Things we didn't know before department:

Final draft of the state government reorganization amendment, sponsored by the Citizen's Comm. for Better Government in Michigan, would place the legislature rather than the governor power to hire and fire dept heads. Not more than 18 depts. would be permitted.

Twenty-six states have a four yr. term for governor. 21 a two-year term, and one (New Jersey) a three year term.

Michigan has had 33 governors, 20 of whom served for more than one term.

Prohibitionists have established more dry territory in this country than before prohibition.

Waste corn cobs are being utilized to make nylon hosiery. Furfura is produced by Quaker Oats Co. from cobs; then used by DuPont to make nylon hose.

"Boss" Kettering's new high compression motor, saving gasoline consumption 33 to 40 per cent, will get its first public bow probably in 1949 Oldsmobiles and Cadillacs.

The State Bar of Michigan, taking a cue from the enterprising State Medical Society, has adopted a public relations program, wooing Hugh W. Brennan away from the medical to head it.

Michigan was 15th in 1947 farm income with a total of \$7,984,800. Iowa led with \$2,368,962,000.

Michigan Tourist Council reports that every dollar spent for national advertising brought 128 traceable tour expenditures.

Beauty shop operators are said to be worried about today's vogue of self-wave kits.

Youths over 18 who enlist in the Michigan National Guard will be exempt from proposed selective service draft. One "if": They must enlist before act is law.

The 1948 reduction in federal income taxes may be the last for some time, if Congress is to avoid financing. Defense expenditures now running at \$11 billions, are due to rise gradually to \$22.5 billions by 1953.

Two hundred and sixty-two local governmental units are spending liquor license revenue for law enforcement as the law intended; 59 are using only some of the revenue for this purpose, and 304 are spending it properly, according to a state survey.

Michigan's new Economic Development Commission, newest state agency, was given a \$198,000 budget by the state legislature. The Office of Veteran Affairs will go out of business June 30.

G. Mennen Williams, Detroit attorney, is a Democratic candidate for gov. He quit the liquor control comm. Saturday, May 15th.

Current Comment

The Pinckney high school athletic field is beginning to look dilapidated no improvement or work having been done on it this year. This field which was graded has not been seeded and part of it is bare of grass. Where the hollow place was filled in last year the bank was not seeded and has washed out in many places. The fencing is not completed on the south side and the entrance gate has not been put in. Two of the gates are broken and sprung and it is impossible to shut them and as a result autos are able to get on the field nights and do much damage. A citizens comm. started the project and raised most of the money. Then the school board took over and turned it over to the V.F.W. in return for putting on a car raffle project. The latter have not done any maintenance work on it at all. A different setup is needed. One person should be appointed to manage the field and a percentage of the money taken in at each game should be put in a fund to keep up the field. The Huron Valley softball league will play their home games there this year. They will be under considerable expense. It costs \$15 to enter the league. Then they will have equipment to buy. This they feel they should not pay themselves. Something will have to be done. Unless a fund is provided to keep up the field it will continue to go down.

Times have changed in the course of a few hundred years. In the days of the Crusades the Christian nations of the world banded together to wrest the Holy Land from the infidel Saracens. England, France, Germany were in the vanguard of the fight and the battles of King Richard, the lion-hearted of England against the Saracens are legends. There was some criticism that he did not invoke the Taft-Hartley law but court action is invariably slow and no one is just sure what success can be realized by this law. The constitutionality of which has been challenged. Of course it is the old argument of whether "High prices make high wages or high wages high prices." In our opinion prices have far outstripped wages. If you do not believe us ask the average wage working man.

We confess we are unable to understand the diplomacy that has prevailed between this country & Russia. So far it has consisted of each country standing as far from the other as possible and calling the other names. No attempt has been made by the two powers to sit down at the same table and work out an agreement except at the U. N. conference which is only a glorified debating society. Although World War II has been over some time no peace treaty has been signed. Russia as one of the victors expected her share of the spoils or protectorates. This country wants no European colonies and wants her occupation troops home as soon as possible. With Russia digging in for keeps this is impossible for to bring our soldiers home would be turning Europe over to Russia. However, in this case we shall have to do something besides name calling.

Cooperation Notes
The worst winter kill of evergreens took place in the upper peninsula this summer. It is attributed to lack of moisture last fall and hard freezing which prevented the moisture from reaching the roots. Saddle-bushes will be available in many state parks this year.


