More from the private notebook of your Michigan Marco Polo:

We stirred up things with our critical blast against tagging state parks in the Upper Peninsula, promoted by our personal experiences in four parks from Lake Gogebic to the Straits. Now comes an interesting letter from Harry H. Whiteley, a veteran member of the state conservation comm. and a newspaper editor at Dowagiac. Harry calls them as he sees 'em. He has been doing this for years. We can't recall when he withheld a punch. He has contributed thousands of hours to public service.

"Your comment as to parks, OK as far as it goes, does not hit the spot," says Harry. "The lack of park facilities is purely due to a lack of money. We are obligated to operate parks with inadequate manpower."

"Until we get different attitude on the part of legislators, we cannot do any part of a job in our parks. Everybody wants more and better parks, but no one pins the direct responsibility where it belongs... on the legislature and on the budget office. Give us money, and we will give you park services."

State parks are visited literally by hundreds of thousands of people each year. They are popular, and rightly so. They afford an opportunity for wholesome recreation and much relaxation.

Michigan is way ahead of the average state in its public recreation program. It recently started to purchase 100,000 acres in the south eastern section of the state near Detroit and it is committed to buy some 20,000 acres in the occupying Mountain state park area in the Upper Peninsula.

This acquisition of land has prompted a new "gripe" which I have been hearing with increasing frequency. It is this: The state is ever seeking to acquire more and more land but is ever neglecting or delaying to open up this land for public use.

Surely one of the big jobs ahead is the development of state land. How can this development be financed?

To remedy the lack of funds whereby the state might provide better and more facilities... a "must" if the public is to use the land... the conservation commission sponsored a bill in the 1947 legislative session. This measure... House bill 289... proposed to give the commission authority to charge (if it desired to do so) a public fee for three things: Admission into a state park, parking within a state park, and camping overnight within a state park. The bill was defeated in the Senate.

We have no delusions that our views are any better than anyone else's. But I have always felt that it is one thing to charge admission into state-owned park; it was quite another thing to charge a fee for the use of SPECIAL services to those who asked for them. If you wish to reserve a locker in a beach house for your clothes; why, shouldn't you pay a reasonable fee for this privilege? If you wish to use a log cabin at Mirror Lake in the Porcupine Mountains as we do why shouldn't you pay a reasonable fee? If you wish to reserve a camping area for your own use, why shouldn't you pay a reasonable fee?

A use fee limited to special services such as these, would be one happy solution of the problem as presented so frankly by Mr. Whiteley, a conservation comm. member. Those who desire better park facilities should be given an opportunity to help pay for them. We predict that such a use is coming in Michigan.

Current Comment

The debate carried in the papers on whether or not there should be betting allowed on the horse races at the state fair in Detroit this year turned out to be a tempest in a teapot. When the state administrative board finally voted on the proposition the vote was 6 to 1 for allowing racing. Now the state has gotten a good thing for years by leasing the state fair race track to the racing syndicate whose headquarters is Cleveland. gets \$250,000 a year rental and \$50,000 a day while races are being held. This isn't hay. At a time when the states are having more duties thrust upon them they can't be too particular where the money to perform these added duties comes from. Editor Myers of Lapeer started the controversy when he resigned from the fair board because he said the state had sold the fair out to the gamblers. Also he added the rural people don't gamble on horse races. We wonder what his authority is for this last statement? Has he ever attended the Norville races.

The popularity of lighted athletic fields continues and more are being lighted every year. In this section Dexter and Milford expect to have lighted fields by next month and Saline has started a campaign to get one. In this county, Howell, Brighton and Pinckney have them. Fowlerville is the only exception. They got the fever and sent a delegation over to inspect the Pinckney field but year but somehow did not get going. We were told by a Fowlerville man that their program is much bigger than the other places here and in addition to the athletic field would light the race track similar to Northville's. Somehow these hot summer days it is nicer watching the soft ball games after the sun has gone down than to sit in the hot sun.

About 550 Japanese girls who have married American soldiers are expected to be given passports in Japan this week to enter America. Most of these girls married Japanese American or Nisei Japs but 30 of them married white soldiers. The most famous wedding of a Jap girl to an American was that of Lt. Frank White of Somerset, Pa. to Pia Kurusu, daughter of a former Japanese ambassador to the U. S. The American consulate is approving about 75 marriages a day.

The impression is gaining ground that plane pilots are being licensed too rapidly and many unfit ones are getting licenses. Detroit police arrested one last week for buzzing a child's playground. Investigation showed he had been arrested 13 times for traffic violations, enough to show him unsuitable for pilots license. One pilot, flying too low, decapitated a child in Oakland county this summer. Most common fault of these irresponsible flyers is flying at too low an altitude. Some of the pilots who perform over Pinckney also have that fault.

The details of the plane crash in which Ambassador Atkinson was killed are now available and show much to be the result of carelessness. The plane ran out of gas. It was a reconditioned plane but was working so well in the flight from Guam that the navigator who survived did not check the gas at Kwailin. Later the plane was forced to buck strong winds and used gas more rapidly than anticipated. Finally an engine quit and the end was in sight and only three men survived.

The trial of German war criminals still goes on in Germany before American judges and daily batches of them are being sentenced to hangings or imprisonment. These trials are chiefly those in charge of concentration camps who killed thousands of Jews and Poles by gas chambers etc. There seems to be some chivalry among the judges are we note that Frau Ipe Koch, wife of the ex-commander of the Bichenwald concentration camp was given life imprisonment. She collected the tattooed skins of concentration camp victims and made lamp shades of them. This chivalry was not so manifest here during the civil war. Mrs. Mary Surat of Washington who was a rooming house where some of the Lincoln death plotters lived was tried, convicted and hanged although there was no real connection between her and Lincoln's death. Of all the civil war criminals, one Capt. Wood Wirtz, commander of Andersonville prison where many Yankee soldiers were starved to death, was tried and hanged.
