News and Happenings of the State Told from Lansing

Public education in Michigan is critically in need of funds. The sales tax amendment would guarantee the schools revenue for a reasonable program," states Dr. A. J. Phillips, sec. of the Mich. Education Association.

"The Board of Education speaking for its 81,000 members has unanimously endorsed the proposed constitutional amendment No. 2 because it offers the only immediate hope to save the schools from further curtailment," he added.

"Providing a good education for the million Michigan school children should be the concern of every citizen. Schools suffered during the war and their plight has grown worse, teachers have continued on other jobs, new candidates are few because teachers' salaries have not kept pace with living conditions."

"The housing situation in schools is critical. Crowded rooms, classes in basement, half day sessions are cheating many children out of an adequate education. These things plus antiquated heating and ventilating systems are endangering the health of many pupils."

The sales tax amendment would guarantee at least \$92,000,000 of state aid to the schools and go a long way toward meeting current needs or salaries, supplies, equipment and class rooms.

"A very conservative estimate places the need for schools at \$104,000,000 a year. This includes teachers salaries and would raise them to the level set by State Civil Service for Teachers and would also increase wages of other employees level with the costs of living.

During the war \$5,150,000 was spent a year. This leaves a balance of \$18,260,000 for a school building program. This was a tremendous drop from the \$23,040,000 spent annually from 1923 to 1938.

Thus \$18,260,000 is not as much as has been spent annually over a 20 year period. A survey by the state dept. of instruction shows immediate needs for new class rooms at prevailing prices would cost \$92,701,000 to build. Summary is as follows:

Salaries, supplies, equip. \$86,262,405  
Building needs 18,260,000  
Total \$104,522,405

"There is every reason to believe that future sales tax revenues will be sufficient to meet all reasonable state expenditures. We could afford billions for war. We can at least afford \$100 a year per school child."

### COMSTOCK-LIVERMORE

### COMPANY WINS SUIT

The state supreme court has upheld the Mich. Bell Telephone Co. in its contention that retroactive rate adjustments are illegal and set aside an order of the Mich. Public Service Com. directing the company to refund \$3,500,000 to customers on the 1944 bills.

The court affirmed a decision of Judge Leland Carr while on the lag-ham circuit bench and invalidated refunds totalling \$7 million and also refunds of \$3,500,000 for 1945. The court held the commission exceeded its powers in attempting to enforce its order retroactively.

A commission order directing the company to reduce its rates by some \$4,500,000 is before Judge Paul Egor of Lansing for decision.

The company claims its earnings are not sufficient to justify an adjustment and a rate cut would peril its existence.

Mrs. Rebecca Shirley, 91, died at the home of her son, Albert, Thursday. Her husband, Thomas, died in 1944. She came here 12 years ago with her son from Marquette. Surviving are a son, Albert, Pinckney, Ind., and a daughter, Mrs. William W. Smith, and 18 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held from the Cong'l. church Sunday, Rev. W. J. Nash officiating. Burial was in the Pinckney cemetery.

## Is Found Dead Saturday

Body of Lucien McCluskey Is Found in McCluskey Lake Saturday

Late Saturday afternoon the body of Lucien McCluskey, 53, who has spent his entire life in this community except when he was in the army in World War I was taken from McCluskey Lake on the farm where he had spent the greater part of his life. He was the son of the late James and Mary McCluskey and was born on the farm where he was found dead. His occupation was farming and he operated the McCluskey farm until the death of his mother about 3 years ago when the farm was purchased by Ray Burns, a brother-in-law. After working the John Fohey farm a year, he has made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Louis Coyle when in this vicinity and worked around. He was employed by a riding stable at Northville most of the summer, returning to the Coyle home several weeks ago.

Enlisting in the aircraft division of the army July 1918, he was stationed in Oregon. In Jan. 1919 he was given an honorable discharge.

Last Monday afternoon of last week, he was in Pinckney between 3 and 4 p.m. and rode out to the intersection of the Howell-Pinckney and Reason Road, just past the McCluskey farm where he got out and said he was going down the road about a mile to see Dean Gardner, an old neighbor. As far as is known this was the last time he was seen alive. He would have had to pass the lake to get to the Gardner farm. As he was often absent for long periods no search was made when he did not return to the Coyle home.

He never reached the Gardner farm. Last Saturday two fishermen, one from Toledo and one from Detroit stopped at the McCluskey farm and got permission to fish in the lake. They found the body floating near the surface and Sheriff Kennedy at Howell was called and recovered the corpse. Identification was not made at once. Coroner Harold Borden was called and decided death was due to accidental drowning. At the request of the family a postmortem was performed by Dr. Black of the state police of East Lansing a the Swarthout funeral home Sunday night. No skull fracture was found or wounds but there were bruises on the head. The vital organs were taken to Lansing for examination.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. Ray Burns of Pinckney and two brothers, Leo, of Detroit and Bernard of Los Angeles, California besides nieces and nephews. The funeral was held Monday morning from St. Mary's church, Rev. Francis Murphy officiating. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery.

### TELEPHONE PRIORITIES

(7) Service essential to military service, reconversion, employment and food production.

(8) Residence service for returned veterans and wives.

(9) All other applications for main residence service.

(10) Residence extension phones.

## Defeated at Brighton Fri.

Pinckney Beats Opening Game Jo Brighton Friday Night 34 to 6

The dedication of the new Lighted Sloan Memorial Field at Brighton last Friday night was a 100 percent success as some 1400 tickets were sold and the largest crowd ever to witness a football game in Brighton was present. Two W.J.K. commentators, Jack Dinnman and Bob Rowley, broadcast the game. Pop Thurston's wife and drum corp of Hamburg and the Detroit Curstone band played and paraded and to cap it all Brighton who had lost to Pinckney 2 years in a row, trampled Pinckney 34 to 6.

