This week has been proclaimed registration week in Michigan by Gov. Henry Ladd. Citizens who have not done so have until Oct. 10 to do so or forfeit their right to vote on Nov. 5.

Only rural precincts had to re-register now and the forecast is they may lose 200,000 votes while the city vote may reach an all-time high.

Senator Vandenberg in a letter from Europe says the struggle there is to get free ballots in the hands of the but that the ballot itself is useless unless it is used.

Don't be surprised if the old proposal to reduce the sales tax from 8 to 2 1/2 percent come up. The reason is the cities would then be able to levy a 1/2 percent.

Michigan August traffic fatalities increased 46 percent over those of August 1945. A total of 553 more people were killed in traffic mishaps in the 54 months preceding the war than the number of Michigan men killed in World War II.

Table toppers seeking to sell liquor by the glass took a beating in Battle Creek last week where they were beaten 2 to 1. Does that mean the people support the Michigan liquor control system.

The most popular amendment is Proposal No. 1 on the ballot allowing local governments to spend money of airports. About every reputable organization in the state has approved it and no one has come out against it.

Michigan newspapers are taking a bow this week as they are carrying the finance report of the year ending June 30. It shows a \$16 million surplus and by an odd coincidence the proposed soldiers bonus would cost \$17.5 million a year.

The sales tax diversionists have a strong case when they say the state has more money than it needs. Why not return some of it to local governments.

The American Legion convention at San Francisco turned down a national soldier's bonus.

Vet. Mem. Field Dedication

Large Crowd Attends Dedication of Pinckney Veteran's Memorial Field Last Friday Night

Perfect weather conditions prevailed last Friday night and the dedication of the lighted athletic field called the Pinckney Veteran's Memorial Field was a big success. 800 admission tickets were sold and counting the hand, players and those who did not pay the attendance was around 1000. The receipts were about \$400.

The field is as light as day, each of the poles having seven 1500 watt lights. Two other poles for soft ball are not lighted for foot ball. Many compliments were received on the excellence of the lights. They can be seen as far away as Potage Lake and Chubb's Corners. Several people in the country called up to see where the fire was as they could see the reflection in the sky.

The evenings program started with a parade down the field headed by the cheer leaders carrying the United States, followed by the Fowlerville band. In the center of the field they stopped and band played Star Spangled as all heads were uncovered.

The crowd came from far and near with Howell contributing probably a third of it. Gregory, Stockbridge, Hamburg and the lakes were well represented and there were some from Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti.

The freshmen class served hot dogs and cheeseburgers and the juniors pop and coffee.

The only event that marred the evening was that Pinckney lost the game to Fowlerville 6 to 0. They put up a gallant battle against a good team but just did not pack enough punch to score.

The field was not in very good shape. It was bulldozed, disced and rolled this summer and the drought prevented the grass from coming up. The fire engine was brought out and some 10 barrels of water sprayed on the field which laid the dust.

Pinckney got a break at the start of the game when the Fowlerville kickoff only travelled 10 yards being downed on the 50 yard line by Jerry Clark. Pinckney worked a triple pass and line plays and reached the 10 yard line where they lost the ball on a fumble. Fowlerville got away a short punt and Pinckney was right back in pay dirt again but lost the ball on downs.

Pinckney kept the ball in Fowlerville territory most of the first half but failed to score. In this period fist downs were even. In the half Pinckney tired and Fowlerville started to pile up first downs by Pinckney successfully defended goal line. Fowlerville used pass and line plunges by Korsgen, a big back.

With time running out Fowlerville took to the air and a pass from Lyons to Hutson was good for 30 yds. and a touchdown. Their attempt to pass for the extra point failed. Then Pinckney took to the air but had last one intercepted in the closing minutes.

CONSERVATION DEPT.
As the drought came late this year there is believed to be a fair supply of ducks for Michigan's 2,000,000 sportsmen.

The Michigan grouse kill last year was only 165,000. The dept. has approved the purchase of 204 acres of land in the Brighton-Pinckney sector.

Pine tree seedling shipments are limited to 1500 of any one species and 4000 per order.

More than 50 picnic sites, some with fireplaces and toilets will be maintained in southern Michigan this fall, some with fireplaces and toilets for convenience of Michigan hunters.

Two deer were killed near Lewis-town the first day last week by bow and arrow hunters.

