Michigan Mirror State News

News and Happenings of the State Tereley Told from Lansing

There's gold in the reservations of outstanding historical landmarks.

Such is the experience of nearby states such as Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois and Ohio, all of which have purchased and are maintaining unusual historical sites and properties as a part of the states recreational service to the public.

Michigan, the leading tourist state in the midwest has lagged in this field. As we pointed out last week, historical Fort Mackinac at Mackinac Island is under state ownership and control, is perhaps the best known tourist spot of the entire state. It provided the setting for the 1945 governor's national conference last July.

Through the efforts of county boards, supervisors, historical societies and interested citizens many historical sites in Michigan have been suitably marked and thus memorialized with tablets and monuments but few original properties have been preserved.

In addition to old Fort Drummond and the Mormon printing press on Beaver Island here are many historical landmarks that would appeal greatly to Michigan people and out state tourists. There is a stretch of the old Clinton-Kalamazoo barge canal between Utica and Rochester which still survives today as a relic of the century old spirit.

Part of it is used by the Utica Milling Co. for water power. Michigan purchased part of it for the Southeastern Michigan recreational program.

This canal was started in 1839 to provide transportation by boat from Lake St. Clair via the Clinton and Kalamazoo rivers to Lake Michigan. Michigan's boy governor Stearns T. Mason headed the movement. When the money ran out the canal was abandoned.

In Indiana the state is acquiring 14 miles of the old Whitewater canal between Brookville and Laurel as a historical memorial.

This state has acquired the following properties as historical recreational tourist spots: George Rogers Clark memorial, Nancy Hanks Lincoln memorial, Corydon State Capital memorial, James F. D. Lanier memorial, old Goshen Church memorial, Pigeon Roost memorial, Tippecanoe Battlefield memorial and Wilbur Wright birthplace memorial.

In Wisconsin the preservation of historical landmarks is conducted by the conservation commission. They are preserving the following: Nelson Dewey memorial park at Caseville; Cushing memorial park at Delafield; Tower Hill memorial, Spring Green.

Other Michigan historical spots are oldest covered bridge, oldest remaining pioneer water power mill, restoration of a lumber camp in the north Michigan woods and lumber

CURRENT COMMENT

People are beginning more and more to consider Halloween as just another nuisance day and many wish that there would be some way evolved of doing away with it even to the extent of revising the calendar to give October but 30 days. Not a great deal of damage was done here in comparison to other years. The usual windows were soaped and in some cases waxed. Out buildings were tipped over and rubbish strewn around. The sheriff received several calls and in some cases householders shot in the air to scare marauders. A few cars were tampered with but in the main no serious damage was done in the village. However, between here and Gregory someone threw a gourd through the window of the 9 p.m. Lansing-Ann Arbor bus and a woman passenger had her eye injured by flying glass. Ann Arbor police report 38 complaints ranging from broken windows, opening hydrants and removing manhole covers in Detroit one person got too much joy juice and turned in 12 false fire alarms before the police got him. The youth of the land are entitled to work off their surplus energy in some way but not in damaging property.

The wage controversy between labor and industry still rages but there is one ray of light in the situation. That is the persistent rumors that the Ford Motor Co. is about to announce a wage boost. The story is that Harry Bennett had always been antagonistic to labor. Henry Ford II is said to be sympathetic and has let out hints of a wage boost. It is claimed that reason Bennett was dropped and replaced by men who will carry on a more liberal policy. All remember that back when Henry Ford announced his \$5 per day minimum although he was severely castigated by industry in general for this radical venture all industrialists had to eventually do likewise as a measure of self protection.

The law enforcing agencies are finding themselves unable to cope with the increasing crime wave springing up about them. Oakland county now has two unsolved murders on her hands with no apparent solution in sight. In both cases the victims were women and the bodies were so badly mutilated as to suggest a sex prevert. Still a considerable sum of money is missing in both cases which supports the theory the crimes were premeditated. Oakland county has been unable to solve them and called in the state police and Detroit police force. Windsor has not as yet solved her numerous murders of a few months ago. War always seems to arouse what is base and criminal in some persons and the killer instinct aroused by battle always results in a crime wave after each war.

Pinckney will banquet her high school football team again this year whether they win a Class "D" football title or not. The team will probably finish with a winning record this year. The team is not as strong as last year but their schedule is tougher. They won their first three games from Brighton. Ann Arbor reserves and St. Mary's of Ann Arbor in good shape and then lost to Thomas of Ann Arbor who were stronger than last year. They should have beaten Stockbridge in their next game but had an off day and lost two touchdowns on referee's rulings and the game ended in 19-19 tie. Michigan Center outclassed them and they never had a chance against this Class "C" organization. With only a limited amount of material available this year Pinckney has not made a bad showing all things considered.

railroad, numerous Indian mounds. These historical land marks would enrich the tourist industry but the major handicap is lack of funds as the 1945 legislature has cut the \$3,000,000 to \$1,000,000. The Mich. conservation dept. now has 5000 acres of land to handle and finds itself short of money for the purpose.

If historical landmarks are to be acquired action must start with the local governments, private raised funds and memorial gifts. Later on these could be turned over to the state for maintenance.
