. The temperature dropped to almost zero last night and it is feared they suffered from exposure to the cold. Neither of the boys is an experienced hunter. They are 18 and 20 years old.

Muskegon—The two-masted schooner, Our Son, Capt. F. Nelson commanding, has arrived here after a battle with a storm on Lake Michigan, while two other ships bringing pulp wood for the Central Paper Co., of Muskegon, are still battling their way down the lake. The two ships still out are the Mueller and Zillah, both steamers. They are enroute from Duluth. The arrival of the ships here will close navigation between the northern points and Muskegon.

Menominee—The mystery of the disappearance of Eleanor Anderson, of Gwinna, Mich., and Lina Mollainen of White Pine, Mich., was solved when the girls reported that they had been involuntary passengers on an Ann Arbor car ferry over the week end. The girls boarded the car ferry here to sell magazine subscriptions and failed to go ashore before the boat left. They made the trip across the lake to Frankfort and back while Menominee police searched for them.

Lansing—Details of plans suggested to induce new factories to locate here were discussed at a joint meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lansing Real Estate board. The real estate board here had been active for some weeks in an endeavor to obtain new factories for the city so that Lansing's industries may be diversified. The chamber of commerce also has investigated a number of factory propositions, but so far no new plants have been obtained by either organization.

Preparation of Young Men to Be the Heads of the Homes of the People

YOUR Christian associations represent a practical effort to organize and augment in every field the lay forces and to translate the truths of religion into the life of the people.

It is increasingly true that the hope of the future lies in the youth of the present. Probably no other lay force asserts so large an influence upon the young people as that which you represent. It stands as a direct challenge to materialism. It is a constant assertion that there is something more than the things that are seen. It seeks to overcome the tendency of an age of profusion which is so likely to develop into a condition of luxury and pleasure, selfishness and ease, destructive of the vitality and character of society.

It is an effort to secure that development which only comes through action, and to strengthen the physical, intellectual and moral life by an ever active campaign against disease, ignorance, poverty and other evils. It seeks to create better understanding, to reveal young men to themselves, to show them their great powers, to direct them into unselfish ways, to give them more self-control and broaden the whole scope of their lives. It is a most practical effort in the training of citizenship.

One of the important results of all these activities is the preparation of young men to be the future heads of the homes of the people. There are too many indications that the functions of parenthood are breaking down. Too many people are neglecting the real well-being of their children, shifting the responsibility for their actions and turning over supervision of their discipline and conduct to the juvenile courts. It is stated on high authority that a very large proportion of the outcasts and criminals come from the ranks of those who lost the advantages of normal parental control in their youth. They are the refugees from broken homes who were denied the necessary benefits of parental love and direction.

The home is the cornerstone of the nation, and any effective better-homes movement must begin with the training of the youth for those responsibilities, or we shall see the disposition to attempt in some way to turn over to the government the responsibilities for the rearing of children constantly increased. What the youth of the country need is not more public control through government action, but more home control through parental action. These associations are an effort in that direction.

Whether Less Surgery or More Surgery, We Shall Have Better Surgery

In spite of notorious prognostications to the contrary, progress in surgery has been made. Erichsen, an English surgeon of Danish birth, in 1855 voiced the feeling of many of his day when he said that the practice of surgery then reached its climax and that no further advances in the art would be possible.

The science of surgery has been a late development. It was ushered in by the advent of anesthesia and antiseptics, and is now being brought to its highest degree by associated studies in other branches of medicine. The ebb and flow of the surgical tide has caused us to take up the old if it were genuine and to discard the new if it were spurious.

Unnecessary operations constitute the peculiar office of those surgeons who fail to understand that the highest aim of surgery may be the avoidance of operations. Whether we shall see less surgery or more surgery, I believe we shall have better surgery, as we progress toward the lofty ideals now being erected in the name of standardized hospitals.

