Douglas Plummer, son of Mrs. Lowitha Plummer of Pinckney is home on 30 days leave after spending ten months in the South Pacific. He served as gunner on a carrier-based Avenger bomber and was awarded the air medal and Oak Leaf cluster.

Attached to the Navy's Composite Squadron 97 aboard an air craft carrier of the Casablanca class, Plummer went on strafing and bombing missions, his targets often being only 200 yds. ahead of the infantry. It was his job to knock out enemy gun positions and troop concentrations which stood in the way of our foot soldiers during the island campaigns.

Doug. was in his first year at Pinckney high school when he and 4 other older boys enlisted. While attending school at Norman, Okla., he met a girl, Suzana Holke, a graduate of Oklahoma State College. They were married last week at Reno, Nev. At the end of his leave the young aviator reports to a grammar school at Norman, Oklahoma as instructor.

## Irving Latimer Died Last Week

Death Ends Career of Famous Mich. Lifer in Insane Asylum

The final was written to Michigan's most famous murder case last week when Irving Latimer died in the Elmore hospital for the insane near Detroit at the age of 80 years.

Latimer at one time was a resident of Stockbridge where his father was a druggist. The family moved to Jackson where Latimer took over the drug store at the age of 23 when his father died suddenly. He is said to have started on the prize-rose path and acquired a reputation for fastness. His mother was found murdered in their home in January 1889, shot twice and her head crushed. Latimer was supposed to be in Detroit visiting a underworld girl called Trixie. The police shattered this alibi. They proved Latimer went to Detroit from Jackson on an afternoon train and registered at the old Russell House but never used the room returning to Jackson on a night train and again to Detroit on an after midnight train, getting off at a water tank stop at West Detroit. The evidence was circumstantial but he was caught in many contradictions, convicted and sentenced to life. Trixie, his girl friend enjoyed a certain notriety for a time by being pointed out as Latimer's girl but eventually dropped out of sight. After four years Latimer was again in the limelight as he escaped after giving a guard a sleeping powder which killed him. He served 46 years in prison, the longest on record until the late Gov. Fitzgerald pardoned him in 1935 with great fanfare of publicity and the announcement Henry Ford had a job waiting for him. After 4 years he was picked up as a vagrant by Detroit police who found him sleeping in city parks. In 1940 Judge Patrick O'Brien found him insane and sent him to Eloise where he has since been. By a strange twist of fate he was buried in Jackson on the same lot with the mother he was convicted of killing.

## Michigan Mirror State News

In Which the Michigan Mirror Takes a Look at the Agricultural Side

Michigan's new Porcupine Mountain recreational area, which lies just to the west of Ontonagon along the shores of Lake Superior, is one of numerous park and recreational projects which are due for marked development during the coming post war years.

As you stand on top of one of the high escarpment and view the blue waters of the Lake of the Clouds, surrounded by a sky-line of mountain ridges, you begin to appreciate anew the vastness of Michigan and the importance of its new program of public recreation.

The Porcupine Mountain area with its 42,000 acre timber wilderness merits particular attention in the overall plan. As one of the few remaining wildernesses in Michigan, it may be the first to receive the benefit of a state-owned lodge and cabin where day-to-day tourists could obtain lodging and meals.

The beauty of the Porcupines, now unmarred by commercial resorts, already has provoked disagreement among some members of the state conservation commission and the department. The idea of the state going into the hotel business was bit startling at first until some one reminded that the state wasn't going to run the hotel but would merely build the property and lease it out to private hotel operators, such as the United States government has done for years at its national parks.

In fact, even the state ownership and operation of a resort is a bit old-fashioned, for the State of Michigan already owns and operates a number of group camps at the Yankee Springs recreational area near Hastings, half-way between Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo, and at the Waterloo project near Jackson.

The Porcupine lovers were disturbed last October when a group of hotel owners ascended the mountain to a particularly high escarpment where there is a commanding view of the Lake of the Clouds. Hotel went into raptures of enthusiasm. One top operator went so far as to select the site for the state lodge. It happened to be the best view of the lake, of course, and thence would offer considerable appeal to lodge guests.

While a hotel operator is inclined to think of making a business pay its own way and earn a profit too, for his endeavors and risks, the ardent Porcupine lover shudders at the thought of a choice vista being preempted by a public hostelry.

Ontonagon boosters have their own ideas too. We're not letting the cat out of the bag when we say it is a swimming pool on top of the hill next to the proposed hotel.

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



ty highway commission went into the park business they found that the general public was not satisfied with a fine club house, choice food, a radio, bridge etc but wanted diversion so a million dollar golf course was scraped out of the woods.

How to keep the Porcupines a wilderness and yet provide modern attractions is a riddle. Among the suggestions are build bridge paths and provide a tent city.

Winter skiing is another suggestion. Wisconsin built a mammoth club house at Rib Mt. for skiers & development program for the land hundreds flock there by special trains.

The recreational business is only 26 years old in Michigan and in that time the state has acquired 43,000 acres of land for park use. There are 42,000 acres in the Porcupines and 17,000 in the Waterloo Yankee Springs recreational areas and in 1944 the Mich. legislature appropriated \$3,000,000 to buy 100,000 acres in southern Michigan.

The state dept. has a five year development program for the land calling for expenditure of \$16,316,529. Recreation has become a big business in Michigan and if those enjoy it pay a small fee it can be made to pay part of its way.
