Lt. Andrew Kirkland, bomber pilot, has completed 41 successful missions over Europe and has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

Staff Sgt. Harold Reason, 36 of Pinckney aerial gunner on a B-24 Liberator in France has been promoted to 1st Lt. Sgt. He was awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement during 8 bombing missions Nazi military and industrial targets.

Lt. John Carver returned to Florence, N. C. Monday after a two week furlough here.

13 men from this county will go to Detroit examination center on Aug. 14. A letter received from Lt. Andrew Kirtland says he has 4 more missions to complete of his 50 missions over Europe and then he will be home on furlough. He is in Italy. On his last mission an amplifier went out and he had to turn back. This time he had an all green crew making their first mission and when they released the bombs in the Adriatic they missed some American boats by only a couple of thousand feet. One day there recently a big German plane landed in a wheat field and 6 German officers climbed out and surrendered. They had had their fill of war.

Howard Read home on furlough after two years in the South Pacific with the Marines has many interesting experiences to relate. Says the natives there are just as savage as they were 100 years ago and are reputed to still be cannibals. One native used to show up every morning at Marine headquarters with a Jap head which he traded for a cigarette. He kept this up for a week or two and then turned up missing. It was presumed that the Japs finally got him.

Local Boy Reported Missing in Action in France Since July 4

PFC. Glen Kingsley, 29, of Pinckney has been missing in action in France since July 4th, according to a telegram received by his wife, Mrs. Thelma Kingsley of Pinckney last Friday. He was son of Christopher and Jennie Pierce Kingsley of Pinckney and married Thelma Bowman, daughter

He received his training in Virginia, Florida, Arizona and California and went to England last spring. In France he was with the second machine gun company and took part in the D-Day invasion. Surviving is his wife a daughter, Glenda, a year old and two sisters, Mrs. Andrew Campbell of Pinckney and Mrs. Vivian Parmalee of Hillsdale. Also three half brothers, Willard, Lloyd and Clifford Bennett and a half sister, Mrs. Mildred Drost, of Wayne. Previous to army induction he was employed by the county road commission and in Howell factories.

Edison Dogs Join Marines

Public Utility Co. Donates Trained Dogs for War Service

With their home front services ended Lance V. Liebestraum and Rhett of Palm Hill, two German Shepherds of the Detroit Edison recently departed for active roles with the "Devil Dogs" of the U.S. Marine Corps. According to William C. Miller, Superintendent of the Company's Electrical System "these dogs were acquired two years ago to assist the Company's plant men in patrolling

Miller said: "Government authorities charged with the security of plants have ruled that this type of supplemental protection is no longer necessary." Mich. Mirror State News

News from Here and There and All Over the State of Michigan

Sault Ste Marie--Here at one of the oldest and most famous points of North America Sault Ste Marie presents today --anno domini 1944-- a convincing and powerful argument, that the day of American military isolationism from Europe is forever gone.

The new meets the old amid surroundings. Here at the first permanent settlement begun by Europeans in Michigan, 200 years before Fort Dearborn was built among the wild onions that the Indians called "Chicago" is located the war departments headquarters for the air defense of 17 Mid-West states.

And only because the German Luftwaffe has been beaten. From the skies of Europe and the filthy Nazis are once more on the run in Normandy and Italy and on the Russian front citizens of Sault Ste Marie no longer view anti-aircraft balloons day after day and 10,000 volunteer airplane watchers no longer scan the northern skies from Michigan to Labrador in shifts around the clock.

Returning to Sault Ste Marie after a years absence this reporter was newly impressed with the strategic importance of this town of 13,000 souls along the St. Marys river between Canada and the United States.

The war dept. released a news item at Washington a few days ago telling how more than 10,000 airplanes had been sent to Russia under lend lease. Highly significant fact approximately 5,000 of these were flown to Russia over the north circle route by way of Alaska. Delivery of Yank aircraft is being made in 1944 in this manner over the Bering sea between Alaska and Russia a route hereto considered by the public as barred to air transportation because of natural hazards.

Modern air power has annihilated space. Sault Ste Marie hub of the only international military zone on our North American continent is proof of this truth.

It was our privilege one year ago to inspect the army air defense headquarters here at the Soo. Then the peril of German raids across the northern circle from Europe was a military reality throughout the Upper peninsula and in many northern counties of Michigan as well as hundreds of distant outposts in Canada's vast wilderness. Volunteer airplane watchers were on the job each hour of the day ready to dispatch information by telephone to the Soo headquarters any minute an enemy plane was sighted.

This is well up on the list and indicates the efficient and successful campaign being waged by the women's Home Salvage Comm. whose county head is Mrs. Mildred Smith, and the Girl Scouts and their leaders. It is a record to be proud of.

Inquiry reveals that while the great shortage is in paper salvage, yet the saving of household fats is still necessary and there should be no let up in this respect.

CURRENT COMMENT

The game of allotment grabbing is going along nicely. We read that the Grand Rapids police last week arrested a woman who married three soldiers without bothering to divorce any and a little creek police got one who had married two. This seems to be a profitable occupation if you can get away with it but of course the Detroit girl who married 16 men without getting any divorces is still tops in the game.