New Ireland With Which Americans Are Unfamiliar Is Being Created

During the last two years Ireland has almost disappeared below the news horizon. This is due in part to the fact that radicalism among the Irish people has been superseded by conservatism. Political agitation has almost ceased. Nothing sensational has occurred in Ireland during the last two years. No social upheaval is threatened. Nevertheless a new Ireland with which Americans are unfamiliar is being created. The last two years probably have been more important to Ireland than any other period of equal duration, for the reason that these two years have witnessed changes of great and lasting consequence. Nothing in modern history is more striking than the quick transition under the new Irish government from the lawlessness and guerrilla warfare which prevailed in Ireland before and just after the establishment of the Free State to the astonishing condition of orderly peace which now exists. This of itself is a great triumph. It could not have occurred if Irishmen generally had not become weary of violence and agitation.

Beauty of Budapest Is City Beauty—the Perfect Grouping of Buildings

Naples approached by sea is glorious. So is Lisbon. So is poor battered Dublin. So are a dozen other cities. But for the most part they owe their beauty chiefly to their surroundings. The Bay of Naples would be splendid if there had never been a house built on the shore of it. So would the Tagus scenery if there had been no city of Lisbon. But the beauty of Budapest is city beauty, depending very little on the rolling hills westward, not at all on the flat land to the east. I think that what makes it so beautiful is the wonderful grouping of the buildings on both sides of the river. Nobody planned it. Nobody, I think, ever does plan the successful grouping of buildings. When it occurs it is the result of accident or some instinct. It exists elsewhere, of course. You see it in England, in Somerset, for instance, where church, manor house, great barn and village street are exquisitely grouped. But I have never seen more perfect grouping than in Budapest.

Quebec, Last Refuge and Asylum of the Liberties of the People

Quebec is the last refuge and asylum of the ancient liberties of the people of this continent. It is bounded on the south by the benighted states, on the east by a late spring, on the west by the faddist regime, and on the north by the bowels of the earth.

The people of Quebec are chiefly engaged in minding their own business, an attitude which arouses the resentment and occasionally the wrath of the rest of the continent. It makes them so very conspicuous. The individual in Quebec is known as the habitant, a simple creature who bath an abiding and childlike faith in God, and for this reason is regarded by the rest of the hemisphere as practically helpless.

Novel Nest

At the last meeting of the British Ornithologists' club, Mr. A. L. Butler exhibited a "nest" from Trinidad, which was merely a hollow formed by the rotting out of the soft pith at the top of a broken-off sapling. The breadth of the top of the stump was only just sufficient to contain the single egg, and the egg, on the cup-and-ball principle, fitted the cavity so neatly that it could not be lifted out with the fingers. The bird incubates in a perfectly erect position with its head and neck stretched stiffly upwards, and its tail pressed to the side of the stump, of which its upright figure seems to form a part. The species have adopted the habit of sitting bolt upright on similar stumps whether incubating or not.

HELPFUL HINTS

Clean the bathtub and sink with a cloth dampened with kerosene. It will take off all streaks and greasy spots like magic.

Lubricate the egg beater, meat cutter and such utensils as are used around food with a drop of glycerin; it will not leave any taste if a drop leaks down into the food.

To slightly stiffen dainty white things such as baby's dresses add a tablespoonful of sugar to the rinsing water; this will give them a new look after ironing.

To clean the grater after using it for various things, use a stiff-bristle brush—the kind which costs five cents. It will save time and the hands.

Rub the grater over a cake that has been scorched, hold it so that the crumbs fall off the cake. If carefully done all of the scorched cake can be removed.

Butter the inside of a strip pitcher or creamer which has a habit of leaking its contents at the spout.

Any wooden chest of soft wood which is perfectly air tight, if well oiled once a year with oil of cedar is just as effective against moths as the best cedar chest.

To clean a rusty knife thrust it into an onion and leave it for a short while.

