Michigan Mirror

General Motors Corp. a Mich. concern, has the reputation of being the best managed corp in the world.

So when the GM announced a 2 year contract with the CIO United Automobile Workers granting them a raise of 3c an hour and 8c an hour tied to cost of living. Other Mich. employers took notice. Here was a paco setter with a new formula for industrial peace.

In a two day field trip through Mich. we talked with many employers on high cost of living and increasing cost of production. They say although sales are good, profits are declining. They can't see how higher wages can have any but an inflationary effect. They deny that industry is rolling in profits and that wage increases will come out of profits.

We find that from Jan. 1941 to Dec. 1947 industrial wages went up 84 percent while the cost of living rose 69.1 percent.

Dividends to stockholders took 35 percent of industrial earnings. 65 percent went for plant improvement research expansion etc. 75 percent of post-war expansion was financed out of current and past earnings.

Chas. F. Kettering, engineering consultant of GM believes the wage increase can be offset by an increase in efficiency. Maybe GM can do it but other firms, less well managed will be unable to follow suit.

Sumner Slichter, Harvard economist, points out perennial higher wages have resulted in a rise of prices. With prices rising 2 and 3 percent a year who would wish to open a savings account or purchase government bonds or securities paying a similar amount.

The ultimate effect seems to be to reduce the purchasing power of workers pensions, savings accounts, life insurance and bonds.

In England where a union labor gov. is in power unions have been asked to heed the following: "It is essential there should be no general increase in personal incomes with out a corresponding increase in the volume of production." (White Paper, Feb. 4, 1948). The same policy should be adopted here.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

At a special meeting of the Board of Education held on Monday, May 30, 1948 arrangements were made with the Rev. Beachy and the trustees of the Mennonite church to use the basement of the church for a high school classroom. The school will furnish light and heat and be liable for any property damaged during the year. No other charges for rent, etc. were requested by the church.

This room with some changes in the present school building will make it possible for the Pinckney School to accommodate pupils from outside districts that have been sending children here in the past. No new schools can be accepted. The new arrangements will make it possible to have the first grade attend school all day.

Representatives of the VFW post No. 7301 attended the board meeting and signed an agreement for the use of the Lighted Field from June 1 to September 1, 1948. All revenue received will go to the VFW who will be liable for the general expenses of the field and the ball teams during the period of the agreement.

Michael Kelly, 82, died last Tuesday at the Leland Sanitarium near Ypsilanti after an illness of 2 years. He was the son of Patrick and Johanna Gorman Kelly, was born in Putnam township near Highland Lake. He attended the schools in this section and also the University of Illinois. In early life he was a school teacher and taught the Roes Sprout and Hicks schools in this township and also in Waterloo. He read law in the William Van Winkle law office in Howell. In 1903 he went to Dexter and worked in the Thomas Birkett mill. When four making was discontinued there he leased the mill and ground feed for a number of years. Of late years he has been a painter and decorator.

He was married to Miss Elizabeth Gaffney of Dexter and she with two daughters, Mrs. Stanley Lusty of Detroit and Mrs. Stanley Meisenberg of Jackson Heights, N. Y., survive.

The funeral was held Saturday morning at St. Joseph's church, Dexter, Rev. Fr. Walsh officiating. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery.

TO ISSUE DEBENTURES

The Mich. Bell Telephone Co. will issue \$75,000,000 in debentures this year. They will be dated Oct. 15, 1948, and will mature in 40 years and bear interest. They will be used to pay demand notes to the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. Earnings of the company are not enough to finance its growth and it must seek funds from investors. In Michigan there are still 39,308 on the waiting list for telephones. Last year the list numbered 114,736. The proposed issue would be the second bond issue in the history of the company. In 1904 it issued \$10 million in first mortgage bonds which were retired in 1924. The company's present long term capital of \$175,000,000 is all in common stock.

Current Comment

All 30,000 reserved seats for Detroit Tigers first night game there June 15 with Philadelphia have been sold two weeks in advance. Games under lights have always been popular. They afford an opportunity for people employed during the day to see them and the terrific heat of midday is absent. Also the lights and all bear the nearest resemblance to Barnum & Baileys' Circus than anything else on earth. In other words it is a grand spectacle.

Another rumor from Lansing says Gov. Sigler has his eye on a seat in the U. S. Senate. The story is he has fixed up a deal with Police Com. Toy of Detroit whereby Toy will run for Lt. Gov. and defeat Harry Keyes. Then if Vandenberg is nominated and elected to the presidency Sigler will resign as governor. Toy will become governor and appoint Sigler to the senate and succeed Vandenberg. Its a nice story but there are too many ifs in it. Vandenberg is a very long shot for the presidency and Toy might not beat Harry Keyes who seems to have a habit of getting ahead. All these things may come to pass but it sounds like a pipe dream.

This year seems to be an open one on teachers and Garden City made the front pages last week over a school difficulty. Mrs. Grace Flood, 52, a teacher there for 7 years and in other schools for 8 years before was discharged by the board by a 3 to 1 vote. She was charged with taping children's mouths together, tying them in their seats, knocking their heads against the wall etc. She denied most of the charges but admitted the taping charge. This must be one of the modern forms of punishment.

Back in the old days being a policeman was not looked upon as a very elevated position. The principal requirements were 200 lbs. wt. and strong back. A certain degree of higher education was not considered essential. Now all is changed. We read that in Dearborn applicants for policemen's jobs must be 6 ft. tall and have two year college education. Once again brains seems to have won out over brawn.

Every so often a big disaster occurs with a huge loss of life. Two such occurred last week. One was the Portland, Oregon flood in which many perished. During the war a housing project was built for war workers on low land along the Columbian river. High waters this spring demolished the dike built to hold back the waters and swept away the housing project with huge loss of life. The other was a naval disaster. 30 men being rowed to war ship at Norfolk, Va., after Memorial Day shore leave were thrown in the sea when the boat capsized. Some were picked up, some swam to shore but 22 were drowned.

The late Michael Kelly who died last week was one of the best posted persons on Ireland in the state. He took several Irish papers, had numerous Irish histories and an Irish encyclopedia which he read zealous for many years. Some years back he tried to prove that Gen. Phil Sheridan of civil war fame was born in Ireland and not in Ohio. He was unable to do this as Irish records were incomplete.

Bob Erwin, an old time Pinckney miller was an expert diviner.





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
