Well it is now about 2 hours after and I just finished eating Thanksgiving dinner. I have to go on duty in the captain's gig and will continue to write between trips. We had turkey, boiled ham, dressing, fruit salad, sweet spuds, cranberry sauce pumpkin pie and each man received a package of cigarettes. I am setting trying to write while the boat is rocking. Your boxes are most welcome. I did not receive the licoris yet but got the 17 jewel watch. Thank all the friends who helped by it for me. The saxophone is OK but leaks from banging and have not had time to fix it yet. I don't recall Rilla Lane or her address, please enlighten me on it. I received a letter from Ralph Meyer awhile ago.

Garth and Jimmie have not written for some time. What's the matter with them? Send me some stamps. They are hard to get here. Have been in Howard Read's neighborhood but not seen him.

REGISTRATION FOR 18 YEAR OLD BOYS ANNOUNCED

The second December draft call is scheduled for the 23rd on which date another consignment of Livingston county draftees will go to Detroit for army examination. In Jan. it is expected that the induction of 18 and 19 year old boys will start as the present draft lists are about exhausted.

The Sixth Draft-Registration for 18 year olds who have reached that age since the last registration last June begins on December 11 and ends on Dec. 31. The schedule is as follows:

1. Those who were born on or after July 1, 1924, shall be registered on any date during the week commencing Friday, Dec. 11, 1942 and ending Thursday, December 17, 1942.

2. Those who were born on or after Sept. 1, 1924, but not after Oct. 31 1924, shall be registered on any day in the week commencing Friday, Dec. 18, 1942, and ending Thursday, Dec. 24, 1942.

4. During the continuance of the present war those who were born on or after January 11, 1925, shall be registered on the day they attain the 18th anniversary of their birth provided that if such an anniversary falls on Sunday or a legal holiday, the registration shall take place on the day following that.

The registration for 18 year olds will be held in Howell at the City Clerks office at 121 North Mich. ave.

Mich. Mirror State News

War Needs Expected to Shorten the Coming Legislature Session

War or no war, the petogative of Mich. state legislatures are shorted by time honored traditions and are not likely to change even in an emergency or are they?

The gov. elect really has distanced that efforts will be made to expedite the 1943 legislative session-state revenues are accruing, while costs are mounting. Hence, the ready proposal for an annual state budget instead of the customary biennial budget. Why? Two reasons: The war and a resultant need for economy.

Recently legislative sessions have become the rule since 1933 when the New Deal arrived with reform.

Former members of the legislature are counted on adjournment by June so they could go home for work.

The farm labor shortage in 1943 will be needed in their fields in the spring. This was situation should favor the Kelly plan, which calls for a radical change of habits.

Law-makers will not convene at Columbus to engage in the tradition of log rolling practice of introducing bills which they know will be killed in committee, holding hearings for the records and otherwise spending a lot of time and money just to keep the pressure blocs, large and small, distinct back home and thus fulfill campaign pledges.

At least, so says the Ohio gov. who was mentioned prominently for the 1944 Republican campaign.

CONSERVATION NOTES

495 hunters checked in Allegan county to hunt antlerless deer this year. The first deer killed was an 83lb. doe fawn. 800 hunters won permits to hunt there but many of them were disqualified for getting deer in northern Michigan previously. Last year 48 antlerless deer were killed in Allegan county.

Trappers must obtain the consent of owners before setting traps on other peoples land. Maintenance of feed stations for the birds during the period snow covers the land is urged by the dept.

Permits must be obtained to keep small game more than 30 days and deer and bear more than 60.

According to estimates about 200,000 hunters hunted deer this year in Michigan. 8,488 deer came across the Straits of Mackinac compared to 10,916 last year. 5 elk and 300 illegal deer were confiscated and 440 arrests made.

Conservation dept. officials and Mich. state College faculty members will dine on carp there on Dec. 11 in order to popularize this low cost food.

The Grayling Winter Sports park to which the railroads have run snow trains in the past will not operate this year.

Local ice fisherman expect little competition from city fisherman this year on account of gas rationing and war work.

33 antlerless deer and 7 illegal buck were killed the first day of hunting in Allegan County.