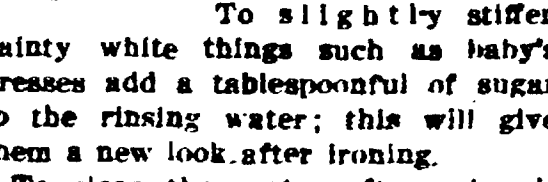
Save all bits of paraffin left from jelly glasses. It can be well washed and used again. Bits of it used in a cloth make the iron work better when using the old-fashioned iron. Small bits as large as a pea added to boiling starch make it work better when ironing, as it never sticks. A piece used when wiping a warm stove will keep it shiny and clean looking, it will also prevent rusting.

Keep a piece of sandpaper, one that comes on match boxes is good. Use it to keep the meat grinder from slipping when screwed onto a smooth surface, like a zinc-covered table. It is good to scour off scorched food if not too badly burned. In such a case add cold water and a teaspoonful of soda to the scorched pan, set on the back of the stove and simmer for an hour or two. This will usually loosen any burned portions. If that will not do, add a pinch of lye, but do not let it stand too long or it will ruin the dish, if it is aluminum.

Before leaving a stove for any length of time in a house it should be thoroughly oiled or greased.

Clean a velvet hat or coat collar with corn meal well saturated with gasoline. Rub it in well, using two dishes of it to insure against streaking, then brush well with a stiff brush. For delicate cloth or gloves, use flour instead of corn meal.

Buffalo bugs and moths do not enjoy turpentine. Put a small piece of cotton saturated in turpentine into boxes, trunks or drawers where such pests are found.

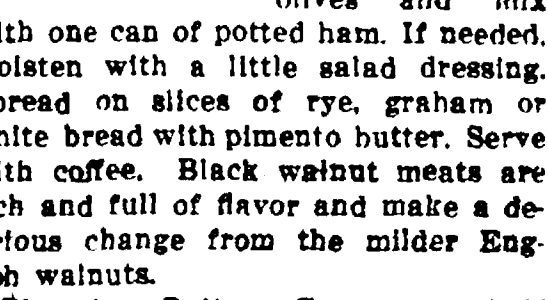
Autumn Sandwiches.—Chop fine walnut or butternut meats, add an equal measure of finely chopped olives and mix with one can of potted ham. If needed, moisten with a little salad dressing. Spread on slices of rye, graham or white bread with pimento butter. Serve with coffee. Black walnut meats are rich and full of flavor and make a delicious change from the milder English walnuts.

Pimento Butter.—Cream one-half cupful of butter. Drain and dry well three red peppers from a can, put through sieve and gradually work the pulp into the butter; season with salt.

Spanish Onion Sandwiches.—Cut white bread very thin and trim off the crusts. Chop fine one Spanish or Bermuda onion. Mix well with mayonnaise to the consistency to spread. Use as a filling for sandwich bread that has been spread with pimento butter.

Waldorf Sandwiches.—Mix with one cupful of finely chopped celery, add one cupful of finely chopped Jonathan apples, then add one cupful of finely sliced, blanched almonds. Mix all together and add enough mayonnaise to moisten. Spread on thinly sliced nut bread that has been spread with mayonnaise. Spread the mixture on one slice, cover with a heart leaf of lettuce and put together in pairs. Serve cut into triangles. Serve with coffee.

Toasted Jam Sandwiches.—Cut white or raisin bread into thin slices, trim off the crusts and spread half the slices with raspberry jam. Spread the other half with creamed butter, put together in pairs, cut into narrow strips, arrange in a wire broiler and toast a delicate brown. Serve with hot cocoa. When roasting meat add a tablespoonful of sugar to the basting liquor; it adds flavor as well as color to the roast and gravy.

