## Michigan Mirror

Gene Black, attorney general is the Pecks Bad Boy of the Sigler administration.

The man whom Sigler once called a must candidate is the prickly pear of Michigan.

Black, a Dewey booster is now assailing Sigler and the Michigan delegation for sticking to Vandenberg in the national convention. Furthermore he called for a candidate to oppose Sigler in the primary.

Lt. Gov. Keyes is circulating petitions and State Treas. Hale Brake, also a Dewey man is mentioned.

Later we hear that Judge Skillman of Detroit grand jury fame is a candidate. He is angry because the legislator refused to appropriate further funds for his grand jury investigating the auto racket.

Black charged that the governor has not favored it because the auto ass'n one of his principal supporters was involved.

Fred Alger of Detroit will oppose Keyes for Lt. Gov. with Sigler's blessing it is claimed.

Sigler lays the trouble to the fact that Keyes, Brake and Black all want to be governor.

Black has been a storm center from the beginning of his term. He roamed and board when this was asked for an expense account for denied him has since driven back and forth each day from his Port Huron home.

He feuded with Lansing newspaper correspondents over the release of public information.

He recently charged that Michigan auto dealers were in cahoots with the state Republican command, contributing huge sums for the 1948 campaign. All this is most irritating to the Republican state central committee and Gov. Sigler. It is most unorthodox for an attorney general of a reform administration to hint of finagling in high places.

Gov. Sigler told Associated Press managing editors at Higgins Lake that he refused to bring him self down to the level of his feuding colleague, Mr. Black.

"Mr. Black is a nice fellow personally," said Sigler. "But he has a complex. He swings in all directions."

"I do not feel the same way Black does. Should I criticize him publicly?"

Whether Sigler does or does not, Gene Black is very much in the news.



## Drowns Sunday

The first drowning of the season in this community took place late Sunday afternoon at Big Portage Lake when Don Neil Boss, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Boss of 14815 Arfesian Ave., Detroit, lost his life. He had come to the buoy to spend the day with his parents who had rented the Lee Lavey cottage. He was on a rubber raft and floated out to deep water. The body was recovered by Livingston county sheriff officers. Dr. Robert Bird of Wayne applied artificial respiration but in vain. Coronar Harold Borden of Howell was called. The body was taken to the Swarthout Funeral Home and removed to Detroit that night by Schmalzriedt & Sons, funeral directors.

The dead boy leaves besides his parents, a brother and 2 sisters.

## TAKE IT EASY

"Speed kills - take it easy." This is the traffic safety theme for the month of July to be stressed by police agencies of Michigan according to Sgt. Hoody, commanding officer of Mich. State police. This is part of a safety program sponsored by the National Safety Council.

Modern, smooth running cars give a delusion of safety, but records show that speed is the factor in 2 out of every 5 accidents.

Contrary to general opinion Mich. does have a speed law on the open highway. But the law provides that driving too fast for safety is a violation. The weather, traffic, condition of the highways are also considered.

The accident record is at a new peak. Last year 144 persons were killed and 39,639 injured in traffic accidents in Mich. in 1947. 92 accidents. There are not enough police to control them. If progress is to be made the driver must help and be on the lookout for carelessness or recklessness on the part of the other driver. Remember, speed kills, so take it easy, what's the hurry.


