News and Happenings of the State Told from Lansing

Michigan's Lake Huron shore region from Bay City south old Cheboygan is bustling with activity this year.

City dwellers are buying lake lots with sandy beaches and a clear view of the blue waters of Lake Huron.

Cottages and cabins are going up as fast as material can be obtained.

This East Michigan section, the last in Michigan to be developed, is served by a scenic shore highway-US 23 Taft Memorial highway. It skirts the shore at AuGres and continues along the lake to Cheboygan the northern terminus.

While sand dunes obstruct the view of the lake Michigan shore line Lake Huron has no such barriers.

Overnight cabins are plentiful and modern along Lake Huron.

First stop after Bay City is Pinconning, noted for choice cheese, then Standish specializing in sugar beets and dairying. Saginaw Bay, 7 miles away is noted for fine duck shooting.

Next is Au Gres, a French settlement, 14 miles north is Alabaster, where a huge gypsum quarry is operated. The twin towns of Tawas City and East Tawas are next. A fine state park is located here.

Going north we visit AuSable and Oscoda. On a trip north is the lumberman's Memorial, modeled by Robert Aitken of New York and donated by 73 descendants of Michigan pioneers.

Harrisville has a fine state park on Lake Huron of 12 acres.

Alpena has a strong tourist boom. It makes gun breeches and concrete machinery.

From Presque Isle to Rogers City, the shore line is owned by the Michigan Limestone and Chemical Co. branch of the U. S. Steel. We visited their 5 mile long quarry which is operated by electric shovels, trains etc and has a 14 story screening building. Here the limestone is screened from floor to floor. The limestone goes by boat all over the nation.

### ARTHUR J. FORNER

Arthur J. Forner, 58, died unexpectedly Friday of a heart attack at his home in Ann Arbor.

He was born in Sharon township, Washtenaw county, Feb. 18, 1888, being the son of Peter and Emmeline Congdon Forner. He married Miss Joanna Devereaux of Pinckney on Feb. 15, 1916 and was employed as conductor on the Detroit-Jackson & Chicago electric railroad until it was discontinued in 1930. Since then he has driven an Ann Arbor city bus.

He was a member of St. Thomas Catholic Church and Holy Name Society.

Surviving are the widow and two sons, James and Charles, two grand children. Also a brother, Albert, of Chelsea.

The funeral was held from St. Thomas church, Ann Arbor, Monday morning with the burial in St. Mary's cemetery, Pinckney.

## CURRENT COMMENT

In glancing through the Livingston County Press of last week in their notes of 35 years ago an account of St. Mary's annual picnic at Pinckney which was held here each August for over 40 consecutive years and became famous all over the state for its fine chicken dinners and noted speakers. During its existence most of the prominent men of Michigan were on its programs. 35 years ago James Green was listed as toast master. The speakers were Charles Jasiowski, Wayne county prosecutor, later congressman and Senator James Jace of Detroit. He was only 21 then, the youngest state senator in the history of the state. The North Lake band was to play and the ball game was Pinckney vs Howell. In conversation with Frank Shields, Howell attorney who acted as toastmaster at many of the picnics as did his father before him, he expressed a regret at the passing of this annual county affair and said that most of the lawyers of Livingston county had been launched on their careers from the speakers platform at St. Mary's picnic for the past 40 years. These picnics were cancelled when the war started, due to transportation and a \$12 assessment paid by each family. The picnic meant a lot of hard work and the parish is well satisfied with the arrangement and there is no immediate likelihood of the picnic being resumed.

The press gave President Truman a severe panning when he intervened in the Missouri primary fight against Clegg, an Anti-New Deal Democrat and predicted Truman's repudiation by a victory by Slaughter, are now out on a limb as Slaughter lost. Cong. Michener, a Republican from the Mich. second district, says the president is justified in his stand Slaughter was on the infant rules committee of 12 members and by aid of 5 southern members was able to bottle up all important legislation.

The president told the voters if he Slaughter, right I am wrong. The victor over Slaughter is Fred Astle, a service man 35 years old.

One hears but little of efforts to our outside labor from Michigan any more. There is evidently much more labor here than the people can or care to do. This year 6000 Mexicans were brought in to harvest the cherries. Then they will be used in the peach, sugar beet, carrot and onion harvests. They get from \$8 to \$10 a day and are well treated compared to former conditions. Quite a few of them are women. Years ago the railroads were the principal importers of foreign labor as Americans did not want that kind of work. Later the sugar beet industry and others followed suit. More & more we seem to be becoming a class of white collared workers.

The murder of Mrs. Alberta Rose Young who was found dead on a lonely road in Oakland county last October is marked unsolved at Edward Belton the only suspect was released last week. The murder of Mrs. Lydia Thompson of Orchard Lake was also unsolved.

Bob Singer for Pinckney allowed that he had reopened the unsolved murder case of Senator Albert Hooper of Albion, slain on a much traveled road near Lansing last year. Dick Tracy or Vic Keen, the detectives who never fail should be called in on these cases.

Pensions of Spanish war veterans have been boosted 20 percent in some cases. Those eligible are those who served 90 days or less, partially disabled, those 65 years old, and those who served in the Philippines and Boxer rebellions.

The Kent county board of supervisors has ignored the order of Judge Brown to pay the claims of the Alt County for 5 veterans funerals and will stand suit. They claim the funerals were from \$400 to \$600 each.

Some persons have claimed the only way to settle the question was intermarriage. In New York last week, Fr. Divine, the founder of the Colored Heavens, was married to a 21 year old white girl. He is said to be 82. A colored wife can also be welcomed a white wife he married in England at the dock in New York City last week.


