NATION'S FINANCE STANDS TEST WELL

Economic Policy Commission of Bankers Association Points Out How 22,000 Banks Protect Public Interest

OVER 22,000 banks all over the United States are "quietly and efficiently serving their communities, helping the many business enterprises over their difficulties, helping many concerns to earn money, helping create the economic activities that mean payrolls and spending power in their zones of influence, and faithfully keeping guard over the working capital and savings funds of their depositors."

"It surely stands strikingly to the credit of the banking profession that during a period of unparalleled international economic depression, this vast majority of bankers have so competently, so courageously and so successfully met their difficulties and obligations. The effects of the drought, the demoralization of agriculture, the stagnation of industry, the breakdown of trade, the inability of so many heretofore desirable customers to meet their obligations to the banks, the impairment of public confidence by mob-scares and false rumors resulting in unreasoning runs, the abnormal depreciation of quoted security values even in the most wisely conceived investment accounts, the utter collapse of real estate values—all these things have occurred on a nationwide and worldwide scale with unprecedented severity."

"The effects of every one of them have assailed the banks with destructive forces because they are of the very essence of a bank's economic substance. Yet, as we have shown, the great bulk of our banking deposits has been protected without harm, and our banks in a vast majority have continued to serve, support and strengthen their customers and their communities with unflagging and unrequited devotion."

Every Variety of Song in the Lives of Russians

In Russia music has always been closely connected with the lives of the people. From the time of birth through all the events of life until death claims them, they move to a musical accompaniment. The return of spring is celebrated by a sort of choral dance, termed the khorovod; marriage, being a most important time, brings forth many songs, such as "The Birchwood Splinter" ("Lootchins"), "Glorification", "The Matchmaker" ("Svat oushka"). There are boating songs, laboring songs, lullabies and dance songs. Most of the dance tunes are in the major mode, the slow tunes, and these are best liked in the minor. Oscar Cal, in his book "La Musique en Russie," divided the Russian composers into three groups: First, the old lyric school, Glinka, Dargomizsky and Borod; second, the New-Russians, Rimsky-Korsakov, Mussorgsky, Borodin, and lastly Rubinstein and Tchaikowski in a class by themselves as being less distinctively national.—Washington Star.

275,000 HEAR HER



PREDICTIONS of a lower level of health and a higher tuberculosis rate among Michigan young people, caused by present-day living conditions, come true, it will not be because Princess Watassa has not travelled far enough and wide enough over Michigan to teach boys and girls how to be health-

The Michigan Tuberculosis Association, which sends Watassa to Michigan schools, reports that in the three and one-half years she has been at work, more than 275,000 school children have heard her Indian health stories. In that time she has been in all except two of the state's 83 counties. Grade children as well as high school students delight to hear Watassa's legends, all of them carrying valuable health lessons for the listeners. The programs are given entirely without cost to the schools, being financed by funds secured in the December sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals. The work of Princess Watassa is but one of the methods used by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association to promote health among children. Posters, bulletins, leaflets, and other health supplies are distributed widely in city, village, and rural schools. During the past twelve months alone, 48,000 copies of a leaflet entitled "Foods for Growing Boys and Girls" have been given to residents of Michigan. Added health work among children, to offset insofar as possible the effects of depression on child health, is planned by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association for 1932. The extent of this work will be determined entirely by funds realized in the Christmas seal sale, in progress at the present time.