Pinckney started a team which only contained 4 of last year's starting team and got away badly. They did not run back the kickoff & fumbled inside their 25 yard line. Brighton recovered and forward passed for a touchdown and extra point in the opening minutes. Pinckney fumbled again the first quarter and again Brighton recovered and scored. The Pinckney team seemed demoralized by Brighton passes and Brighton led at the half 27 to 0. Pinckney did not make a first down.

In the second half Pinckney got going and held Brighton practically even, scoring 6 points to Brighton's 7. In this half they were aided by numerous penalties called against Brighton, including 4 15 yard ones for clipping, holding etc. Pinckney completed 2 passes in this period, caught by Ken Bowman and Jim Meyer. Dick Young intercepted a Brighton pass and ran it back to the 20 yard line where Joe Burns took a pass over the goal line after a series of punishes. The kick to convert the extra point failed.

Kreider, Brighton end, caught a pass and ran 80 yards for a touchdown only to have it called back because a teammate was decced holding.

Pinckney used a light team this year which is not unusual as they are usually outweighed by their opponents. They looked weak in tackling and blocking and for this reason their offense bogged down. The local fans were gloomy the first half but perked up the last half when Pinckney played a marvellous defensive game and finally scored.

Sunday night they play the Ann Arbor Little Flyers at Wines Field under lights and will have another hard contact. They won last year from Ann Arbor by one point.

### CONSERVATION DEPT.

The pheasant was established as a game bird in Michigan 39 years ago this October when the state game farm at Mason was purchased. Private releases had however been made in Michigan since 1895. Pheasant production reached a peak of 42,300 eggs and 3,800 birds in 1919. Production has since continued on a reduced scale. This year it was 10,000 birds and 10,000 eggs with the Mich. State Prison cooperating in raising the birds.

There are no rules on firearms this year, different from last. Only shotguns may be used on waterfowl of 10 gauge or smaller bore of a capacity of not more than 8 shells.

At the Sept. sale of state lands, the state sold 57,247 acres at \$388,871. In Minnesota this year only one deer of either sex may be killed by a hunter.

Oct. 5 is the last day to apply for a permit to hunt deer in Allegan hunter.

## CURRENT COMMENT

The Brighton Argus states that the water power property Henry Ford owns there is for sale and we presume the Pinckney property purchased 25 years ago is also. The Ford Ford property at Dexter has had a For Sale sign on it for some time. Thus endeth a fond dream. Some 80 years ago when labor troubles were beginning to be noticeable Henry Ford envisaged a chain of small factories on water power properties in small towns making Ford parts. During slack times the workers would work on farms, giving them perpetual employment and there would be no incentive to strike. A number of such small factories were built at Sharon, Saline, Milan, Brooklyn, Manchester, Northville and other places but alas they were not immune to labor troubles. Now Mr. Ford is past 80 and no longer active in the affairs of the company and those that are, are abandoning small factory projects. The Detroit papers have just revealed that 20 years ago Henry Ford purchased 6 business blocks on Michigan Ave. opposite the Michigan Central depot in Detroit and intended to erect a huge business center. This came to light last week when the Oakwood Realty Co. sued the Friskorn Co. who are handling it for running it at a \$2,000,000 a year loss. The Ford Co. admitted it but said the project was abandoned years ago.

In demanding the resignation of Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace President Truman has apparently turned sharply to the right. The dropping of Henry Wallace might mean the loss of this radical vote which has kept the Democrats in power for the past 14 years. Wallace is their leader. President Truman is aware of this and made the utmost efforts to effect a compromise and keep Wallace in the cabinet by exacting a promise from him not to make any more speeches until the end of the UNO conference in two weeks. Secretary of State Byrnie there refused to accept the compromise and told the president that if Wallace did not resign he would. So the president was forced to bow to the emergency. We still do not understand this get tough with Russia attitude. Does it mean we eventually expect to go to war with her.

Don't be surprised if some time in the future Canada decides to break away from the British empire and be 100 percent independent says a press dispatch from Vancouver. At the present time they are practically independent in everything but name. About their only tie is a governor general appointed by England who they respect but he has little power. We once asked a Canadian why they paid allegiance to a King. He said "It is just a custom. We have always had one and would not know how to get along without one." In Quebec Rev. Joseph Fernald, pastor of St. Roches' Catholic church, refused to allow the Union Jack displayed in his church on any occasion, even for funerals of war veterans. When a flag draped coffin was brought into his church he ordered the flag covered. He, however allowed the Canadian flag displayed. His congregation numbers 10,000.

The Democrat party in Michigan judging by their paid advertisements seem to be using the same argument against Kim Sigler that Vernon Brown, Gov. Kelly and his Republican machine did in the primaries. It will be recalled that Brown was beaten and the Republican machine went down with him. We don't think the people of Michigan are greatly interested in the amount of money Sigler spent in getting his grand jury convictions or how much he spent for room rent or parties at the Hotel Olds. He got results and that is more than his successors in the grand jury investigation have done as yet.



3. A half bushel of peaches will require 10 to 12 cups of completed syrup.
4. Open jars, drain syrup. Heat syrup to boiling point and pour over fruit in jars. Use new lid and reprocess for one-half of the original time.
5. Use paraffin immediately.
6. Loss of liquid in a jar does not affect the keeping quality, provided the seal is perfect.

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