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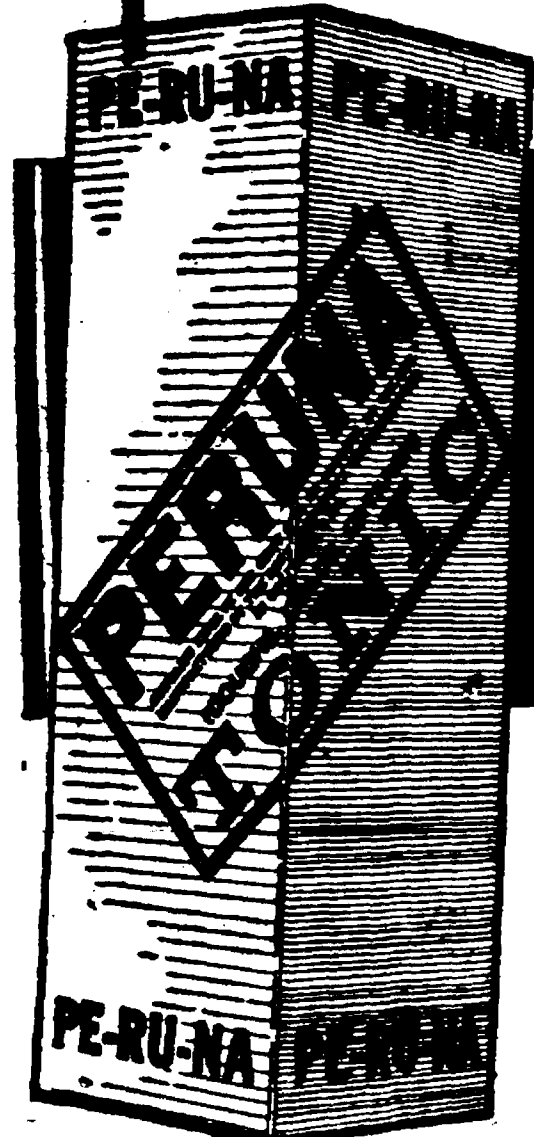

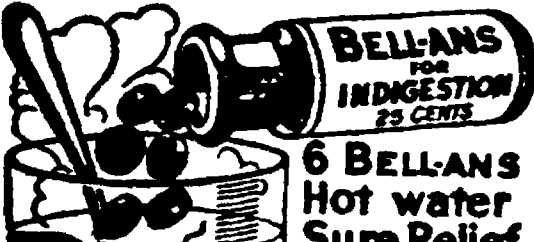

POULTRY

SELECT BREEDERS FOR NEXT SPRING

Now is the time to select the breeding stock for use next spring. This matter is often neglected until it is too late, and when the mating is made, mistakes are liable to be made. In the poultry business, success or failure starts in the breeding pen. If you select your birds for your breeding pen, you will have better stock next year. If they are mated with no selection, you cannot and will not make progress in the poultry business. The object of the breeding pen is to get good, healthy chicks, in the opinion of D. H. Hall, extension poultry husbandman at Clemson college.

In picking the males to breed from, remember that the male is one-half the flock. The male should be of the best type, and have vigor and strength. He should also stand up well on his legs, and possess the characteristics of his breed. For instance, your bird may be a Rhode Island Red in color, but may have a Wyandotte shape, and would not make a good breeder, because this Wyandotte shape would be undesirable in Reds.

Do not purchase a fine male and expect him to do all in the flock. Select the very best females to mate with him. In the poultry world at least, the females are as important as the males. A good female breeder should possess a well-proportioned body, and should be deep, broad and long. She should never have the appearance of an undeveloped male, but should always look feminine. The best type shows constitutional vigor and characteristics of the breed.

In selecting the breeders, the breed characteristics should be strong in both males and females. You will never be able to obtain a perfect breeder. Every fowl will have some defects and we must make up for these defects by selecting fowls that are strong where the other one is weak.

Do not expect all the chicks to be up to the standard. According to the laws of breeding, at least one-fourth will be of inferior grade and should be culled out.

