If the proposed sales tax split had been in effect this year Mich. would have been \$5 million in the red according to Fred Striffler, Mich. Budget director.

This would have happened if the state had continued to perform its duly authorized services. The alternative would have been drastic economy by slashing appropriations for hospitals, asylums, welfare etc.

Budget making is postponed until after Nov. 5. If the amendment passes all appropriations must be slashed. The legislature would be forced to do one of two things—vote new taxes or curtail public service.

On this account all state officials having to do with finance are against the sales tax diversion. These include Auditor Gen. Morrison, Treas. Hale Brake, Sen. VanderWerp, chairman of the finance com. and Rep. John Espie of the house ways and means com. Gov. Kelly is shortly expected to issue a blast against it.

Neither candidate for governor has so far expressed his views on the subject.

The Mich. Educational Association can be expected to put up a stiff battle for the amendment. They will point out it is the only thing that will save the Michigan school system from complete collapse. This would be a bonanza to rural schools and some would get more money than they need, tending to modernize the schools at state expense. Even in the amendment loses the MEA can use it as a bargaining lever to get more state aid in 1947.

## \$500 Scholarship Is Offered

Pinckney V. F. W. Post 7301 Offers \$500 Scholarship

The V. F. W. Post No. 7301 of Pinckney will offer a \$500 scholarship to some member of the graduating class of 1947. This scholarship will pay the cost of books and tuition to any institution of higher learning that the applicant may choose to enter. It will not be withdrawn unless the applicant leaves the institution or fails to maintain a 'C' average while in attendance.

Each member of this years Senior Class, who has a 'C' average or better for the first semester of this year, will be given a standardized intelligence test in January. Each of these Seniors who maintains a 'C' average during the second semester will be given a similar test in May.

The Senior with the highest total score on both tests will be offered the scholarship, if this person does not desire it, the second highest will have the opportunity of accepting it. The grades received by the seniors in their 3 previous high school years do not in anyway determine the winner of this Scholarship as it will be based entirely upon this years work and the results of the 2 tests. It is believed by members of the V.F.W. that all Seniors could maintain a 'C' average if they so desired. Therefore all Seniors should have an equal chance of winning the Scholarship.



## CURRENT COMMENT

In a speech at Columbus, Ohio, last week Harry B. Ervin, president of the National W. C. T. U., said "Prohibition is not the goal of the society." This is the oldest active temperance organization and her remarks made most of the front pages as prohibition has always been the goal of temperance organizations. Miss Ervin urged a reduction in the number of places licensed and that places which can only be reached by an auto be not licensed. Prohibition failed because you cannot legislate morality into people by force. It was put over principally by the efforts of the Anti-Saloon League who sold big business on the idea it would increase production. When it did not accomplish this big business with drew their financial backing and repeal followed.

Meat dealers are predicting another meat shortage and that rationing may be resumed now that meat ceiling prices have been restored. Live stock receipts dropped 50 percent in Detroit last week and in the main a very inferior grade of cattle & hogs were received. The government claims they know where large stocks of meat are held in storage and will seize it if black marketeers get possession of it. This meat scarcity is nothing more than a strike by beef and pork raisers for higher prices in the same way that labor unions strike for higher wages.

Peaches are a bumper crop this year and last week Benton Harbor, the center of the peach belt, shipped its millionth bushel last week, the earliest on record for that city. Prices on account of the big supply have dropped from \$5.00 to \$2.50 a bushel. The cherry and strawberry crop were both short but the peach crop should partly atone for this. Apples are also said to be plentiful which should be good news for cider mill owners which have been shut down for several years on account of no apples.

When Abraham prepared to sacrifice his son to the Lord according to the Old Testament because nothing else was available, a stray sheep suddenly showed up and saved the day. Since that time something or other has always turned up in the times of great emergency to save the day. We can remember when the 7 year locust was supposed to devour all crops and leave the people to die of starvation. This failed to happen. Then hordes of army worms were expected to arrive and destroy every living bit of vegetation. This did not come to pass. Not long ago the electric power workers were to go on strike and paralyze the nation but somehow they did not. This nation weathered crisis after crisis and will probably continue to do so. Frank Leahy, Detroit News columnist says either labor or capital can pull the switch and plunge the nation into chaos but neither dares.

From time immemorable Mohamed Jan: have sworn by the beard of the prophet, one hair of which was kept in a locked casket and shown once a year to the faithful. Now this has turned up missing, as the casket has been found to be empty. So Mohammedians have been swearing the past year by something which did not exist.

Last June the Pinckney village council for some devious reason quit publishing their council proceedings in the Pinckney Dispatch where they have appeared for the past 50 years or more. Since then all is mystery. We hear rumors of a zoning ordinance, one prohibiting curb gasoline tanks and an anti-peddling ordinance (2 peach peddlers were ordered off Pinckney streets last week.) Who can say. In the meantime secrecy prevails. The school board has also adopted secrecy and quit publishing the minutes of their meetings.




