## Conservation Notes

Shotgun hunting of buck deer will get a trial this year in spite of the protests of alarmed citizens. Oakland, Jackson and Cass county boards of supervisors have asked that their counties be closed to deer hunting and the Cass County Sportsmen have made a similar demand. Inauguration meetings have also been held elsewhere. The commission turned down all protests. It is required to open the season in southern Michigan on account of the size of the deer herds and crop damage.

215 foxes were turned in for bounty last week.

More than 18,000 more fishing licenses were sold this year than last.

85 forest fires burned 662 acres last week.

The conservation dept. will buy 14,000 bushel of red pine cones for seed at \$9 a bushel.

A squad of white pelicans has appeared at Trenton.

## STATE FAIR WINNER

## Current Council

Attorney General Gene Black has won his suit in the supreme court against the auto dealers of Michigan in his attempt to collect an amount he claims is \$3,000,000 in unpaid sales taxes. Black's contention was that the auto dealers should pay sales tax on the book value of the used cars they take in trade. The dealers have not been doing it, claiming many cars are turned in at less than book price. This practice was the cause of the ruling of Judge Skulman's grand jury in Detroit, Judge Lee in Flint, Pinckney, wrote the supreme court decision. Another grand jury is now in session investigating the charge by Black that the auto dealers kicked into the republican campaign fund in return for favors.

Henry Wallace appears to have had sledding in his effort to get on the ballots of the states. So far he is only on 13. He has applications pending in 11 others. He is on the ballot in Michigan but the south as a whole has turned him down. His campaign is a self financed one at Madison Square Garden, New York last week he charged admission. Gerald L. K. Smith was the only other person to our knowledge who used this plan of financing.

According to the Detroit papers President Truman's Labor Day speech there was a flop while that of Senator Stassen was a huge success. The president drew 100,000 people to his speech which was preceded by a mammoth parade. Stassen had no parade and only drew 3,000 people to his speech in the Masonic temple. This is the same kind of line they handed out each time the late Franklin D. Roosevelt ran for president. W. K. Kelsey in the Detroit News takes a dig at Stassen in his column. Mr. Stassen took up the president's remark about the Republicans dragging a red herring across the path to distract the peoples' attention from the important issues of the day. Stassen said the republicans intended to drive the red herrings out of the Potomac river at Washington. Mr. Kelsey says there are no red herrings in the Potomac river or any other stream. A herring does not become red until it is smoked.

An echo of the \$1 auction days of the Hoover depression took place in Lapeer last week the Lapeer Farmers Mutual Insurance Co. went into receivership with many unpaid bills. The company assessed the members as a mutual company the right to it has 6,700 policyholders. Those who had unpaid claims against the company refused to pay. Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens had a claim for \$500 and Paul Ziegler had one for \$200. The court ruled that the assessment was first and levied on the Stevens and Ziegler claims for \$172 assessments. On Thursday they were sold from the court house steps despite a threatening crowd of farmers. A woman lawyer of Lapeer bid both farms in for \$15,050. The owners announced they will resist eviction and the case will probably go to the supreme court.

It is hard to understand the workings of some peoples' mind. Last week vandals invaded West park, Ann Arbor, smashed picnic tables, benches and swings and did hundreds of dollars worth of damage for a reason at all. A year ago someone broke off the steel flagpole on the Pinckney square. Several years ago it was necessary to lock the gates of the Dexter cemetery each night to prevent vandals from damaging monuments. Some persons with warped minds get a kick out of wanton destruction of property.

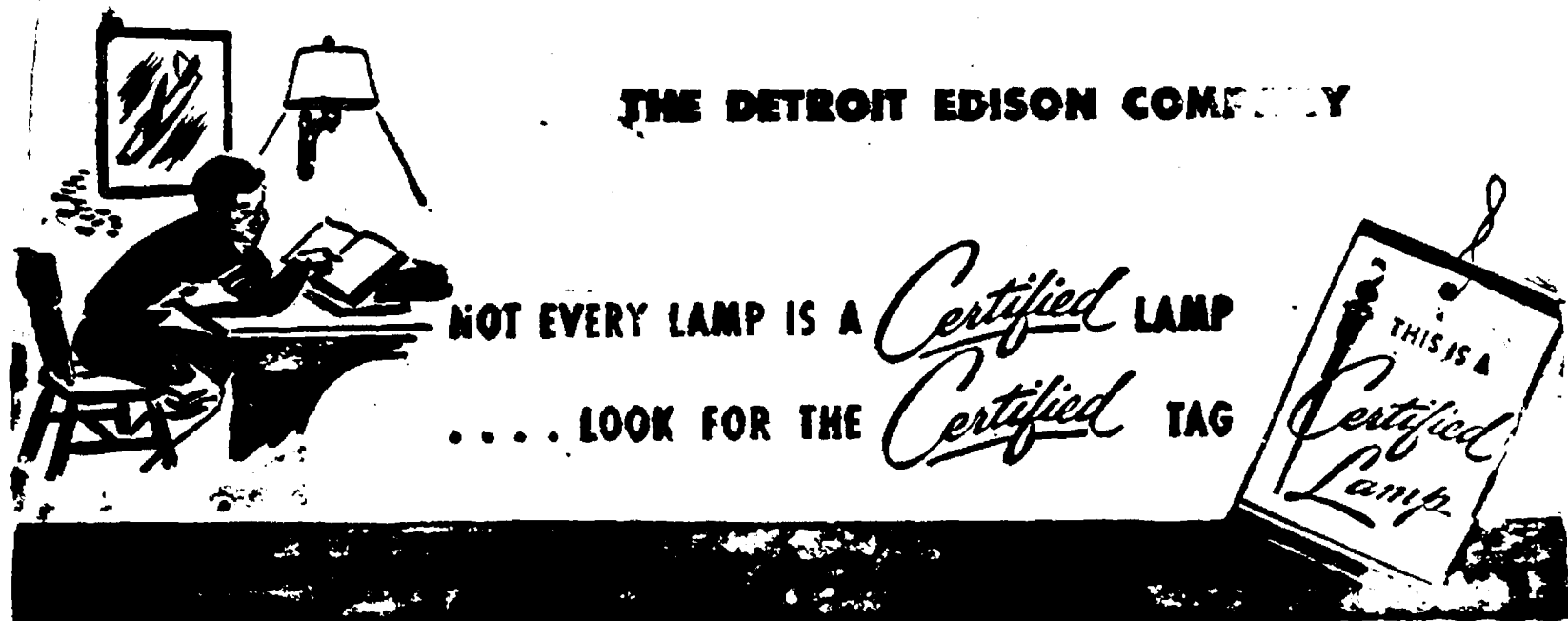
