## School Started Sept. 8th

Pinckney School Opens Tuesday with an Enrollment of About 200  
Primary Room is Largest

The Pinckney school opened Tuesday morning with an enrollment of approximately 200. The primary room has the largest there being 51 there.

Unofficial figures give the high school grades an enrollment of 91. There are 16 seniors, 18 juniors, 30 sophomores and 19 freshmen. In the 8th grade there are 8. The 7th has 16, the 6th 21 and the 5th 12. No figures were available for the 3rd and 4th grades.

### CONDEMN PROPERTY FOR PARK SITE

The Huron Clinton Park authority has taken legal steps to condemn 900 acres of land near Belleville and Ypsilanti for a park for Willow Run factory workers. This will be the first of several along the Huron and Clinton rivers. It extends from the north shore of the lake to Chase road and from the Rawsonville road to within 600 feet of Haggerty road. It has 11 miles of shore line and is 22 miles from the Detroit city hall.

The Huron Clinton Park authority was created by an act of legislature, ratified by vote of the people and upheld by decision of the supreme court.



## Mich. Mirror State News

Candidacy of Gerald L. K. Smith is Worrying Republicans

Apathy of Republican voters, abetted by unusual circumstances, may result in the nomination next Tuesday of a political bogey man, Gerald L. K. Smith for U. S. Senator.

It may also assure the re-election of Senator Prentiss Brown, Democrat who enjoys considerable popularity, by the biggest vote ever polled.

This is not isolated opinion. It is the belief of competent Detroit newspapermen with whom this writer has talked recently. And it has been the theme of editorials in Detroit and upstate newspapers. Lets see how the logic goes.

The circumstances are these: Opposition to Smith is divided between 2 candidates—Elton R. Eaton of Plymouth and Judge Homer Ferguson of Detroit.

War is causing an eclipse of the primary. Many men in the military service. A tight vote is indicated.

Since the Democrat nominee is uncontested. Democrats may vote on the Republican primary.

This is emotional year. Pent-up sentiments may dominate.

The predicament of Michigan Republicans, caused by the entry of the former Huey Long lieutenant of Louisiana into Michigan politics, is bringing much pleasure to the Democrats.

Since the Frank Murphy administration when the legislature amended the state's primary law, voters may cross party lines to support candidates.

Senator Brown is unopposed. The Detroit News makes this deduction: Smith will get just as many Democrat votes as that party's organization can swing into the Republican primary. His nomination is seen as guaranteeing Senator Brown the biggest election majority a Democrat ever has polled here, not excepting President Roosevelt.

Funny business, politics. That Democrats may vote for a Republican candidate next Tuesday in order to assure the re-election of their own nominee.

"Colorful rabble rouser" is the title given to the Huey Long apostle by the editor of the Free Press, John S. Knight. His recent comment: "Many regular Republicans in Michigan are worried about the large attendance at the rallies being staged by that colorful rabble rouser, Gerald L. K. Smith. His nomination for United States senator in September would just about finish off the Republican party nationally."

The Lansing State Journal takes the view that Smith may be nominated in a three-way fight whereby his opponents will split the opposition and between will get a majority of the votes cast.

"Fresh in from Louisiana and the Huey Long school, Smith could never

**DR. THEODORE F. LANE**

Dr. Theodore F. Lane, 74, died suddenly at Ann Arbor Sunday, following a heart attack while riding his favorite horse, Annabelle Eagle. He was born in Unadilla on Dec. 5, 1867 and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Watson Lane. For 41 years he had practiced veterinary surgery in Ann Arbor. His wife formerly Kate Heffernan of Unadilla whom he married in 1900 died in 1933. Surviving is a daughter, Mrs. Louis Hallen, of Ann Arbor and three grandchildren, a brother, Dr. Chandler Lane of Chelsea, two sisters, Mrs. Grace Richmond of Jackson and Mrs. Earl Elliott of Detroit. 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## CURRENT COMMENT

War restrictions continue to increase with indications that the longer the war lasts the more stringent and exacting they will become.

Distillers will halt the manufacture of whiskey, gin and other beverage spirits on Nov. 1 next and devote all their resources to producing 475,000,000 gallons of alcohol for the government from which synthetic rubber, smokeless powder and other war materials will be made. The 128 distilleries of the nation have all signed to do this. However no drought is expected as there are large amounts of beverages on hand and in storage. Meat rationing is expected soon, possibly by Jan. 1 or soon er. A plan is now being worked out whereby will be issued 2 and half pounds of meat per person per week. The manufacture of steel coat hangers has also been stopped to conserve steel. We suppose wood will be substituted. At one time a very acceptable coat hanger could be made from a barrel stave.

Is it just curiosity or are the people far more credulous than we have believed? Gerald L. K. Smith ex-preacher, ex-busby Long assistant spoke at Howell last Saturday before a huge crowd who listened eagerly to his tires for everybody, \$100 a month for the soldiers. Consideration for the Townsend Pension and Anti Dictator speech. Probably neither of his opponents, Judge Ferguson of Major Eaton could have drawn such a gathering. According to reports all over the state Gerald L. K. Smith has been out-drawing his opponents by a huge majority. Nevertheless we still do not believe the nomination of Smith for Senator is in the bag. Way back in the nineties when Wm. Jennings Bryan was running for president he always got the biggest crowds at his meetings but on election day he never got the most votes.

