MATTHEW PAUL BRADY

Mr. Brady passed away May 7 at McPherson Memorial hospital in Howell after a weeks illness. The death of Mr. Brady marked the passing away of one of the pioneers of Genoa Township. He was born Jun 25, 1867 and he spent his entire life farming except the one year in which he was in business. His parents were one of the families which helped build St. Mary's church in Pinckney. He was a life long member of St. Patricks church in Brighton.

He was the son of the late Philip and Mary Brady. He was preceded in death by his wife Carrie Flynn Brady and a son and two sisters, Mrs. Ella McCluskey and Mrs. Mary Longkin. He is survived by 5 sisters, Irene and Cecelia Brady at home, Mrs. James Gibney and Mrs. Arthur McCluer of Gregory and Mrs. Agnes Anderson, and one brother Joe Brady of Brighton.

On the eve of his funeral the Holy Name Society gathered at his home to say the rosary. The funeral was held from St. Patrick's church Brighton May 10 1943 at 10 a.m. The Rev. Nohler CMM was celebrant of a solemn requiem high mass, assisted by Rev. Fr. Kissane as deacon and the Rev. G.F. Chapman as subdeacon. The sermon was given by Fr. Kissane his text being: "Render unto

Caesar the things that are Caesars and the God the things that are God" Mr. Brady was a loyal citizen and a noble christian. He was laid to rest in the family plot in the Calvary cemetery, Brighton.

We hope and pray for an early victory, yet it is folly for citizens on the home front to relax one moment their efforts for winning of the war.

Michigan rates first in per capita sales of war bond.

It is truly the arsenal of democracy with more than 11 billion dollars in war contracts already awarded to Michigan industries.

Yet this is no time for celebration. On the basis of contracts already awarded Michigan will need 200,000 more workers by the end of 1943.

The hour of destiny is nearing when American troops will land on Europe. many hundred of miles from Germany itself. Many lives is the price we must pay.

In the last war 4,300,300 Yanks that only 241 tanks were used by the Americans in combat areas. Only one airplane from America reached the fighting front the first year of the war.

In the last war 4,820,300 Yanks were under arms; today at least 10 million are certain to be in uniform. Yanks must be equipped to stand the humidity of jungle warfare, wintry blasts of the Alutians and heat of North Africa.

In 1918 the American war expenditures were only 18 and one half billion dollars. This coming fiscal calls for more than 100 billion! hh

We must continue to produce more arms, buy more bonds, to grow more food.

As the war dept. col. put it tersely, the victory in Tunisia is only one step on a long march to victory. For us on the Michigan home front the unified command must be: Let's get on with the war.