Body Type in Fowls Is Quite Desirable Point

A bird of good body type must be deep and broad and show great length. She should be well developed in the breast and abdomen. Great length of back and keel is especially desirable. The bird should not be too loose feathered. This is generally shown by loose thigh feathers such as are shown by the Cochins. The under line should be fairly straight and long. The back should be long and horizontal (level). This, of course, varies with the breed. The Rhode Island Reds have the most level back, while the Leghorns have the most erect. The most desirable top line is the one which is the most horizontal.

The carriage of the bird should show a maximum amount of activity. The legs are generally placed behind the central portion of the body and are straight and wide apart.

A poor-producing hen, generally stands erect. There are several outstanding types. These birds may be very shallow and cut away at the breast and abdomen. In the case of beefy individuals, the abdomen appears to be mainly made up of hard fat. Another type is commonly known as "bagging down." This is generally due to a short keel. Most birds with a deformed back are generally poor producers.—University of Illinois.

Good Winter Production Obtained by Right Feed

Too many poultrymen rely almost wholly on grain feeds during the winter. Green food, beef scraps, milk by-products and mineral matter are too often omitted altogether, or fed too infrequently and sparingly. Oyster shell, prepared grit and charcoal, ready for the fowls at all times, provide mineral matter. Cabbage, beets, mangles and sprouted oats make excellent green foods; hung an inch higher than the head compels needed winter exercise. Any fresh vegetables, even raw potatoes, are a whole lot better than nothing of the kind at all.

For animal food, beef scraps serve the purpose splendidly. Milk by-products, when low priced, are used with excellent results and probably with greater returns, comparatively, than when fed to farm animals.

The more the birds eat, the more they lay, if the rations are properly compounded and fed skillfully.

Good winter production means unquestioned success. Now is the time to house comfortably and feed skillfully.—A. C. Smith, Chief of Poultry Division, University Farm.

Green Feed Essential

Notice how nice the yolks of the eggs you are using appear. Did you obtain eggs with nice rich, strong orange-color yolks last winter? If so, there were plenty of green foods furnished the hens; if the yolks were the watery, pale kind, it is certain that your hens failed to have green material. During the summer months plow up some of the yards about the sheds and plant rye and oats. The rye will always be accessible when the snow is off the ground.

TREATMENT OF CONSUMPTION

THE treatment of tuberculosis in special tuberculosis hospitals is a comparatively recent idea. The entire sanitarium movement in this country has developed in the last forty years. Prior to that time consumptives were generally treated and cared for in their own homes, the long-drawn-out character of the disease being such that few patients reached the hospital except in the last stages of the disease.

Two evils resulted from the presence of consumptives in private homes: the patients themselves did not receive the treatment they needed, and all the other members of the family were exposed to infection.

The death rate for consumption in those days was very high. In 1890, according to Dr. Arthur T. Laird, superintendent of the Napeming (Minn.) State sanitarium, the death rate for the United States from tuberculosis was 228 per 100,000. From 1881 to 1890, the death rate in Massachusetts was 364 per 100,000. Even this was a marked decrease from the death rate in the same state in 1880, which was 410 per 100,000. This awful death rate has gradually been reduced, until the tuberculosis death rate for the entire country in 1920 was only 114.

How much the sanitarium treatment has had to do with this reduction is a question.

Open-air treatment of consumption was first used by Dr. George Bendington of England in 1839. The first sanitarium was established in Germany in 1859. The first tuberculosis sanitarium in this country was founded by Dr. E. L. Trudeau at Saranac Lake in the Adirondacks in 1884, where Doctor Trudeau, himself a consumptive used the treatment by which he had cured himself.

Special hospitals for consumptives are now found everywhere. The methods used are largely the same. They include rest, good food, fresh air and sunshine and outdoor life with such special treatment as the individual patient needs.

Not only is the consumptive patient much better off in a special sanitarium where he can have such care as he needs, but he has also a far better chance to recover, and he is in no danger to his family and friends.

