News and Letters from Our Boys Who Are Serving Their Country

Rev. Harold Keason, a student in Keesler Field's B-24 (Liberator Bomber) mechanics school, was promoted this week to the grade of private 1st class. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Reason in Pinckney, Mich.

Keesler Field, a unit of the Technical Training Command of the Army Air forces, is training expert mechanics of service and maintain the high liberators in theaters of operation all over the world.

Elizabeth Clawson, third class petty officer in the US navy gave an interesting talk before the Pinckney school last Wed. She has been in the navy 16 months with 14 of them on foreign duty, including service at the Solomons Fijis on transport duty. His ship was torpedoed and sunk some two month ago and since he has not yet been assigned to another boat. After the sinking he and other were on the water 14 days before being rescued. He was also on a landing party on the south sea island occupied by Japs. His buddy was killed and buried on the beach where he fell. All the Japs have gold teeth and some of the boys made as much as \$300 from gold they took from dead Japs. He has some of the gold he collected as souvenirs. He expects to be assigned to another ship soon.

## The Monday Election Result

Putnam Township Goes Democratic but the Race for Supervisor is Close. State Goes Republican

In Putnam township Monday the smallest vote in years was cast only 368 votes. This is the fewest number of votes cast in 25 years since women were allowed to vote. Last year 462 votes were cast and in the presidential election 565.

In Putnam township Frank Bowers Democrat supervisor who has held office several terms had a close victory, getting a majority of 6. The vote was as follows.

On the state ticket the Democrats all got majorities of about 20 except for supt of public ins. Elliot R, incumbent got a majority of 1. There were 3 split prohibition votes cast. Both amendments were defeated the two term one for township officers by 15 votes and the homestead land one by 20 votes.

For supreme court, both Republican candidates got majorities. The vote was Boyle, R, 157, Neil Reid, R, 167, Judge Chandler, D, 113 F. McAviney D. 61.

## Mich. Mirror State News

Was the Recent Session of the Legislature a Waste of Time or Not?

Whether the state legislature accomplished anything or not during its streamlined 90 day session depends on a number of things.

For instance if you are an avowed dry, the session was all "wet", to use the vernacular. Sale of beer, wines and liquors is still legal and millions of dollars profit are still going into state treasury. No doubt some of them for the schools, a very outrageous situation to be sure.

If you feel that the legislature spent all its time needlessly wrangling over the highway bills, then too the session was a terrible flop, and Gov. Kelly ought to hang his head in shame, et cetera.

And if for example you haven't had a good cup of coffee for weeks, and the icebox is still bare of a good steak, and the country is going plumb to the dogs, why the legislative session was a downright disgrace to 100 percent Americans, if you get what we mean.

And so we approach the legislative record with some misgivings, realizing that what is an accomplishment to one person, perhaps is the opposite to someone else.

Without justifying or condemning what did or did not happen at Lansing we will try to review the highlights and let the chips fall where they may. If your appetite is bad and it's raining cats and dogs outside, then it's just too bad.

Consider the governor's problem for a minute. He takes office at the first of the year. Six days later he delivers his message to the legislature and about 90 days later the legislators go away and leave the junior to clean up the place. Harry F. Kelly has just that situation. Here is what happened in 90 days:

Post War Reserve. Act. no. 4 of the Public Acts created a post war reserve fund of \$50,000,000. The state administrative board was directed to transfer immediately \$10,000,000 from the surplus which is now about \$40,000,000. In his legislative message \$40,000,000.

A post war planning comm was created for public buildings. A separate appropriation was made whereby \$150,000 would be available immediately for architects' plans.

Retirement fund for employees Senate bill 202 adopted, provided for a retirement fund for state employees. This will complement civil service and it also fulfilled a recommendation of Gov. Kelly.

## CURRENT COMMENT

The county will have another scrap drive in the near future. Can it be handled by the A.A.A. Pinckney had one last October in which some 100 tons was collected. However she learned a number of things by that time though the scrap drive took place six months ago only about half the scrap has as yet been removed. The scrap was piled on the school grounds on the assurance the government was desperately in need of it and it would be removed in a few weeks to the steel mills. However it laid there all winter and the result is there will be no laws on that part of the school grounds this year. When the next scrap drive comes you may rest assured it will be piled somewhere else. Undoubtedly there is still much scrap left in this section. The first one barely scratched the surface. It rained all the morning. At noon school was dismissed and the pupils assisted in the collection. Some 20 trucks were used. Most of the scrap was collected that half day although about 20 tons was brought in afterwards.

It seems to be a fact that the liquor business is not able to operate without scandal. Wayne county has just unearthed another liquor scandal in which by payment of bribe money several so called drug stores in Detroit were able to get the lion's share of the decreasing liquor supply while other dealers went without. This all comes from not letting well enough alone. The original liquor distributor called for liquor sales only in drug stores with the state getting the entire profit. The pressure groups began to get busy and the act was amended in Gov. Fitzgerald's first term to allow drug stores or S. D. D. dealers to handle it. Naturally abuses crept in. These stores were open all hours and 7 days a week. The Levine arrested in Detroit \$1400,000 worth of liquor in 1942 from 2 stores, fronting as drug stores. He is in a negro district and most of his customers were colored war workers. By payment of money he and other S. D. D. dealers were able to get all the liquor they wanted. It was ever thus. No matter how hard you try the liquor business will always be a headache.

The Grosse Pointe Justice and jury who convicted Mrs. Elizabeth Adams of violating a city ordinance by keeping roomers in a restricted residential area have apparently made an outstanding martyr of her and given her fame from coast to coast. Her contention is she was performing a patriotic duty as her roomers were all war workers. The C.I.O. quick to see its opportunity bailed her out after she had spent a few hours in jail and appealed her case to the circuit court. One does not have to be very smart to figure what is bound to happen. If the Grosse Pointe officials had had any vision they would have overlooked the city restriction for the duration at least. As it is they are made to look ridiculous.

In the old days the corner saloon did a big business in cashing payroll checks. Many saloons made a practise of borrowing money on paydays of the nearby factories and cashing the payroll. They usually got the entire business as they did it for nothing and the banks charged. Also the banks were not open after working hours. Of course the workmen usually felt obligated to spend a little when they got their checks cashed and it meant good business for the saloon. As Henry Ford owns most of the land near the Willow Run bomber plant there are no such places there. However a solution has appeared according to the Washtenaw Tribune. An armored car said to be from Chicago has made its appearance and cashes the payroll checks. They take for their pay the odd change. If the check is for \$50.11 they take 11c for \$50.88 they take 88c. This makes a nice business and shows it pays to use your head and rest your back.
