## Michigan Mirror

A new look has arrived at the 76,000 acre National Guard camp at Grayling where 2,500 youths, most just out of high school are in training.

When congress adopted the draft the national guard was given a preferred status. Those who enlisted in the national guard were exempted from the draft. A mad stampede 2,500 enlisted in 30 days bringing the total enrollment up to 7,200 an all time record. The troops arrived at Grayling last week in 1000 motor vehicles and 200 railroad cars. They were reviewed Saturday by Gov. Sigler and Major General Ralph Loveland. This Saturday, following a week of over night training and bivouacs they return home.

Youth is getting its first peace time military training as a part of national defense.

The atmosphere is hardly that of a holiday although there is the usual horse play. The Berlin crisis and world events have cast a shadow.

Military discipline is tight this year although soft ball games, face movies are offered each night and the band plays on all occasions. Church attendance is compulsory and military units patrol the streets of Grayling. The big is last punishment.

The atmosphere is a bit informal to an old army man. Privates and officers uniforms are similar and saluting is on a voluntary basis. The military swank is missing.

All this reflects a determination to make selective service a permanent part of our national defense. Pride of the National Guard has deep roots in Mich. and the opposition to the attempt to get it under federal control runs high.

The national guard had a fine record in World War II. A Mich. unit was in the New Guinea campaign, the 82nd (Mich.-Wis.) was the first to see action in the Southwest Pacific, the 45th Div. (Oklahoma) had the record highest casualty rate and the 29th Div. (Maryland and Virginia) were the first to land in Normandy.

## Current Comment

For the first time in over thirty years there is a hot contest on for circuit judge in the Livingston-Shiawassee circuit. Judge Joseph Collins, who died last spring, held the office for over thirty years and never had any opposition. This fall there will be five candidates for the job. Probate Judge Willie Lyons of Livingston was appointed by Governor Sigler to fill the vacancy and serve till the next election. This is the first time in fifty-two years the judge of this court has been from Livingston county. He will be a candidate to succeed himself.

Other candidates are Michael Carroll, Milton Sharp and Arthur Peterson of Genesee and Jane Quile of Genesee. This step makes it certain that Judge Lyons will be one of the two in the primary. ## Conservation Notes

The dept. has already started releasing 20,750 pheasants, hatched at Mason state game farm.

Federal excise taxes on sporting arms and ammunition in Michigan the first 10 totalled \$431,000. This is returned to the states for wild life reparation.

All 500 of the Mich. hunting license dealers will receive their supply of licenses by Sept. 15.

Three Kalkaska brothers were fined \$251.70 for setting three fires to burn over blueberry patches.

A total of 133 oil wells were shot the first six months of this year in Michigan, compared to 122 for the same period last year. Forty gas wells were completed.

The Lydell and Harrisville fish hatcheries are recommended for retirement and will be sold. Lydell has 40 acres and 23 ponds and Harrisville 38 acres and 7 ponds.

Tests are being conducted to see if spraying with DDT is injurious to pheasants, rabbits and other game.
