## Michigan Mirror State News

News and Happenings of the State Told from Lansing

Gov. Kim Sigler's measures had a tough time in the state senate last week and his pet sales tax repeal measure which passed the house was killed by the senate who sent it to the judiciary committee where it is expected to be buried for the rest of the session. This committee is composed of lawyers who do not like the Sigler sponsored bill forbidding legislators to act as attorneys for special interests during legislative sessions. An attempt was to be made this week to get the bill out of committee but its sponsors had slight hope.

Senator Reid of Highland Park who made the motion to send the bill to committee said he did so because repeal would not solve problem as the state would still have some \$40,000,000 to raise.

The governor's proposal to call a constitutional convention was also killed.

The battle raged hot on the sales tax repeal last week and wild charges were hurled. Miss Etta Read, head of the Port Huron Teacher's Ass'n. said petitions to recall Sigler would be circulated because of his attempt in the state legislature to thwart the will of the people by repealing the sales tax diversion.

Tuesday the senate killed the repeal 17 to 11.

Attorney General Black says he is conducting an investigation to find out if Mayor Jeffreys has not laid himself liable to criminal action by exerting pressure to kill the sales tax repeal. It is charged that the Detroit Street Railway Union of which Senator Reid is attorney at a salary of \$10,000 a year had threatened him with loss of his job. It is charged Mayor Jeffreys instigated this. Of course these threats are idle vaporing. The governor will not be recalled or Mayor Jeffreys indicted.

Attorney General Black seems to be quite a boy for getting in the middle! His decision allowing legislators and state officers expense accounts hit a snag last week as Auditor General Aten refused to pay his expense account of \$203. He will have to go to court to collect.

## Another Murder

Almon Brewer Murders Wife, a Former Pinckney Girl in Home Near Howell Last Thursday

Livingston county had its second murder in 30 days when Almon Brewer, 41, confessed to beating his wife, Olga, 26, to death in their home on Byron Road, north of Howell last Thursday night.

Brewer who is an itinerant house painter and tree sprayer came to the jail at 12:30 a. m. Friday morning and said after an evening of drinking he came home to find his wife beaten to death. Officers went to the 2 room home a mile north of north of Howell, and found Mrs. Brewer dead. Her head had been smashed in and her body was a mass of bruises. Furniture in the house was smashed.

Officers doubted Brewer's story as he had a bad record and they had been called to his home numerous times when he went home drunk and beat up his wife. After 5 1/2 hours questioning by sheriffs officers and Prosecutor Wilred Erwin, Brewer confessed he went home drunk and beat his wife's head in with a beer bottle. He said he sat there four hours figuring out what to do and then left his 3 year son who had witnessed the murder with friends in Howell and went to the jail.

Brewer has been arrested a number of times for drunkenness and had his drivers license taken away. He got it back last year. Olga was his third wife. He has a 17 year old daughter by his first wife. His mother is in California. Six years ago while doing a painting job in Pinckney he met Olga and married her after a three day courtship. She is the daughter of Adolph Hartman of Pinckney but lived with her grandmother, Mrs. Amelia Rheinberger in the village.

Brewer made a practise of beating her up. She was often seen with a black eye and 2 years ago he broke her arm. She had a three year old son and lost a baby last year as a result of a beating he gave her.

Surviving besides her son, William are her father, Adolph Hartman, a brother, Edward, and her grandmother, Mrs. Amelia Rheinberger and two sisters, Hilda and Ella, of Detroit.

The funeral was held at the Swarthout Funeral Home Sunday, Rev. Bauer of the Ann Arbor Lutheran church officiating. Burial was in Pinckney cemetery.

### CHARGE REDUCED

Judge Collins held one day session of court. Several divorces were granted, John Clark who killed his wife with a shotgun was arraigned. The charge was reduced from first degree murder to second degree and he pled guilty. Sentence will be passed Friday.

## New Business

New Manufacturing Concern Has Located in Pinckney During the late war James Hopp Jr. of Pinckney and Frank Hopp started a factory at Jackson, L., making airplane parts. They also did grinding for other companies. They prospered and built up a good business.

With the war over they turned to domestic production and have been running steadily. Last year they started to build a factory which was not completed until after Christmas. Then they moved their Jackson factory here and resumed operations. At the present time they have 11 men working for them and are making a number of small parts. These parts are chucks for drills, adjustable handles for wrenches, radio parts and oiling parts for autos. They discontinued their grinding room on account of lack of space but may resume it later.

Most of the men employed are from Pinckney although they brought some employees from Jackson, James Shirey, jr. now owns the business but retains the old name. ## Current Comment

We wonder just where this Communist Purge will end. Will it go on and on in the end...

Hitler's famous Jewish Purge in Germany by means of which rose to power? It is starting in the same way as that one did by blaming the Communists for all the ills of the land and urging that repressive measures be taken against them. Of course the same conditions do not exist here as in Germany. The people are not illiterate or starving and disposed to put the blame for their troubles on a minority group. Nor does the thousands of years of prejudice exist against the Communists as it did against the Jews. Still the Communist has become the bog-man although three fourths of the people who think so couldn't tell you what a Communist is. The courts also seem to incline toward this line of reasoning. Westbrook Pegler, columnist, was sued for slander for calling a man a Communist. The case went from court to court for 2 years and now the Illinois appeal court has ordered the case tried ruling the term is slander.

The Highland Park high school continues to have its troubles. It got out of one awhile ago by ordering grade children to discontinue swimming in the nude in the school swimming pool. Now the school has received a petition with 1808 signatures protesting against allowing the elementary girls to take shower baths in groups. The distinction drawn is very close. The only way a shower can be taken is in the nude. Few schools have facilities to give every pupil a private shower. Supt. Sharpe says of the 1308 signers only 260 had girls in school. 798 had no children at all and 8 lived outside the district. Highland Park apparently has a lot of busybodies.

Congress never learns and again seems disposed to cut the army and navy to the vanishing point. This happened after the Revolutionary War and when the Civil War started. It was caught with its pants down and took a beautiful pasting for a couple of years until the war production caught up with the needs of the armed force. The mistake was repeated and the Spanish War again caught us unprepared. The same thing happened for the 3rd time and World War I found us again unprepared. A similar condition prevailed in World War 2 and for two years we took a pasting from the Japs, the Philippines etc. Now with the Republicans preaching economy 1/3 of their budget cut would be at the expense of the army and navy. Two thirds of the people expect another war in the course of 20 years or so. Will it catch us again unprepared?

41 of the 51 Republican senators at Washington voted Senator Vandenberg of Michigan their choice for president in 1948. However the senate does not choose the president. Michigan with its small electoral vote receives scant consideration in the Republican national convention over New York and other populous states without whose vote the Republicans cannot win. Vandenberg's sole chance is that Dewey, Stassen and Taft may deadlock the convention and he be selected as dark horse. Vandenberg will enter no presidential primaries. The others will and will have a block of votes as a result on the first ball.

In order to curb the mounting number of divorces the legislature is considering a bill providing for a 2 year wait after a divorce is granted before either divorced party can marry. The bill is recommended by the circuit judges of Michigan. Some states have the law but have trouble making it work. Most divorces are granted because one of the parties wishes to remarry.