But the most valuable feature of the sanitarium treatment is that the patient learns from experts who have given their lives to the study of this disease how to take such care of himself as to guard against relapses and to protect himself and other members of his family against fresh infection.

So the present-day tuberculosis sanitarium is really a college in which one learns how to fight this disease.

HOW OLD ARE FLAPPERS?

THE flapper is not a recent product. She has existed for hundreds of years. In an old book written in 1100 and recently republished by the Oxford University Press, the author has this to say about the flappers of 800 years ago.

"Alas, how miserably maidenly modesty has fallen off. In the behavior of young girls of today nothing can be noted but unseemly mirth, wherein are no sounds but of jest, with winking eyes and babbling tongues and wanton gait and most ridiculous manners. The quality of their garments is so unlike that frugality and decency of the past that in the widening of their sleeves, the tightening of their bodices, nay, in their whole persons, we may see how shame is cast aside."

This is what 1050 thought of 1100, just what 1875 thinks of 1925. Every generation thinks that the next generation is going straight to perdition. Yet the poor old human race keeps grinding along and somehow gets a little better every year, even if skirts do get a little longer or shorter or sleeves get looser or tighter.

The Camp Fire Girls of America, made up of 600,000 American girls, have asked Coleen Moore, the well-known moving picture star, to lead a movement to wipe out the term "flapper" and to call our young girls "moderns" instead. As Miss Moore is known in screen circles as "the perfect flapper," she is probably better fitted than any one else to lead such a movement.

But whether you call the young girl of today a flapper or a modern is merely a matter of name. When it comes to real accomplishments she is far ahead of any previous generation. She swims, she rides, she plays golf and tennis. 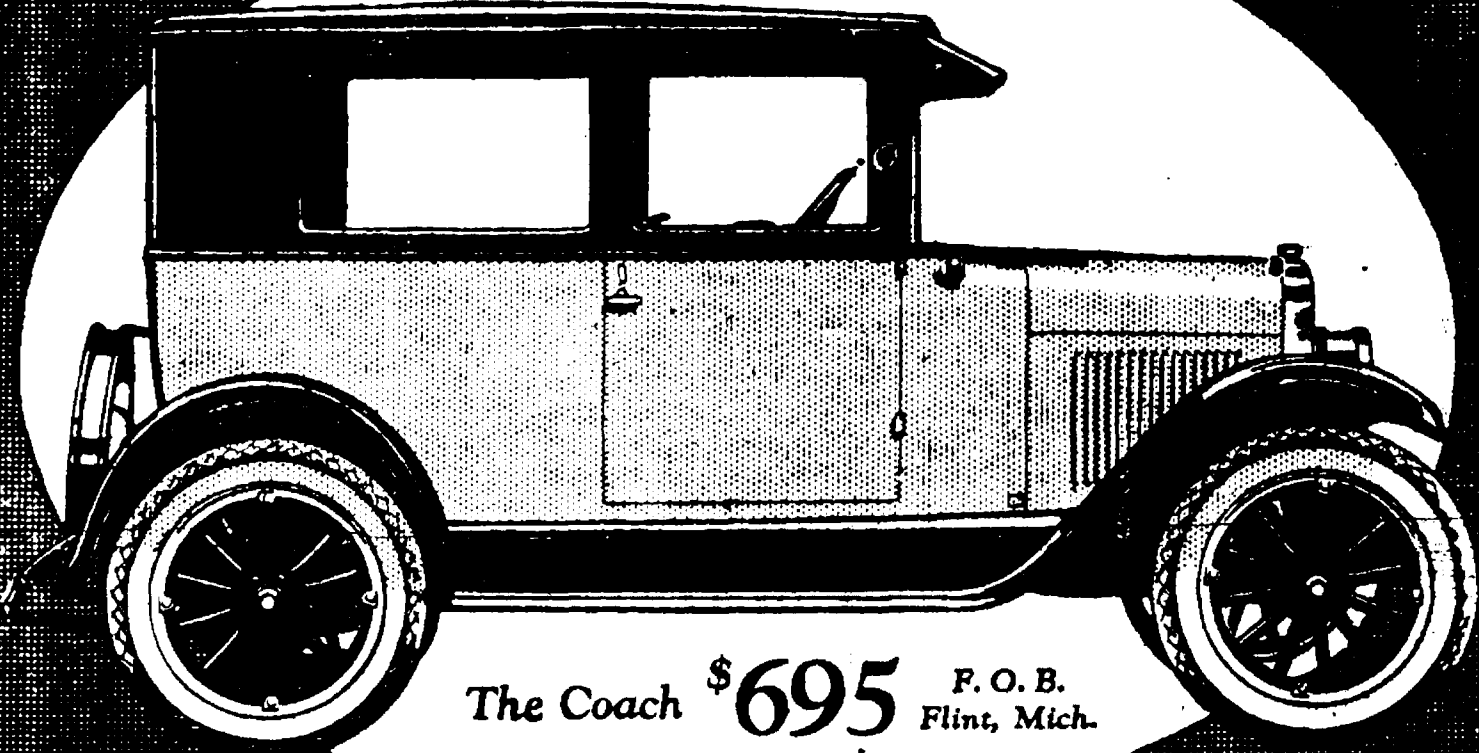

