World War 1 and 2 only 50 percent of the farm youth stayed on the farm. The rest went to the cities. Although there are many fine programs such as 4-H and high school agriculture courses they do not reach the majority of the farm youth.

One of the big advantages enjoyed in the cities are the libraries. On the other hand 42 percent of the rural people are without libraries.

Rural health in Michigan is not what it should be. Cities have full time health depts. but there are few in rural districts. More rural youths were rejected for military service than city youths.

Social insurance is provided for city residents but not for farmers. Only a small portion of farmers are included in the social security program. It should be extended to the farmers. The average person gets what he pays for. What's the answer? More taxes for farmers?

The solution includes two things. First a better income for farmers. Although they comprise one-fifth of the nation's population they only receive one-tenth of national income. Second—better education to assure better farming.

A reasonable balance must be maintained between city and farm income and standards of living.
