## Michigan Mirror

A handful of Michigan's 100 plus state governmental units, targets of the crusading Governor Klm Sigler, are about to be merged into a new state department of administration at Lansing.

Therein lies a predicament for John A. Perkins, Perkins, capable budget director, will become head of the new department at a salary of \$12,000 a year. An appointee of the governor, subject to confirmation by the State Senate, he will have considerable authority as state controller.

Perkins' predicament is a result of several public illusions.

He is expected to perform a miracle, and he can't do it. As evidenced by the voters' diversion of state sales tax money to local governments by constitutional amendment, the public apparently persists in a belief that the State of Michigan is rolling in money and a parallel belief that consolidation of 100 state units into 18 or 20 would automatically save a lot of money.

Persons like Governor Sigler know well that the state government is not blessed with an abundance of dollars. In fact, a deficit of \$14,000,000 is clearly forecast for the end of the 1948-49 fiscal year. Only another rise in the post-war inflation, boosting prices still higher, can avert a deficit.

Perkins also has no illusion that he can deliver the miracle of economy.

The state legislature authorizes public service. His department will administer only a few of them, and all within appropriations as made by legislators.

It is the belief of Perkins that the chief benefit of the new department will be greater efficiency. He does not expect to achieve economy through reduction of legislative appropriations. In this, he is very much a realist.

"Greater value received for the tax dollar is our chief objective," Perkins explains. "If anything, we probably shall need more money than heretofore. The budget staff has been notably understaffed for years. We should test products which the state buys to make sure we get our money's worth in quality."

Michigan's administration is almost an exact duplicate of the principal reform achieved by Stassen when he was governor of Minnesota. The Minnesota department is a model which we may well follow.

The new department takes over some of the duties formerly administered by the state administrative board comprising eight elective officials each with his own primary responsibilities. It will have five divisions: Budget, purchasing, accounting, building-engineering-management, motor transport, and office services.

Purchasing of all state supplies, equipment, and printing will be handled by the department. Warrants for disbursement of state funds to buy goods or services shall be drawn and issued by the auditor general upon the certification by the controller. The auditor general will handle post-audit spot checks to determine how departments and institutions are spending money as appropriated by the legislature.

"More for your money" is perhaps the best way to illustrate what Perkins hopes to accomplish. Don't expect any magic of economy through reduction of legislative appropriations.

### ROB DRAKE AT KEESLER FIELD

Pfc. Robert D. Drake, 18, son of Mr. H. W. Drake, 5275 Reading Rd., Lakeland Mich., has reported to Keesler Field, Mississippi for training in the Air Forces Radar School located there.

Keesler Field is one of the Bases of the Technical Division, Air Training Command and is also the home of the Airplane and Engine Mechanics School and the Air Chemical School.

The training Pfc. Drake receives in the Radar School will extend over a period of 20 to 36 weeks, 16 of which will be an introduction to the fundamentals and principals of elementary electronics as applied to radar. The second phase of his training will be either in the advanced Ground Equipment Course or the Airborne Equipment Course. This training will qualify him to maintain the air force radar equipment so vital to the defense of America.

### CONSERVATION NOTES

Showers and light rains stopped the forest fire hazard last week. The previous week 127 fires burned over 327 acres.

A hundred gallons of 5 percent DDT destroyed the mosquitoes on the 100 acre Bay City state park last week.

A new grain storage barn is being built on the state game farm at Mason. It is 36 by 72 quonset type and holds 150 tons of grain.

A lamprey trap 80 ft. long is being built in the Ocqueoc river in Presque Isle county near U. S. 23.

With fair weather predicted for the next two weeks and the winter kill limited a good bass and bluegill season is anticipated. The frog season likewise opens June 25.

The sale of fishing licences up to June 1 showed an increase of 12.7 percent over last year.

40 acres of Scotch pine planted near Higgins Lake in 1919 will be offered for sale this year.

With plastics replacing shell in button making Michigan's clam trade, which once totaled \$100,000 a year, has suffered a big decrease. Prices dropped from \$100 a ton to \$80.

## To Set Lake Level

Prosecutor Douglas Reading of Washtenaw county has filed a suit in circuit there asking said court to set the lake level of Big Portage Lake in Washtenaw and Livingston counties. This he was able to do because the Livingston county board of supervisors consented to the trial being heard in Washtenaw.

The true lake level will be maintained by dredging and erecting a dam at the south outlet of the lake thus preventing the many thousands of dollars worth of damage done to property on the lake by high waters each spring. 51 percent or more of the property owners signed the petition asking for the court decision.

Construction of the dam and dredging is expected to cost about \$30,000. The court will also be asked to set up an assessment district & set the tax rate to pay the cost.

Notice of the hearing to all property owners on the lake. Who should pay the cost is a question. Some think the lake property owners should but they claim that much of the high water in spring come from streams in Oakland and Ingham who drain through Portage Lake and the Huron River.

## REV. ALFRED ALLARD RESIGNS

At the Sunday morning service at the Com. Congl. Church here Rev. Allard read his resignation to take effect August 15 next. He has accepted a call to be pastor of the Congl. churches at Brerkenridge Merrill, Mich. Rev. Allard came here 5 years ago from Lakeview and has built up the church, increased the attendance and made many improvements including a new Hammond organ. His departure will be greatly regretted.

During his pastorate here Rev. Allard has had 9 church weddings, about 40 funerals, 63 baptisms, and added 100 new members. A Young Ladies Auxiliary has been organized, missionary budget doubled and \$100 raised for overseas relief. Church bulletins were used for two years.

## STATE FIREWORKS LAW

Permits are only issued for celebrations or when the fireworks are to be shot off by qualified persons. The penalty is 90 days in jail or a \$500 fine.



**HITCH HIKE:** Telephone conversations "hitch" ride on an electric power line near Crystal Falls in the Upper Peninsula, by arrangement with the power company serving the area. 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
