NEIGHBORING NEWS

Rev. Fr. Duffy of the Bunker Hill Catholic church has planted a living Christmas tree in front of the church. It is a Norway pine, 5 feet tall. The Howell city hospital paid expenses for the month of November. The Howell city council has warned people of that city to keep their walks clean this winter. If unable to do so they should call the welfare department and a man will be sent. Congressman Michael Hart of Saginaw is billed to speak at a big Democrat rally at Ann Arbor on December 28. Northwestern University has ordered 20,000 grid tickets for the Michigan-Northwestern game to be played at Ann Arbor next fall on Oct. 8. This is the largest single order ever received by the University of Michigan. At the present time the inmates of the Detroit House of Correction at Northville consist of 1100 men and 354 women. About 1000 bushel of potatoes are used a month. The Saline Savings Bank which was closed on October 24 has been ordered reopened by Judge Sample. William Lyons, 77, former Stockbridge business man, died at Saline December 15. He was well known here. For years he operated a livery stable in Stockbridge. Of late he traveled as a salesman for a cigar and tobacco company. The department of conservation reports that 15,000 deer were killed in this state during the recent hunting season. Only 4 men were killed compared to 9 in 1930 and 11 in 1929. The Heinz pickle plant at Holly is being dismantled and shipped to other places. Inability to obtain enough cucumbers is said to be the cause. The candy store of Mrs. Sarah Conners at Dexter was robbed last Wednesday night. A quantity of candy and a small amount of money was taken. Atwood and Gager, Dexter contractors, have been awarded two contracts by the state administrative board for highway work. The Dexter firm will build a replacement bridge over Mill creek, just west of Dexter, at \$29,263. In addition the firm will also do paving work on M-132, connecting Ann Arbor and Dexter, the paving work to cost \$10,028. The contracts were awarded Thursday.

DOES NOT REFER TO RECENT ACT

In recent newspaper dispatches regarding the decision of the United States Circuit Court declaring the Michigan State a lion Registration Act unconstitutional, an inference was created that the decision referred to the United States Registration Act passed by Congress March 2, 1929, and consequently aliens are not applying for registration. This Act provided for the registration of aliens who entered the United States prior to June 3, 1921, and are eligible citizenship and are of good moral character and of whom there is no record of legal admission and who have resided continuously in the United States since that date.

This is an erroneous inference on the United States Registration Act is still in force and effect and any alien who comes within the class mentioned can make application or by mail.

They were met by two fire men who told them to run back as there would be an explosion. Before they could get out the explosion came. Mr. Saunders was hurled against a window, unconscious. His son, Walter Saunders dragged him out. He is badly burned about the head and hands and bad wounds on ankles and knees. Mr. O'Brien was not so seriously injured. Both are at the Naval hospital at Mare Island. Both Mr. Saunders and Mr. O'Brien who went through the World War, said it was worse than any experience. Two firemen have since died and many people are still in hospitals. The gas furnace was installed only the day before the explosion.