The average person cannot understand the attacks and indignities suffered by the American forces now cognized by Northern Ireland or are waiting for the opening of the second front in Europe. The Jackson Citizen Patriot explains the situation fully in an editorial last week. It states these attacks are made by the Irish Republican army, an outlaw aggregation who are neither recognized by Northern Ireland or Eire. When the American soldiers landed there Eire made a protest against their landing because it was part of their bitter fight to have all Ireland under home rule. This protest having been got on record that is as far as it went. The Irish Republican army is different and is sort of 5th column movement in stigated and inspired by Hitler and his agents, says the Jackson paper. It is the Nazi Blackshirt outfit. Beyond waging a sort of guerilla war nothing serious is liable to happen as they are too limited in number and have no planes or tanks to wage warfare against American forces.

There is one war organization in this country serving without pay which has stood more abuse and ill treatment than any other which on the other hand is entitled to considerable praise which they will probably not get. That is the county draft boards. While a few abuses may have been found in a few, the most of the draft boards are composed of upstanding men of good repute who are willing to serve in their capacity without pay in order to do their bit for their country. They have to stand abuses and even slander started by different persons whose sons they refused to exempt from war service, there being no grounds for such. The first draft board composed of three highly respected citizens of this county stood it for 6 months and then quit, preferring not to wait until they went to Heaven for their reward. Three more good men were appointed and in the course of a few months 2 of them resigned. Two more were appointed and Sam Platt of the second board makes up the present board. Sam Platt, long in public life in the county is one of those who does his duty as he sees it and more power to him for it.



**CONGRESSIONAL NEWS LETTER**

**Hon. W. W. Blackney**

**Payments For Dependents**  
The War Dept. announced today that checks in payment of allowances to dependents of enlisted men of the Army, covering the first applications to be approved, will go out shortly after Sept. 1. These checks will include all sums accrued up to date in the individual cases covered. Thereafter payments will continue to be made shortly after the first of each month for sums accrued up to the end of the previous month on approved applications. You may recall that under the original act, payments for dependents were to begin on Nov. 1, but owing to the hardships that would be inflicted on many dependents, an amendment was proposed by which payments can be made immediately. It is estimated that for each million men in the army there will probably be half a million allowance applications with an average of two relatives or dependents per application—an overall average of one dependent per soldier.

**Rationing**

1. The OPA froze until Oct. 31 all

the 1942 models of Ford, Chevrolet and Plymouth four door, hard-top sedans driven less than 1,000 miles and now in dealers lots. The Army and Navy requirements will take most of them. Since the Army and Navy contemplates buying smaller numbers of two door sedans and coupes and because ample supplies of these models are available, the OPA said it did not contemplate stopping sale of two door models to eligible civilians.

2. Tire quotas for Sept. will have to be cut from the August level to keep within the amount of rubber earmarked by the WPB for that purpose. The OPA asked local War Price and Rationing boards for the strictest possible interpretation of a recent amendment to tire rationing regulations restricting truck eligibility to vehicles essential to the war effort or public safety.

Price Administrator Henderson and Petroleum Coordinator Eakes in a joint statement said fuel oil rationing to east coast householders may be unavoidable next winter. Supplies are so low in the eastern shortage area that some form of consumption curtailment seems certain.

4. The OPA said sugar ration stamp No. 8 will be good for purchase of in the ten weeks between Aug. 28, and October 31 in order to facilitate disposal of large stocks of sugar.

**The Draft Law**

It is generally conceded that some drastic changes will have to be made under the present system. For instance, men with dependents are going into the army in some areas and other areas they are not. Married men are being taken here and not there. One reason for this seems to be that the State governments handling draft administration pay little attention to the national regulations. These quotas work out so that there are surpluses of single men in one area while in another area it may be necessary to draft grandfathers of 45.

**The Manpower Outlook**

About 4 million men are now in military service. Single men without dependents number around 5 million. This includes approximately 700,000 1B now being called, excluding 1,200,000 essential men. Calling these men at the rate of 3 hundred thousand a month, this should leave a five months supply of physical fit before a big call of men with dependent mothers, aunts, sisters, etc. should be made. It is now reported officially that men with dependents will be called by Christmas. Congress is being urged to amend present draft law by including 18 and 19 yr. old boys. Should this law be passed it would include approximately 1,400,000 physically fit Drafting of married men without any children would give another 1,300,000 physically fit as a minimum. Therefore it looks as though an Army and Navy of more than 8,000,000 is possible without taking married men with children.

**What To Do If Drafted**

1. What should a man do if he is classified as 1A.  
Notify his employer immediately. If he believes the draft board has made a mistake in failing to recognize dependents whom he is supporting or in failing to defer him because his employer claims he is necessary to his business, the man can appeal.
2. When should appeal be made?  
Selective Service regulations require that appeals be made within 10 days after the man receives notice that his classification is 1A.
3. Should a man begin to wind up his civilian affairs as soon as he is classified No. 1A?  
The 1A class does not mean that he will be drafted.
4. Can men who are drafted get time to wind up their affairs?  
Yes. Men who are inducted will be given a 14 day furlough if they request it.
5. How can he be sure that his job will be given back to him after the War?  
The Selective Service law requires Co. to re-employ him at a job comparable to the one he held before he was inducted.





**CONSERVATION DEPT.**

Land ownership is being established as only 58,000 acres and 2800 lots reverted to the state at the delinquent tax sale held last May. In 1941 a total of 155,000 acres and 10,663 lots reverted to the state.
