Michigan Mirror

LANSING. Michigan's divided house in state government is going to erupt in new controversy in 1949.

While Governor-Elect G. Williams has repeatedly maintained he could get along with a Republican legislature better than did Kim Sigler, the fact remains that Williams and the legislature will be miles apart on some issues. Her are a few of them, as indicated by campaign statements of the Democratic governor-elect.

Outright repeal of the Bonine Tripp labor relations act which requires a majority vote of all employees in an election before a strike can be called. The authors of this measure Senator G. Wellwood Bonine of Vandala and Senator Harold D. Tripp of Allegan were re-elected by their respective districts.

Increase in unemployment compensation. The payments were adjusted by the legislature in 1947. A further increase is proposed by Williams.

Increase in old age and mother pension. The badly inflated dollar with its lowered purchasing power is causing hardships among pensioners. The legislature attitude on this issue may be influenced, in part, by the prospective state deficit under the 1946 sales tax amendment.

Public housing by municipalities through bond issues retired by rents.

Fair employment practices act modeled after the New York law which was intended to outlaw racial or religious discrimination in private employment.

Building program to alleviate overcrowding in mental institutions. Such a program was inaugurated by Gov. Harry F. Kelly. Again how is Michigan to finance these improvements conceded by everyone to be badly needed?

Williams insisted that Michigan lacks a "long range" program of highway improvement, and that tourists who traveled over dusty roads "would never return to Michigan." This criticism points to a Democratic effort to wrest the state highway dept. from Rep. control at the 1949 spring. It also revives the 1948 issue of whether the gasoline tax should be boosted to make possible new roads.

If the Nov. 2 majority vote for a constitutional convention meets legal tests, the door would be opened to overhauling of the state's taxation system with possibility of a state income tax, said to "soak the rich." The new problems are many.

The Lydell fish hatchery in Comstock Park built in 1900 will be abandoned.

THANKSGIVING PROGRAM

As part of their Thanksgiving program this year the members of Pinckney Community Cong. Church plan to give special emphasis to the needs which still exist among the millions of impoverished people in other parts of the world. Rev. Donald Brady announced today.

At the same time, other churches throughout the United States will engage in similar programs, as a part of the annual nationwide "Share-Your-Thanksgiving" appeal, he said. This appeal is sponsored by church World Service, the interdenominational agency through which most of the Protestant churches in America coordinate their overseas relief and reconstruction activities. Mr. Brady explained.

At service to be held at the Cong. Church on Nov. 21st, members and friends will make special contributions as their share in helping to carry on the overseas aid program.

Stressing the needs which still exist overseas, Mr. Brady said that "Conditions have improved in some countries, but there are still untold numbers of people whose chances of surviving the coming winter depend not so much on increased food and clothing as in the recovery of their spiritual abilities to cope with the problems of life. The Church people of America can have an important part in doing this, if they are willing to share with their fellowmen in other countries."

Already this year, churches cooperating through Church World Service have sent \$13,500,000 aid to people in more than 40 countries. Included in this amount were 30,000,000 pounds of bulk food supplies, clothing, vitamins, medical supplies, religious literature, and pre-fabricated church buildings.

Current Comment

We see that Brighton high school has claimed the Class "C" title of Michigan and offered to defend it. Among their conquests of the year is a 14 to 0 over Pinckney. Brighton is proud of this victory and it is displayed prominently in every Brighton writup we saw. However if the two teams should meet again we believe the score would be reversed. Pinckney met Brighton in the second game of the season, the week after warmup game with a Lansing high school reserve team. Pinckney had not then begun to roll. Their line was unsettled, they had not developed any teamwork and they did not click. As a result although they played good enough defensively, they had no offense. Bob Amburgey was hurt early in the game and was unable to finish. The same thing happened in the next game at Manchester. Amburgey did not play at all and Pinckney lost this game by the same score 14 to 0. Only their offense had improved and 3 times they reached the five yard line. Then suddenly they hit their stride and bowled Adrian over South Lyon, Dexter and Stockbridge on successive Fridays. The trouble with Pinckney was their schedule was all wet. If they had met Dexter and Stockbridge in their first games they would have lost. Brighton should have been one of the last games on their schedule.

The nation is apparently full of "I told you so" people who knew all along Pres. Truman was going to get elected. Some how or other they were awfully quiet before the election. If they know so much about the election why did this 15 to 1 money go begging. It has come to light Chairman Brownell of the Republican comm. purchased a home in Washington D. We would send Justice Frank Murphy instead of Vinson because he is better suited to the job.



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
