## News Items of Boys in Service

"In order to avoid errors in record it will be necessary for any male person who presents himself for registration at the office of the Selective Service Board to bring his birth certificate or a baptismal record with him on his 18th birthday."

Capt. Walter Mercer, recently discharged from the army, has resumed his medical practice at East Lansing, Michigan.

J. Murphy, who has been in service at Pearl Harbor and other foreign places for three years has been discharged and is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Murphy.

## RAILROAD STRIKE

Last Friday the entire nation was brought sharply to its senses by a long heralded railroad strike of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen. This had long been expected but had been staved off by truces several times. Its effects were quickly felt in the nation and Washington went into action and did what it should have done months ago. It took over the railroads and drafted the men to operate them. This took some time and only a few trains were run late Saturday night.

The effects caused by the strike had never been experienced before in the nation. The postoffice was ordered to take nothing but first class mail and Pinckney was without all papers and magazines except such as were delivered by trucks. Bread, which had been getting very scarce, disappeared entirely. So did meat and other articles. Factories began closing right and left. The Brown-McLaren Co. at Hamburg has shut down for two weeks. At Zeeland and other places the chick hatcheries were unable to get rid of their newly hatched chicks and had to drown thousands of them.

A number of Howell people attended the Baptist convention at Grand Rapids. All who came by train were stranded and those who arrived by auto were kept on the anxious seat by the rumor that also prevailed here that the sale of gasoline would be stopped at midnight Friday by Congressional order. The railroad tracks quickly gathered rust. The last train out of Detroit for Chicago Friday night was operated entirely by white collar superintendents who had been former engineers, firemen, etc.

The strike was broken Saturday night but it was not until Monday that the trains resumed anything like normal schedules.

The entire condition of affairs is ridiculous. We have more wheat on hand than ever before yet there is no bread. There are more beef cattle but there is no meat. There is plenty of steel but no new autos, except for a small trickle. There is plenty of timber but no lumber for new homes, etc., all down the line. The golden rule and brotherly love have been junked and everybody is trying to take advantage of the other fellow. Don't blame it all on the C.I.O. auto workers for they are not the ones who are keeping the beef, wheat and cotton off the market until the prices rise higher.

Bronze plaques bearing the name of employees who lost their lives in the war were dedicated at the services held simultaneously at Detroit, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Ann Arbor, Pontiac, Flint, Saginaw, Traverse City and Muskegon. Relatives of those who died in the service were special guests.

Sixty-five Mich. Bell employees died for their country during the war and one is still on the list of missing. At one time the company had 3,062 in uniform. The number is now down to 400.

## CURRENT COMMENT

William J. Cameron, one of the nations great journalists and afterwards head of the Henry Ford publications and radio commentator for 20 years, is getting into difficulties in his old age. He was invited to deliver the commencement address at Dearborn high school this year but the invitation has been withdrawn on demand of the entire student body there of 500 who threatened to go on a strike, and not attend the commencement exercises at all if he talked. The cause of this action is that he has been writing for the "Flag and the Cross", official magazine of Gerald L. K. Smith and his America First party and for Howard Rand's religious magazine, Dearborn students denounced him as a fascist and will have none of him.

William J. Cameron is probably like the pupils I saw went to the mound too often. He is evidently on the down grade. We heard him at the inter-city banquet at Fowlerville several years ago and were not overly impressed. He lambasted both Democrat and Republican parties but had no program of his own.

For shortsightedness and inability to see beyond their nose we believe the D.A.R. beats all other organizations. At their recent convention at Atlantic City attended by 2,000 delegates an attempt to amend their law that only white persons may appear in their Constitution Hall, Washington, D. C., was voted down and Mrs. Vana of New Jersey was jeered and booed when she proposed it. The occasion of this action was the refusal of the D. A. R. to allow Hazel Scott, a Negro grand opera singer to sing in their hall on a program. To our knowledge no church, fraternal organization except the D.A.R. bars Negroes from programs sponsored by them. This stubborn attitude of the D. A. R. has placed them in a very unfavorable light in the nation.

This organization cropped up right after the civil war when the negroes under direction of the northern carpet baggers, took over the south as a result of disenfranchisement of the people of the south, committed many outrages state of California. At Washington it was a sort of vigilante committee, directed entirely against the negroes. Gen. Bedford Forest, noted Confederate general, was its first head. It failed to function as intended and General Forest soon resigned saying its membership was using it to vent private spite. It died out and did not revive until after World War I when it became a political tool and elected one mayor of Detroit and several others to lesser offices. Its power was again shortlived as organizations founded on bigotry and prejudice always are and its reign will be brief this time.

In the Republican race for governor Raymond J. Kelly, former national legion head is making a strong campaign and is getting the most favorable publicity. He is appealing to the war veterans and if they all get up and work for him he may surprise the election prophets who incline to Vernon Brown. Mr. Brown has not received a great deal of favorable publicity. Never a crusader he has refused to commit himself on the important problems of the day, contenting himself with promising efficiency and economy in government.

Kim Sigler does not seem to have much organization behind him and talks mostly of legislative graft. He has promised sensational revelations and that he will name the men who are big rips and the real graft heads. But as the weeks pass and he fails to do so his campaign attracts less and less attention.