13 state parks in Michigan are still in operation.

Alls. Haugen of Mich. State college killed a deer at Swan Creek last week at 73 yards with a bow and arrow.

Game wardens now use planes to spot violators, particularly deer headlighters.

Michigan's take of deer, 97,721 last year topped the nation. Pennsylvania had the most hunters, 82,677 but they only killed 25,60 deer.

School children in northern Mich. sold 40 ton of pine cones to the dept. in Sept. at 6c per lb.

Postoffices last year sold 1,725,505 \$1 duck stamps.

CURRENT COMMENT

The Wagner-Murray-Dingley bill

recalled a socialized medicine law, must be hearing a vote, judging by the amount of literature coming through on it, most of which is against it. Last winter the discussion on the bill waxed hot & the Detroit Free Press public forum devoted 3 Sunday broadcasts to it. Until the past month little has been heard of it. The idea of the bill is to take a small amount from each workers pay envelope to be placed in an insurance fund for hospitalization and medical treatment. It will be readily admitted that many working people do not receive proper hospitalization on account of high costs and many needed operations are postponed indefinitely. The medical profession and all doctors are united against the bill which they see as direct government interference with their profession. One argument they use we do not consider over strong. That is that if the bill is enacted you will have nothing to say about what doctor you have but must accept the one sent by the government. You don't have much to say now. If you go to a hospital for an eye operation you are sent to eye specialist and for a brain operation to a brain specialist. You don't pick your doctors. Although Michigan has a much lower death rate in recent years due to control of communicable diseases, disability and hospital cases are steadily increasing.

The meat strike is still on and although President Truman expects it to ease in 3 or 4 weeks the meat industry can see no relief until the OPA is lifted and prices soar to \$1 a lb. again. Several investigations are underway. In Michigan investigators found large stocks of meat in storage but most of it belonged to hotel and restaurants of Detroit.

In Massachusetts, Gov. Tobin's investigators found 4,000,000 lbs of meat in storage in Boston. In Chicago the Chicago Sun investigators found 18,000,000 lbs in storage in 3 storage houses and learned 21,000,000 of meat was put in storage last month in Chicago where the average has only been 2,000,000. In New York a steel manufacturer got 38 Texas steers which he will kill and sell to his employees. Some thing drastic will have to be done, such as taking the tariff off of Argentine beef, a much debated subject. If this was done the meat scarcity would vanish over night.

The election this year is the dearest one we can ever remember. In the county the Republican candidate for sheriff is the only one who has opposition. Kim Sigler and Murray VanWagoner, the two candidates for governor have toured the state making speeches without arousing a great deal of interest. Their speeches so far have been colorless although they may warm up the last weeks of the campaign. Despite big effort to arouse the voters and get them to register, a very small vote is looked for which if the lessons of the past count for anything will give the Republicans an advantage.

The Democrats lost their biggest vote getter and magnet when Franklin D. Roosevelt died. On this subject Walter Wochell tells the following story. A Republican is supposed to have asked National Democrat Chairman Hannegan, "Who are you going to run for president in 1948. You can't elect Truman or Wallace?" Hannegan said "Oh I don't know. I suppose we will dig some one up." "For God's sake no" replied the Republican.

Whether the peace conference at Paris, now in its final stages accomplishes anything or not is a question. It seems to have been dominated from start to finish by Molotov of Russia who has several times left it up in the air by walking out on it when things did not go to suit him. He has been getting all headlines. Secretary of State Byrnes and Senator Vandenberg, are lifelong conservatives and at no time have dominated the conference. If the late Franklin D. Roosevelt had lived he would undoubtedly have attended in person and would have been the dominant figure there.

When the fiscal year began, the General Fund had a surplus of \$5,219,753.68. This amount, added to the \$16,312,602.33 operating surplus for the year, made a General Fund surplus of \$21,532,356.01 as of June 30, 1946, available for appropriation. THERE WAS NO OTHER UNRESTRICTED SURPLUS.

There were, however, funds restricted by the legislature for definite purposes, such as—the \$50,000,000 in the Veterans' Trust Fund, the \$11,453,489.05 in the State Highway Fund, the \$27,881,094.15 in appropriation balances for uncompleted buildings and improvements, the \$14,417,250.03 in the Primary School Fund, etc. THESE BALANCES WERE NOT AVAILABLE FOR GENERAL PURPOSES.


