## Michigan Mirror

### BAD AXE

Here is a Mich. 5 county region, comprising Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, Lapeer and St. Ignace. The barns are red, the gramophone records tell a story of new prosperity.

Huron county soil conservation payments totalled \$241,545 this year, the sugar beet subsidy \$176,000.

Good prices enabled farmers to make improvements pay off indebtedness and buy modern machinery. All this was impressed on us as we rolled through the Thumb last week in our house of woe, especially the generosity of Unsie Sam.

In Sandusky a farmer banked a one month's milk check of \$1,218. This is not uncommon, a Crossville farmer had one for \$1,700. Sanilac is the leading dairy county of the state, a Huron county farmer last year grossed \$80,000 on his bean crop.

Live stock is booming, it is a land of beefsteak and milk.

Lapeer is leading in livestock, Tuscola and St. Clair also rank high. Bay county is second only to Lapeer in potato production.

Sanilac's wheat average last year was 54,200 with a 21 bushel per acre yield. Huron, Saginaw and Tuscola were high. 1948 prospects are rosy. The Thumb rank second in poultry and eggs and Sanilac is first in turkeys.

Most of it is on Lake Huron, tour around and lake property and frontage is booming.

Harbor Beach is the home of former governor and now Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy. It has the only school operated motion picture theatre in the state which shows a profit of \$10,000 a year. Huron operates a state park where at Caseville you can get chicken and whitefish at the Bluewater Inn, on the same plate.



He was the son of the late Valentine and Maria Lak in Dinkel and was born on the Lak in or Dinkel farm west of Pinckney on Sept. 24, 1879. In early life he was a painter and decorator and dealt in horses to some extent. He married Emma Gardiner of Pinckney Sept. 1908. A son, Stanley was born to this union. Besides his wife and son he is survived by two grandchildren, 3 brothers, Albert, Eugene and Otto. A brother, Walter, and a sister, Mrs. Bertha Dunbar, are deceased.

He purchased a general store of Clayton Placeway and Mrs. Emma Burgess. This he later sold to Monks Bros. Following this he was in the well and plumbing business and was the first radio salesman in Pinckney selling for the Spartan Company of Jackson.

Some 30 years ago he was appointed rural mail carrier out of the Pinckney postoffice which position he held until a year ago.

He held the offices of councilman, marshal and highway commissioner at different times. A member of the Com. Cong'l. Church he was a member of the board of trustees over a long period of years.

The funeral was at the Swarthout Funeral Home, Friday, Rev. Allard officiating. Burial was in Pinckney Cemetery.





This smart young homemaker knows that liquid from canned peas is far too precious to drain off and throw away. Almost a third of the vitamins are in the pea liquor. Instead, she is saving it in a jar for other uses. A liquid drained from canned peas can be used to supplement other liquids in sauces, soups, or combined with vegetable juices. With summer molded vegetable salads, use pea liquid instead of water for part of the necessary liquid with your gelatin. If you are preparing canned peas as your dinner vegetable, don't ever pour off the liquid. Drain it into your sauce-pan, add a little butter, some salt and pepper, and simmer for about five minutes, or until the liquid is half gone. Then add the peas, and cook just long enough to heat them through thoroughly. It's a new taste experience in serving canned peas!
