Chas. Runciman Passes Away

Prominent Unadilla Farmer Passes Away, Hold Many Offices of Public Trust

The community was saddened Friday by the death of Charles A. Runciman, a resident of this section for many years. He was born in Sylvan township, Washtenaw county, August 14, 1881 and died February 19, 1943.

He was the only son of the late George and Emma Runciman.

On April 20, 1905, he was united in marriage to Delia Mayer of Stockbridge. They moved to Lyndon where they lived for five years, moving on to the farm, east of Stockbridge in 1910. To this union was born a son, Glen. Mrs. Runciman died in June 1918. On September 3, 1921, he was married to Miss Grace



Gardner of Pinckney, who with his son and two granddaughters survive him. Also a sister, Mrs. Edward Cooper, Waterloo, and a stepmother Mrs. Agnes Runciman, of Lansing, who will mourn for the loss and council in the home of one who was ever ready to give his hearts deepest sympathy.

He was a man of wide knowledge and understanding a man of industry possessed strong convictions, and devoted to the cardinal principles of truth and honesty. If it be true that an honest man is the noblest work of God we can justly pronounce him as a noble man. For a number of years he has been a leading democrat in Livingston county, always taking an active part. He was a member of the Livingston board of supervisors for a number of years and in 1936 he ran on the democrat ticket for state representative. In October 1936, he was appointed by the gov. as tax examiner for the state tax comm. In this capacity he served for two years. His life of unselfish devotion to his family and neighbors will ever be an inspiration to those who remain behind. At an early age he joined Stockbridge Lodge No. 180 F. & A. M. and ever remained loyal to the tenets of Masonic principles.

The funeral was conducted from the home Mon. Feb. 22nd under the auspices of Stockbridge Lodge, Dr. Fredrick Behner officiating. The pallbearers were: Burr Jackson, Robert Read, June Taylor, Grover Singleton, Alex Reid and Fred Asquith. Burial was in Stockbridge cemetery.

When soldiers are home, public pictures of them really enjoying tural resources, recreational facilities and services of your community which will get international distribution. Many troops are training in Michigan. They are our post war customers of the resort area which impresses them favorably. You can assist in creating and stimulating that favorable impression. BOY SCOUT NEWS

The Livingston Council of Boy Scouts will hold the next Court of Honor in Howell high school on Mon. evening, March 1st, at 7:30. Parents and other friends of Scouting are invited and urged to attend. This meeting is on a war time basis, will begin promptly, and close before 9 o'clock.

CURRENT COMMENT

The attempt of the legislature to make slow time official in Michigan seems to have muddled things in general. Most of the cities such as Ann Arbor, Detroit, Ypsilanti, Jackson, Flint, Monroe, Bay City remain on war time. Brighton tried slow time Mon. but got so mixed up that they went back to war time. Pinckney remained on war time but Howell and Fowlerville went on slow time and as a result the county is in a muddle. The existence of two kinds of time has mixed things for doctors and insurance companies. The attorney general was called on last week to decide whether a person who died at 12:15 a. m. war time or baby born at that time was born or died on that date or at 11:15 the day before. The attorney general's opinion was that until the supreme court rules on the time question, slow time is official. With busses, factories and post offices and trains operating on fast time, there seems to be no end of the muddle in sight.

The 20 millions dollar surplus in the state treasury is not liable to last long as the pressure grows after their share of it. Among the demands are that of public schools for 5,500,000, 5 million for old age pensions; 1,500,000 for state employees retirement and 2 million for soldiers bonuses. Not all the groups will obtain their objective but some probably will.

We hear much of the absenteeism among the workers in war factories which in some states seems to be greater than in others. Some are being alarmed at this and favor the anti-absenteeism measures where workers absent without just cause are liable to prison terms. In 1942 there were 246 prosecution cases in England and a number of men sent to prison, 122 being women. In England investigation showed that two thirds of absences were due to sicknesses and one third due to slackers. Here in America the absenteeism is said to be 10 percent.

The government has sent the sectoral investigating committee to Michigan to investigate the alleged lack of production at the Willow Run Bomber plant which has so far amounted to practically nothing. Senate Truman, head of the committee stated. About a week ago the press carried pictures of the plant and assembly lines and started the factory was ahead of schedule. Workers from there however have not been over enthusiastic about the production. There are many reasons for the slow beginning of the mammoth plant. First the plant had to be built which took a year or more. Then there was no skilled plane makers available and store clerks, drug store cowboys, girls and other such classes of labor had to be trained. Then Mr. Ford insisted on building planes on the assembly line the same way he built autos, this was a new method and considerable ironing had to be worked out before the system could be made. The factory itself was built in the wilds of the country and living quarters for workers were hard to find. Then the heavy snows of this winter blocked the roads and kept employees from work. To expect a setup of this nature to compare favorably with the records of California factories where planes have been built for years is expecting too much.





CONSERVATION NOTES

Among the foods that cannot be hoarded are bluegills. You cannot have over 15 in your possession at any one time. They cannot be kept in cold storage lockers.

Only \$355 in bounty was paid out to trappers of predatory animals in January. 17 coyotes and 13 bobcats. There were 142 arrest warrants for game violations in Jan., mostly for possession out of season.

An increase since 1928 of from 36 to 62 per cent in the number of suckers, carp smelt, and herring caught is noted in fishermen's catches. A movement to postpone the opening of the season on frogs from

June 1 to 25 and closing from Nov. 1 to 15 is up in the legislature. Fur prices have gone up. Coyote pelts which sold for 76c a few years ago brought \$5.04 at the auction sale of confiscated furs last week. Mink sold for \$4. Otter \$12, bobcats \$2.75 and deer \$1.25. A bill has been introduced in the legislature to legalize Sunday hunting throughout the state. Also one to make the deer season run from Dec. 1 to 15.

RECAP RATIONING QUIT

The rationing on recapped tires of passenger and light truck tires has been discontinued. Large commercial vehicle tires are still rationed however.

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