The Huron-Clinton Parkway Project seems to be encountering difficulties here and there. They tried to start this summer by establishing a park near Belleville in Willow Run sector but were stopped when they went into court to condemn the land and the jury set too high a price on it. Now reports that Big and Little Portage Lake have been included in the project have caused property owners there to organize to fight it. When the project was first proposed everybody was for it. The plan was to build a scenic highway from Lake Erie along the Huron river, through Monroe, Washtenaw and Livingston counties to connect with one to be built along the Clinton river through the counties of Oakland and Macomb to Lake St. Clair. Bathing beaches and camping grounds were to be developed along the right-of-way. The project got a favorable vote in all 4 counties and also in Wayne. Gov. Kelly and Mayor Jeffreys both endorsed it and stated that more public parks and bathing beaches was the only way to prevent juvenile delinquency and race riots. The principal opposition comes from land owners in the area to be served by the project. They claim that making these exclusive restricted lake resorts public parks and building paved highways to them will attract the riffraff of Detroit and decrease the value of their investments. We think the Portage Lake people are unnecessarily alarmed. The map we have of the proposed Huron-Clinton project shows it only touching the southeastern corner of the county where the Huron empties into Portage Lake via Hamburg to the Oakland county line.

Gov. Bricker of Ohio, spoke out of turn at a press conference at Albany recently and Gerald L. K. Smith, seeing an opening took quick advantage of it. Gov. Bricker was asked if he would accept the support of Gerald L. K. and replied yes his vote would be counted too. Smith accepted this as an endorsement and called a meeting where he nominated himself as president and Bricker as vice president. All this made Gov. Bricker very hot and bothered and he made haste to repudiate Smith. Gov. Dewey also let out a blast against Smith and his attempt to link himself with the Republican vice presidential nominee.

Gov. Dewey let it be known at a recent governors conference that he selected will depend on industry to furnish jobs for the returning service men in contrast to the public works program sponsored by the Democrats. Will this be enough? President Hoover depends on industry to pull the country out of the depression during the 1928-32 period and they were not able to do it. Governors and other officials are apparently not any too confident of industry's ability to do so now and to that end have earmarked surplus funds for a big state building program after the war. The state of Michigan has such a sum set aside. Industry as far as domestic goods are concerned has been dormant for four years and it will be some getting on its feet again.

The prize story of the past week came from New York where a man named Rand got sore at his relatives and the world in general and left \$100,000 in cold cash to his pet cat. We see his will has been sustained, only the judge lopped off \$40,000 for a maid to care for the cat and see that it enjoys all the comforts of life. Ye Gods! In such cases as this the state should have the power to step in, seize the estate and distribute it for charitable purposes.



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



THE MICHIGAN MIRROR

Col. Norman A Nelson, commanding officer, led us into the control room where uniformed Wacs were on duty to receive telephone messages and to place signal flags upon a large flat regional map.

On his desk was a small globe. Col. Nelson picked it up. He pointed to Sault Ste Marie.

"Here is the most direct route from Europe to the United States," he said. "If an enemy wanted to attack us, the St. Mary's canal locks at the Soo would offer a vital target. Munition plants in the Mid-West - Detroit, Chicago and elsewhere would be next. Yes, the Soo is our front line defense. Remember the cities military ring of airports the connect strips of which Chicago and elsewhere would be next, ed in understanding.

It was Jacques Marquette, the Catholic explorer priest who established the first settlement of Europeans in Michigan at Sault Ste Marie
Thus you have the ever astonishing fact that this northern city antedates all but two cities on the North American continent and entirety of Michigan

Father Marquette founded a church for 2000 Indians who lived among the loud rapids of the river here. He had left France in 1666 at the age of 29. Marquette's arrival had been preceded by Etienne Brule the first man to reach the northern lakes who visited the rapids in 1612.

When the Jesuit priests first gazed upon this spot they are to have said "Sault" (falls) and later "Sainte Mary's believing that only the Blessed Virgin could possibly approach anything so beautiful

To the north lies the Canadian Laurentians for the most part a vast wilderness known to Canadians as the bush. The abundance of the whitefish in St. Mary's river together with the availability of maple sugar at Sugar Island had provided a paradise for the Chippewas.

To the west was Gitchie Gumee Lake Superior, the greatest body of fresh water in the world with a dept of 1300 feet 300 feet below Sea level. This was the land of Hiawatha made famous by Longfellow and first recorded by Henry Rowe Schoolcraft in his "Alcic Researches"

The tale of Sault Ste. Marie is the tale of an American northern frontier which saw in 1844, just a century ago, the sinking of the first shaft for copper at Copper Harbor in the Keweenaw peninsula. This led to the building of the Soo canal in 1855. Before this the boats were hauled over the portage (now Portage St.) Soo merchants opposed the canal on account of portage revenues. So did the army at Fort Brady for selfish reasons and Henry Clay denounced it in congress as a waste of money.

Capt. Eber Ward, largest steamship owner said the canal was too large. Now a ceaseless fleet of boats traverses the canal carrying iron ore to the blast furnaces of the nation.
