## Michigan Mirror

Gov. Sigler says he will veto any bill to increase the 3 cent gas tax. The Mich Good Roads Federation advocates a 15 year \$1,400,000 highway construction program to be financed by a gas tax. High Com. Zeigler estimates the highway damage this year at \$500,000.

Gov. Sigler is against an increase in gas tax because he does not think the sales tax in equitably distributed with the schools and local governments getting 76 percent.

In the meantime road costs have gone up. In 1940 wages amounted to \$8,300,000. Last year they were \$15,200,000. A truck cost \$950 last year it cost \$2,200. A grader cost \$5000, last year it went up to \$11,000.

County road comm. now maintain 87,000 of Michigan's 107,000 miles of roads.

The fight between state and local governments over who should enforce the liquor laws continues. Local governments get 85 percent of the license money for enforcement purposes yet the states 82 inspectors are charged with this duty which the local governments ignore. Sigler can withhold license money from any municipality which does not utilize this revenue for enforcing the liquor laws. The state will cut the inspection force to 55.

34 county fairs will have horse races this fall. The Mich Educational Ass'n is sponsoring an amendment permitting them to lift the 15 mill tax limit by majority vote.

Local gov. will receive \$305 millions this year from the state. In 1944 it was \$143 millions.

If the state legislature refused to submit Gov. Sigler reforms to the people at the Nov. election, Gov Sigler is likely to take the issue directly to the voters.

Ernest Conlon, former lt. gov will receive \$7500 a year as head of the Detroit sales tax diversion.


The west division are Brighton, Fowlerville, Stockbridge, Okemos, Maass, Webberville. League starts May 29.

## Current Comment

This frequent time unkering invariably started by Wayne county, is not popular with the rest of the state, Eastern time which was adopted during the late war was a war time measure only and unaccepted by the people as such. It was protested by the farmers and dropped at the end of the war. Now Detroit has made it legal again and the counties in this section will have to follow suit whether they want to or not as their ties with that city are too close for anything else. During ye editor's lifetime there has been much tinkering with the time without your humble servant being able to see any great gain made by these changes. In our distant youth Sun time was the legal time. This was determined by the sun. When a boy, ye editor spent considerable time at the D. E. Hovey farm at the edge of Dexter. His two older sons were my age. There was a large barn on that farm and it was possible to tell when it was noon by the shadow cast by the sun on the barn roof. The railroads adopted Central Standard time. This was 28 minutes later than Sun time and in order to get in line with the railroads Sun time was discarded about 1900 we believe and Standard time adopted. There was opposition and in Ann Arbor a man had to be placed in the court house tower to keep people from turning the clock back to Sun time. Eventually it was accepted and continued until World War I when Eastern time was adopted which is an hour faster than Standard time. Then in World War II the clocks were set ahead another hour when New York time was adopted. Now we are apparently to have another whirl at the fast time again.

Never were the state highways and county roads of Michigan in such bad condition as they are at the present time. Good blacktop roads which were never in bad condition before have suddenly gone to pieces this spring and the Gregory, Howell, Dexter and M-26 roads all have the ir share of them. The road authorities blame it on the winter with its many days of zero weather which has sank the frost to the lowest depths in history and slowed down its coming out of the ground. The highway and road comm. also complain that they lack money and equipment to keep the roads in condition. W. K. Kealey Detroit News commentator takes another view. He says, under former Comm. Murray VanWagoner a highway system was built up in Michigan second to none and Michigan had the best roads in the nation. When Charles Zeigler took over he broke up VanWagoner's organization by turning back the upkeep of many state highways to the county road comm. who had neither the men or equipment to keep them up to par and since then the roads have deteriorating yearly until a at the present time they are a disgrace. Raising more money now for roads under present setup he says would be throwing it down a rat hole. Little attempt was made this spring to enforce load restrictions.

According to Detroit dailies Fritz Crister, the superman of Michigan football will soon be bound for greener pastures. With the great buildup given him by his winning of the Big Ten championship and the Rose Bowl game he is able to dictate terms and has already agreed to take a promotion job with a Detroit concern of the same nature which James Farley has with the Cocoa Cola Co. His salary at Mich. was \$14,500 a year. The co. will pay him 3 times that amount.

One industry which is now no more is the ice business which has been crowded out of existence by electric refrigeration appliances. Only a few short years ago Pinckney mill pond saw the usands of cakes ice out there each year. At Lakeland several hundred men worked each winter filling the ice houses. A hotel was built to board them and in addition to local men workers were brought in from Toledo. The ice houses are now all torn down and we doubt if any ice at all was hauled in this county this winter.
