Michigan Mirror

School News

Unlike the weather about which we talk constantly, yet never do anything about, Michigan rural health is due for improvement.

Among Michigan rural youths, rejections for military service were higher than among city youths. Some of their physical defects were due to all things, to faulty nutrition.

Because farmers have received only about one tenth of the national income during the past decade or so, the following conditions prevailed in Michigan farm homes as of 1940.

Less than one third had running water... a simple convenience that was available to 97 out of 100 Michigan homes. Only one out of six farm homes had an indoor toilet, or a bath tub or shower.

Furthermore, better pay and a trend to specialization have combined to attract new doctors to cities. Alcona county, for example, had 2,782 persons per active physician in 1948 (a war time year) as compared with 828 persons per doctor in Wayne county, Detroit.

What's happening to change this picture? Well, two things among others.

First: Price inflation has set a new high mark for farm income. Cash receipts in 1946 were 208 percent above the average for 1935 to 1939, according to Uncle Sam's department of agriculture.

Second: Michigan physicians, members of the Michigan State Medical Society, have rolled up their sleeves... to do something about lagging rural health.

Medical scholarships will be awarded to students who will practice in rural communities for a minimum period of three to five years. Local health councils are to be established to assist, coordinate and implement all programs contributing to the health of people.

Dr. Emory W. Morris, Battle Creek, pres. of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, and Dr. A. C. Furstenberg, dean of the U. of M. Medical School, recommended that rural hospitals provide office facilities for doctors, nurses, dentists and public health officials.

The above program is a harbinger of what is coming. Better health for Michigan farm folk is on the way.



"One Deer" for Archers in 18 Counties



Act No. 326 of the 1947 session of the Legislature, effective October 11, permits archers to take a buck, doe or fawn October 11-November 5 this year in Alcona, Benzie, Crawford, Gogebic, Ionia, Isosco, Iron, Leelanau, Luce, Mackinac, Montcalm, Montmorency, Newaygo, Ontonagon, Oscoda, Roscommon and Schoolcraft counties.

Southward extension of the boundary of the territory open to hunting for bucks with firearms opens an additional 3,000 square miles, including areas of crop damage by deer.

Applications for gun hunting of antlerless deer December 1-10 in part of Alcona county are accepted by the conservation department's game division at Lansing through October 5, and 300 will be chosen from among the applicants, by lot.

Conservation Notes

Antlerless deer may be taken in all counties of the state with bow and arrow after Oct. 1 and in 17 counties bucks, does and fawns may be taken with bow and arrow after Oct. 11.

The following additional counties are open to deer hunters using firearms this year: Shiawassee, Muskegon, Ottawa, Kent, Montcalm, Gratiot, Clinton, Saginaw and Bay.

There are 31 Williamson plan hunting clubs this year, 19 less than last year. The big bear hunt in Iron county last week in which several hundred men and dogs took part netted but 3 bear, one of which was a cub.

A severe winter and late spring is believed to have greatly reduced the pheasant crop.

Michigan hunters will have a herd of one million deer to hunt this fall. A decrease in the lower peninsula is made up by a 30 percent increase in the upper.

An effort is being made to bring order out of chaos by limiting the name of wall eyed pike to 'perch pike. It now has 40 different names.

Current Comment

An incident in North Carolina recently called attention to a useless postal regulation which has been on the books for years but is very seldom enforced. A negro in N. Carolina won an auto at American Legion raffle but was denied it because negroes were not supposed to be sold tickets. However, the incident got so much publicity that the colored man was given the car value in money. The St. Louis Star Times had so much to say about the injustice that the postman or a southern threatened to bar the paper from the mails for violating the law against publishing lottery winners. This he could do under the law but as far as we know it never has been done. Advertising of lotteries is also forbidden yet most all papers carry ads. of feather parties and bingo. It is also forbidden to publish the names of door prize winners such as were given away at the soft ball games here. The St. Louis dispute brought matters to a head and the postal ruling was modified to such an extent that names of winners may be published if they are newsworthy events. The government of Great Britain and Ireland sponsor national lotteries every year and when the winner is an American all papers publish the news. We cannot see the sense of keeping such a law on the books when it is unenforceable.

The judges of probate, one of whose duties it is to commit feeble minded persons to homes such as Lapeer rapped Gov. Sigler and the legislature for failure to provide for this class of people. The Lapeer home is overcrowded and there is no place to commit them. So as a rule they are allowed to go free with fatal consequences. We remember a number of years back Judge Lyons of this county committed a boy to Lapeer. He was remained but after six months there was still no vacancy in Lapeer and he was released. About a year ago he was sent to Ionia on a criminal charge. The case is apparently happening all over the state. It was ever thus in the old days the poor house were barn like buildings and the care of the unfortunates committed there was disgrace. There has been considerable improvement and we will admit and many of the old time poor houses have been replaced by county hospitals, but the state is sadly lagging in facilities for the feeble minded and in sane.

For outraging all limits of decency Frank Nicholson, radio star in California takes the cake. His wife committed suicide and the same day he married Ann Cooper Hewitt, a heiress and then he and his new wife attended his wife's funeral. It was too much even for the radio and his sponsors promptly fired him.

We have all heard the "Beer that made Milwaukee Famous". In the press last week Wisconsinites to show their appreciation of this beverage have stepped up the beer consumption. In 1946 it was 25 gals. a year per person. This year so far it has climbed to 29 one half gals. per person. These people evidently like their suds.

The high cost of food is like the weather. "Everyone talks about it but apparently no one does anything." There are a number of remedies suggested. Senator Taft would solve the difficulty by having everyone eat less. Ex. Pres. Hoover would restore the meatless and wheatless days of World War I. We doubt if either measure would afford much relief. The action of the Women of New York who formed a Consumers League and agreed not to buy any high priced food has much more chance of success. Now there is more than enough food in this country for all but Europe and Asia has little food and so much is being shipped there to prevent starvation that the supply here is being shortened. Repealing the OPA and shortening price ceilings was a mistake but the profiteers who have made millions by that move now want to continue their mad joyride.
