State Trolley Told from Lansing News and Happenings of the

In the 1946 version of the old political melodrama "Throw the Rascal Out!" Michigan voters will have a choice of two climatic endings on Nov. 5.

First, the election of Klm Sigler graft busting crusader. Republican nominee.

Second, election of Murray D. Pat VanWagoner who made his reputation on better roads, the Democrat nominee.

Each nominee is pledged to purify Lansing which is a coincidence and makes the forthcoming campaign of novel interest.

At the Democrat state convention at Lansing VanWagoner pilloried Gov. Kelly's administration as being ridden with graft and corruption.

When it comes to throwing out the rascals Sigler is no amateur. His primary campaign was predicated on a pledge to do just that and he pictured Lansing as a cess pool of iniquity. The state convention adopted his plea by discarding all Kelly followers: Dignan, Dethmers and Morrison, only sparing D. Hale Brake who bucked the Michigan National Bank interests in the legislature.

Now these 3 Kelly followers can hardly be called rascals. But they opposed Sigler in the primary and so became candidates for the ashcan. It is just about as simple as that.

The VanWagoner slate makers gave the upper peninsula two places on the ballot. Thurman Doyle for attorney general and Marvin L. Coon of Escanaba for auditor general.

Sigler's advisors, mostly members of the state bar, favored lawyers, only one of the 6 men on the state Republican ticket is not a lawyer, Fred M. Alger Jr., 39, grand son of Gen. Russell A. Alger, civil war general, governor, United States Senator and secretary of war. All 6 live in the lower peninsula: Battle Creek, Dearborn, Stanton, Jackson, Detroit, Port Huron and Grosse Pointe.

Indicating a strategy to woo Wayne county the Democrats named 2 men from there. John Bannigan for secretary of state and John Kosaren for state treasurer.

There will be three amendments on the November ballot. One is little known. It would allow the state to spend money on internal improvements such as airports. 2. the sales tax diversion to cities and townships amounting to 40 million dollars and 3rd the veteran's bonus totalling 270 million dollars.

CURRENT COMMENT

The legislature should let well enough alone. In 1945 they passed a law prohibiting law enforcement officers from engaging in the liquor business. The result was that mayors, supervisors, councilmen, aldermen etc who were in the liquor business were ordered to get out or resign their offices. Great pressure has been brought to bear on the legislature with the result that the legislature tried to change the law so that it applied only to sheriffs, deputies, marshalls and members of the police dept. We can't see the distinction. Mayors, village presidents etc are also charged with law enforcement. The original law was a good one and should be let alone.

At the special session of the legislature a Veteran's Bonus was approved and will be on the ballot for vote in November. It was approved by the state 27 to 0. The cost is 270 million dollars. Veterans will be paid \$10 a month for domestic service and \$15 a month for foreign service and \$500 is the maximum. Those who served 60 days would be eligible if they had acquired residence in Michigan prior to service. It will be paid by a bond issue. It will undoubtedly pass as the argument that service men risked their lives for \$50 a month while those who stayed home made twice as much as that a week is a strong one and most persons feel the boys who served should be recompensed.

During the hot days the old swimming hole here was a popular place and the youth enjoyed its cooling waters several times a day. Some of them claim they got skin infection and say some of the citizens are dumping sewerage in the waters, if so it should be investigated. In some places skin diseases are caused by a small like parasite which infests the beaches and the dept. of conservation has spent considerable money to irradiate it. Swimming activity has caused some tragedy as numerous drownings are reported. In Detroit a 32 year old man who accepted a dare to swim across the Detroit river, collapsed and drowned before he reached the other side. Swimmers should be very careful not to take any chances especially in waters about which they know little.

Gilbert Madden who has been superior of Dexter township for some years, threw a bombshell last week at a session of the Washtenaw county board of supervisors. He demanded an investigation of the expenditures of Judge Breakey's grand jury investigating gambling there. It took the members by surprise but they were able to defeat it by one vote. So far about \$9000 has been spent. This is a pittance compared to the cost of the Ingham county grand jury. Mr. Madden is an old style official and has no use for new fangled things like grand juries. Unlike Senator Johnson of Mt. Clemens, who conducted the Ingham grand jury investigation, his record is spotless and never has the breath of suspicion been directed toward him. Nicknamed the "Watchdog of the Washtenaw county treasury, an appropriation of which he does not approve passes only over his dead body. He is probably the best posted man on taxes in the county.

The amendment to return one third of the sales tax to the cities and townships will be on the ballot this fall. John Espie, veteran legislator warns that school aid will be cut to the bone if this sales tax split bill passes. The legislature allowed a 15 percent rent boost. The Detroit Free Press does not expect any big rent boost as the federal government is expected to pass a rent control act next month freezing rents at June 30 level. Last week, 2 women's delegations, one representing landlords and the other tenants engaged in a fist fight and hair pulling in the state capitol.
