

## Michigan Mirror

**DOSTER**—Situating along the shaded shores of Pine Lake, twelve miles north of Kalamazoo and adjacent to this Barry County village, is one of the most unique educational institutions for war veterans in the entire United States.

Here is a veritable "dream spot," the sort of thing a young man overseas might conjure in his imagination but never expect to see.

It is a practical emblem of Michigan's generosity to its sons who served the Nation in World War II.

We refer to the Michigan Veterans Vocational School, operated by the State of Michigan and administered by the Western Michigan College of Education at Kalamazoo.

**WE ARRIVED AT THE PINE** lake school, as it is generally called, just as dinner was being served in the long administration building.

Windows of the dining hall overlook the sky-blue waters of Pine Lake. The scene is that of a summer resort rather than a college campus. In front of the main building is a bathing beach. Boats are tied up to a wood pier. A float with diving board is moored in deep water.

In a grove of tall trees are twenty-five log cabins.

After dinner the veterans lounge about. Some go swimming. It is a twilight time for relaxation. A busload of girls from Kalamazoo is due to arrive at 9:00 p.m. for juke-box dancing and oats.

**"AND WHAT KIND OF COURSES** are offered at this bit of paradise?" you ask.

Commander Harry W. Lawson, director, places emphasis upon vocational training—the teaching of useful trades. These include business education, home appliance repair, machine and architectural drafting, machine shop, printing, radio and typewriter repair, and watch and clock repair.

Modern tools are provided for class instruction. The printing department, in which we were personally interested, has a modern typesetting machine and a full line of printing equipment. Kenneth Ross, printing instructor, served in the Canadian Air Force.

**WE BECAME INTERESTED** in the story of "Ike" Permelia, a Negro double amputee.

"Ike" served in the Signal Corps for five years. While on combat duty in Germany, he lost both hands. Percy Jones general hospital equipped him with mechanical fingers, and "Ike" became a student at Pine Lake in February.

One of three Negro veterans out of nearly 180 at Pine Lake, "Ike" is popular with his fellows. He never asks for sympathy, never whimpers. Although he gets \$200 a month for life because of his disability, "Ike" wants to live a useful life and do his part. He has plenty of guts.

We admire his courage and his cheerful outlook. He is a real American.


## OPENS AUGUST 16

## Current Comment

A writer in the Hearst papers says this Hubert over civil rights is mistaken. It should be called "negro rights." Both big papers have followed it look, line and sinker in their quest for negro votes. He calls the people of the north hypocrites and says there is as much negro segregation in the north as south. When the negro moves in a section in the north, the white people move out. Harlem, New York, Bedford, Brooklyn, South Side, Chicago, Bush section, Detroit, are all negro ghettos. It is impossible for the people of Wisconsin and Minnesota to understand the southern attitude where in states like Mississippi the negroes outnumber the white people.

It is hard to believe that an event which has passed the age of 100 years but continues to seem to be becoming contemporary now, 20 years ago the late John Roberts of Dexter reached the age of 100. The town declared a holiday and threw a party in his honor. President Herbert Hoover sent him a telegram of congratulations. The other day a woman near Sibley, Iowa, 105 got such notice. Washington county has a number of people over 100 years old. Science has much to do with it and also people of today do not have the hard hips to endure their 100th birthday.

An enterprising tavern keeper in New Jersey who got public spirited and declared a child's day once a week so the children could see the television has been having marching straight to doists. On that day he sold no intoxicants but the picture of children sitting at the bar drinking cola did not appeal to the law.

The recent death of Gen. Peckling, American commander in the first world war, brings out the statement that if his advice had been followed in World War I there would have been no World War II. After victory in France he favored marching straight to Berlin and taking over the place. However the cabinet and isolationists wanted such pressure on congress they turned a deaf ear to his pleas and disbanded the army when the job had done and we had to fight the war II over again 25 years later. The same thing happened after World II and when we had our run in with Russia we had to still and bluff and we had to get our draft machinery in shape.

Under the present draft law all men over 18 years old and under 26 must register for the draft on July 30. After the date of youths and 18 year olds may become 18 years old. The 25 year olds ones would be taken first as to delay would be too many men. The length of service is 21 months. Service is made in U.S. or overseas. 18 year olds may enlist for one year and not serve overseas until 19 years old. However only 150,000 will be enlisted. There are 1,300,000 of that age in the country. The deferments are vague must be handled individually as before. There will be 4,000 draft boards of 3 people each.

The Republican state central committee has called on Attorney General Gene Black to resign and asked Gov. Sigler to remove him if he does not. Neither request will be granted. Black won't resign and as another attorney general will be nominated in September Gov. Sigler will not make a martyr of Black by firing him. Black has little cooperation in him. He has been at odds with the administration since his election. Now he is critical of financial plan of the Michigan Republican party, and claims his investigation of it discloses fraud, corruption and what not. Now all political parties have to be financed as money is needed to run campaigns. The national committee is usually chosen for his ability to collect money. Arthur Summerfield, past president of Mich. Auto Dealers, became national committeeman. He hit on a plan to finance the return for this auto dealers got for each car sold. 

He is a Past President of the Michigan Probate Judges Association, and a member of its Legislative Committee for twenty years. He has been elected presiding officer by many civic clubs and fraternal societies.

As Probate Judge, the records will show that he was never reversed in a single decision by a higher court during the years of his incumbency.

In April of this year he gave up the office of Probate Judge to accept the appointment as Circuit Judge by the Governor and would like to be nominated and elected for the balance of the unexpired term. It has been fifty-three years since a man from Livingston County was Circuit Judge. Adv.


