When the boys came marching home 620,000 strong they returned to a Michigan beset with problems and confusion. The new world had dawned with many clouds and few silver linings. It is the usual hangover from war.

The post-war auto is about the same as the 1941 car but has more gadgets to tinker with.

The dollar goes twice as fast. Taxes are higher and the increased wages have long since vanished in the higher cost of living.

The A-1 war hangover in Michigan in Michigan as elsewhere is inflation.

The spiral of high wages was pushed higher by huge backlog of bank savings and war bonds. Famished for goods during the war American consumer was a ready buyer with the result prices soared.

Influenced by a huge state surplus Michigan voters last November approved a \$270 million dollar veterans bonus also a sales tax diversion boosting the schools share of this fund from \$60 millions to \$110 millions.

Yet the United States is better off than war torn Europe where fascism and communism is rampant. The United States is last strong hold of free enterprise in the world today. State socialism has uplanted capitalism elsewhere today. Even the British empire seems to be falling apart. A hungry world depends on American food and money for survival. American world responsibility was never greater. The struggle is between democracy and communism or state socialism.

In contrast to this Michigan problems, including our estimated \$83 million deficit seem puny & small indeed.

Current Comment

Although the press condemned it as a waste of money and some even hinted it was caused by high pressure methods of the undertakers associations, the American dead who are buried over seas will commence arriving in this country about next August 1. The first to arrive will be those who are buried in Belgium. It will not be until that time that enough coffins will be on hand to handle them. The work will continue until all have been returned whose relatives request it. It is estimated 80 percent will be returned. 20 percent will be left overseas many of these being in cases where the wife has remarried. In order to get the body of a service man returned from overseas it is necessary to make a request to the quartermasters dept., Washington, D. C.

There are a few persons who begrudge the veterans any aid at all from state or federal government but as a whole their sacrifice is appreciated and the people are willing to extend them aid as far as possible. The Detroit News is running a series of articles on what it terms a veterans racket in which veterans organizations get yearly appropriation to aid veterans. No accounting is made as to whether veterans get the greatest possible benefit from this. This writer states that since 1921-22 the legislature has allocated the following funds to veterans organizations: American Legion \$1,708,923, V. F. W., \$285,287. Disabled Veterans \$219,303. Spanish War Veterans \$120,912. G. A. R. \$82,624. Their demands have gradually increased and this year they are American Legion \$251,294, V. F. W. \$122,000. Disabled Veterans \$104,336, G. A. R. with only one living member \$10,000. Some of them also get free office rent at the state capitol. Their work is in addition to the veterans aid maintained by the state and federal government. The charge is made that the funds are used to aid membership drives. These organizations were formed to see that the veteran got a square deal and all that was due them. They are in effect veterans unions & it is by means of pressure exerted by them the veterans get their rights. Without a veterans organization the veteran would fare mighty slim in the same way the workmen would without unions. By the way the number of veterans drawing \$20 a week unemployment aid have jumped from 934,000 in last November to 1,100,000.

One needs considerable about to detect its nowadays. It seems to be becoming the style to submit every one arrested to such a test. This apparatus by measuring blood pressure and heart action is claimed to be able to detect a person lying. However the results of these tests are not admitted as evidence in many courts and the results are often inconclusive. A person cannot be compelled to submit to such a test. It does not work with persons of low blood pressure. It is a sort of refined 3rd degree and aided by plenty of bluff often obtains confessions.

Well the draft has been cancelled and the 1000,000 draftees in uniform are all expected home by this summer. However the suspension is only tentative and if enlistments do keep the forces up to required strength it may be resumed. All files will be preserved and the enlistment figures carefully watched.

Senator Hittle has introduced a bill in Lansing that would declare homes joint & increase the exemption. For instance in a \$5000 income household and wife would each be credited with \$2500. Eight states already have similar laws.

With the large amount of Michigan potatoes grown we never could understand the demand for Maine and Idaho potatoes. The answer seems to be the extensive grading practice in these states. Michigan farmers have always fought potato grading and at the present time have started a court battle. They allege that other federal inspectors grade their potatoes as No. 1, state inspectors regrade them as No. 2 and get them off the market. This suit was filed in Montcalm county.
