News and Items Concerning Our Boys Who Are Serving in the Armed Service

A telegram was received here Thursday, concerning PFC. Victor Sczycki stating that he had died of wounds received in France on Sept. 6th. He had been in the army three years and went overseas last December being based in England until the French invasion. He attended the Pinckney school and since the death of his father operated a small farm west of Pinckney. Surviving are his sister, Mrs. Eleanor Tomaszchick of Pinckney and his mother Mrs. Boze Chenevich of Waukegan, Ill. Victor is the fourth casualty among the boys who were inducted from Pinckney, Mich.

A telegram was received Tuesday by Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Dillon of Howell former local residents informing them of the death of their son, Jack, in a plane crash at Tucson, Arizona. His brothers, Patrick Jr. and William are also in the service.

Pinckney Loses a Close One

Pinckney High School Loses a Very Close Game To Ann Arbor Reserve Saturday Night

Pinckney high school football team lost a game by an eyelash to Ann Arbor high school reserve under lights at Wines Field, Ann Arbor, Saturday night. Pinckney outplayed their opponents and held a lead of 12 to 6 up to the last five minutes of play when Ann Arbor suddenly ploughed through their line for three first downs and forward passed for a touchdown to tie the score. A minute later they kicked goal for the winning point. With only a few minutes to go Pinckney completed two long passes to Jerry Ledwidge to take the ball to the Ann Arbor 35 yard line. At this point Ann Arbor put three men on Ledwidge who had made all of Pinckney's touchdowns and was the only successful passer and Pinckney's offenses collapsed.

Pinckney started off with a rush and made several first downs with Garth Meyer and Ross Lamb tearing off big gains through the line. In the shadow of the goal posts Ann Arbor held but Ledwidge caught a pass for a touchdown. They failed to kick goal for the extra point. Ann Arbor also hit the Pinckney line successfully and completed a long pass for a touchdown. They failed to kick goal.

Again Pinckney found the Ann Arbor line easy and got within striking distance where Ledwidge caught another pass over the goal line but again the kick for the extra point failed. Pinckney led at the half 12 to 6. In this half Pinckney got two breaks, once Ann Arbor got to the 20 yard line where they lost the ball on a fumble. A second time they got in the scoring zone when Pinckney stopped them by intercepting an Ann Arbor pass.

In the second half Pinckney seemed to become winded. Their punting game failed to click and most of their games were on passes caught by Ledwidge. Ann Arbor made some gains but were also getting thrown behind their line of skirmish for losses and forced to kick. It looked like a Pinckney victory but with 8 minutes of play Ann Arbor was forced to punt and got away a long one which landed near the Pinckney goal line. Pinckney did not gain in three attempts and punted. The punt was short landing near mid-field and Ann Arbor ran it back some distance. Then the Pinckney line which had performed handsomely failed to hold and Ann Arbor went on to victory. In their march they were aided by their wealth of material having some 60 or 70 men out in uniform enabling them to put fresh men against the tired Pinckney aggregation and wear them down.

It is a long time since Pinckney beat Ann Arbor about 8 years we believe. Last year Ann Arbor won 36 to 6.

CURRENT COMMENT

Two schools of thought seem to have arisen in regard to the disposition of Germany after the war. One headed by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau would split her up into small states, divest her of all industry and render her dependent on neighboring countries for subsistence. Secretary of State Hull is said to be again of the opinion that the other countries are not as highly developed in manufacturing and are dependent on Germany for an outlet for raw materials. The main idea is to leave and keep Germany in such a position that she will never again be able to launch another world war. The main difficulty is that we may again become softhearted and sympathetic and once more give Germany a chance to lose the war and win the peace treaty. At that the exponents of the hard plan have solid grounds for their idea. In ancient history as recorded in the Bible and other books when a nation was conquered she invariably remained conquered: Among the ancient cities destroyed so thoroughly that they vanished from the earth were Carthage, Troy and Babylon. History reads that all males were put to the sword, the women and children carried into captivity and the city burned, not a single stick or stone left standing. This method was cruel and crude but seems to have achieved the desired results.

The controlled press is calling the C. I. O. all the names they can think of because it is asking its members to contribute \$1 apiece towards President Roosevelt's reelection. Martin Dyes and other Roosevelt haters are frothing at the mouth at this dastardly plot. On another issue they are very quiet. This is the fight being made by the Committee for Constitutional Government to prevent naming all contributors who contributed \$100 apiece or more to it. This is an anti-Roosevelt organization, and a list of its membership would probably be a reprint of the old discredited Liberty League membership. Another objection on the die-hards have to the C. I. O. is that they are the only organization making a sincere effort to get the voters to register now for they know full well the larger the vote the greater the certainty of President Roosevelt's election.

This is said to be the latest Roosevelt story which is attributed to Walter Winchell. Adolph Hitler is said to have called all his top men to him and exclaimed "All is lost, I have made arrangements to be smuggled into Argentine and then to the United States as a private citizen." "Are you mad?" his advisors asked. "They will kill you in the United States. I know it," he sighed. "But there is one more thing I must do for the Fatherland." "What is that?" they asked. "Go to a theatre and boo Roosevelt in the newsreels," he answered.

The wiping out of 8000 British paratroopers at Arnhem bridge in Germany is probably the most tragic event of the war. Of the 8000 all were killed but 1800 who are prisoners of Germans. The paratroopers were dropped from planes to hold an important bridge until the infantry got there. The infantry encountered strong resistance and could not fight their way through so the paratroopers were sacrificed. They will be recorded in history with the members of the Light Brigade, The Defenders of the Alamo and soldiers of Gen. Custers heroic command.

The sudden death of Aimee Semple McPherson marks the end of the first woman to successfully combine sex and salvation according to Martin Bingham of the Detroit Free Press. She was the star of the female evangelists and probably would have become the glamor girl of the age if she had chosen Hollywood instead of the sawdust trail for a career. Heroin, numerous conversions and divorces, and one kidnapping, it is extremely doubtful if she conferred any lasting benefits towards the salvation of souls.




