Items of Interest

Inflation is just catching up with Michigan Public Utilities, 19 of which have applications pending before the Mich. Public Service Commission for an increase in rates. They cite post-war inflation added to war-inflation and increased operating expenses as the cause.

Five men make up the commission: Stuart White, Niles; Guy Marshall, St. Johns and L. Wollenden, Detroit. They have jurisdiction over 5 general classes of utilities: Electric power, telephone, gas distribution, railroad and motor transportation such as buses and trucks.

Utilities have a monopoly by state franchise and are only permitted to earn enough to pay a fair return to investors. They cannot set aside profits to meet the cause of expansion as private industry does. They are regulated by the legislature. The commissions duty is to see the public gets a square deal. Invested capital of the utilities is \$2,000,000. The public pays over \$600,000,000 in fees each year to them.

Public utilities are forced by policy to expand their territory. The Mich. Bell is spending about \$120,000,000 this year. The Consumer's Power and Detroit are each borrowing \$100,000,000 for expansion. The Detroit Edison has 44,000 stockholders.

Public utilities are important. A breakdown of the service of one recently cost 100,000 workmen \$8,700,000 in wages. Unemployment compensation cost \$1,356,800 and it cost the state \$150,000 to process the applications.

Conservation Notes

Upland game hunters will find 3,937 more acres available for public hunting this year. The areas are Barry county 534 acres, Gratiot 630, Saginaw 480, Port Huron 313, Lapeer 643, Ionia 240, Sanilac 300, Dansville 565, St. Joseph 232.

The state will sell at auction half million feet of standing timber in the Grand Sable forest Sept. 24. It is mostly hemlock and hardwoods.

Another effort will be made next week to plant Hungarian partridge when 300 birds will be released in Menominee county.

12,000 acres of state owned lands in Marquette and Iron will be offered at auction for iron next week.

A large deer concentration in the Mio district is reported. In 1947 103,678 hunters bagged 31,215 deer.

By request of the board of supervisors any county can open their county to bear hunting.

Gladwin county leads in fox bounties with 833, Chippewa was second with 829, Wexford 3rd with 744.

Despite the fact that the farmers are crossed over buckshot deer hunting in Southern Michigan and will probably invoke the Horton Trespass Law to keep hunters off their farm, there are 125,000 acres of state owned land in this area which may be hunted on.

Railroad companies have built 400 miles of plowed safety strips in the state the past year along their right of way to cut down forest fires.

ELECTION RESULTS

The primary election as usual drew a light vote, was true to form except in a few instances. The landslide to Dewey for president was not manifested and in Wayne county the Democrats lost 30,000 more votes than the Republicans. The same held true in other cities where labor has evidently not accepted Dewey. In Grand Rapids, Cong. Jonkman, an architect and isolationist who bore the Frank McKay label was defeated by a 35 year old war veteran and former U. of M. football player, Judge Willis Lyons won the nomination for circuit judge handily, carrying both Livingston and Showassee counties. His opponent will be Mike Carland, a young lawyer who campaigned extensively and is well liked. There were few contests in county where the Democrat party has practically disappeared, have only candidates for sheriff and coroner. In Detroit last time was voted down by 3000 majority. We hope this settles the question for all time as trying to operate on two different kinds of time is an aggravation. Cong. Blackney won renomination easily and Adrian deBoer was nominated for the legislature. Like Pinckney he is an old time school teacher. Mennen Williams, son of a wealthy Grosse Pointe family who made their fortune in soap is the Democrat nominee for governor by means of CIO and AFL backing. Little is known of him except he served on the liquor control commission by Rep.

Current Comment

The Franklin D. Roosevelt exposures are still being published and we have read most of them. Little is told but what is already known and instead of putting the late president off his pedestal, they show the smallness and narrow intellect of the writers. President Roosevelt's position is secure in history and always will be. Two things will keep him there. 1. He established the principle that the national government should be instrument of service to the people. 2. He established federal responsibility for relief. Previously it was a local problem. Although his opponents condemn him and all his works, strange to say there is nothing in the platform condemning these two principles.

The drive against the so called comic books continues. Recently Detroit police got after them and banned a large number from the city news stands.

We believe Ann Arbor took similar action. The move seems to be nation wide. In Savannah, Georgia, the schools have banned them and announced all bringing them to school will be expelled. We do not know whether these books incite violence or not. They take the comic strip characters and have them perform impossible feats. It's a waste of time reading them but undoubtedly they enjoy a wide circulation among the agers.

Nobody knows anything about marriage until they get into it many are the pitfalls due to ignorance. To correct this, Rev. Emmett Detroit educator has introduced a marriage course at the University of Detroit. The classes will be held two hours each Wednesday and only women will be taught in the fall semester and men in the spring.

The courses will deal with: 1. Marriage Preparation; 2. Marriage Legislation; 3. Causes of Success; 4. Failure of Marriage; 5. Problems of Married Life.
