## BUILDING AND LOAN COMPANIES REPORT

Ann Arbor Firms Increase Assets by \$320,453.54 During Past Year.

Ann Arbor is one of the healthiest building and loan cities in Michigan the report made by the Huron Valley and Ann Arbor associations to Michigan Building and loan league shows. Despite the general business recession, the organizations made dividend payments and increased their assets by \$320,453.54 during the fiscal year, which closed June 30.

The Huron Valley passed the \$3,000,000 mark during the year by experiencing a gain of \$286,123.56.

This increase was the third largest reported in the state and the associations which exceeded it are far larger. The Ann Arbor boosted its total \$34,329.98 during the 12 month period to a new peak of \$385,000.

Figures from 48 of the state's 67 associations show that 30 enjoyed gains and 18 dropped during the year. Inasmuch as all paid dividends just prior to the time the report was submitted, inclusion of the amount of the dividends would permit nearly every association to show an increase for the year. The total of the dividends paid throughout the state ran in excess of \$4,000,000.

Virtually all the gains made during the year came in the last four months it was recently pointed out by Paul F. Kreger, state supervisor indicating a definite renewal of interest in this type of savings.

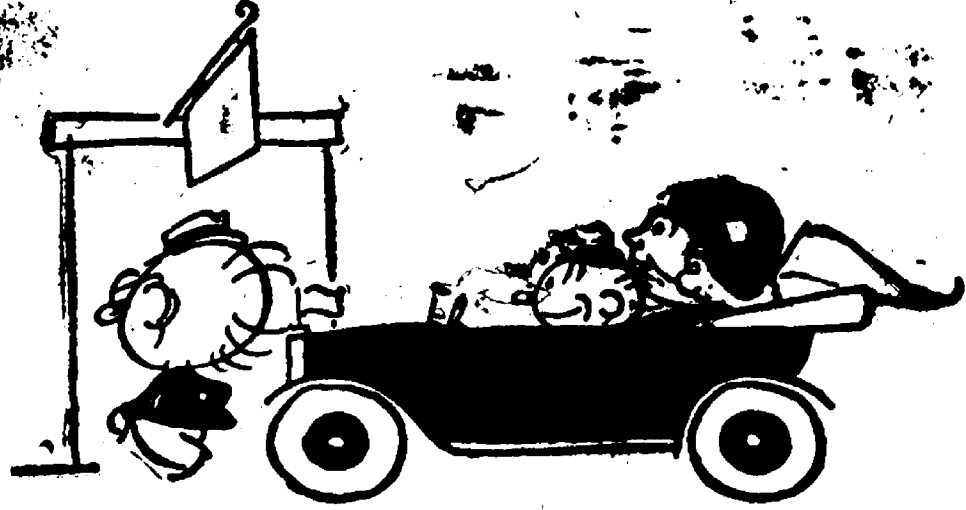

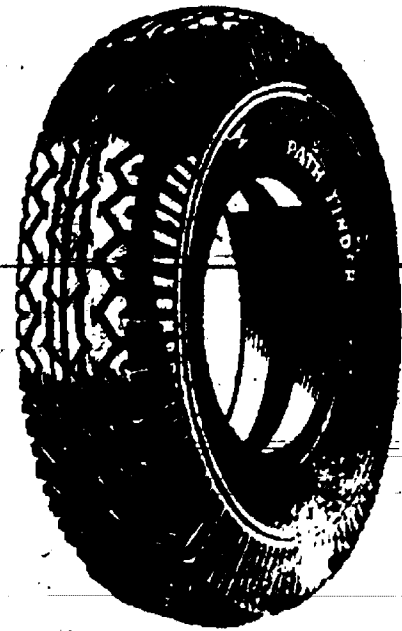