Tides in Inland Seas

There are tides in both the Mediterranean sea and the Gulf of Mexico. In the Mediterranean they are so slight as to be almost imperceptible; in the Gulf of Mexico they run from two and a half to four feet. A delta is an alluvial plain formed by a deposit of sand and mud carried down a river. As the stream enters quieter waters the deposit falls to the bottom and increases in area and height until it reaches the surface and is raised by floods and tides above the high-water mark. The delta of the Ganges and the Brahmaputra has an area of 50,000 square miles and that of the Nile is 200 miles wide and 100 miles long. The Mississippi delta, which encroaches at a rate of 260 feet a year, has an area of 12,300 square miles. Great deltas are only found in comparatively tideless seas, because the deposits would not otherwise have a chance of accumulating.

At one time or another all cereals, such as wheat, rice, and maize, were wild grasses, and many years of patient research have been necessary to develop their edible utility. There must be numerous grains of potential value, growing throughout the world, but until the discovery of a day no addition had been made to our existing supplies for centuries.

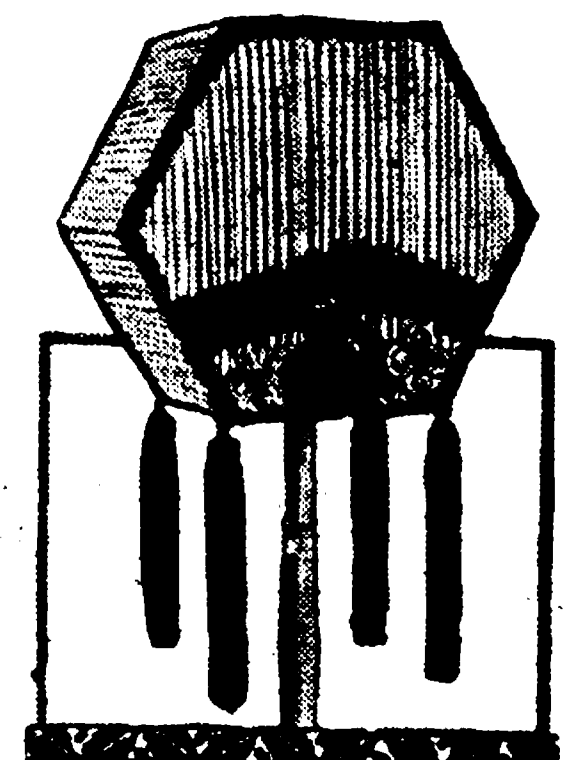
