Michigan Mirror

At a cost of \$1 a year Michigan has acquired a governor's home and it is the 33rd state to have one. It was built 73 years ago by Orlando Barnes, a prominent Democrat who once ran for governor. It has been vacant for years and will cost \$75,000 to remodel. Lansing got it on a tax deal. The state has taken a 50 year lease.

Aroused by killing of 200,000 fish in the Kalamazoo river by cyanide the state is considering starting action against industrial firms who dump refuse in public waters. The United Steel Products of Albion was the offender. As a result of the primary new senators and legislators will take their seat in Lansing next Jan. 1. Many long time members were beaten.

County governments went in the red \$8 millions in 1947. Revenues totalled \$88.6 millions and expenditures \$96.8 millions. County road commissions received \$26,118,000 from the state and spent \$26,981,000.

Mich. state parks enjoyed an attendance of 11.5 million persons last year. The conservation dept. now manages 130,171 acres of recreational lands.

In an effort to control state printing cost of publications the post of printing director was created. All state agencies must get their printing through the director. Printing costs are \$100,000,000 a year.

Property assessments are not uniform around the state says the state bar ass'n. which asks the governor to appoint a com. and give the state tax commission power to equalize assessments.

The Wayne County Medical Society has asked oculists and opticians to discontinue the rebate system whereby part of the cost of glasses are rebated to them without the knowledge of the patients. The Better Business Bureau has been working on this.

Discovery of a new process to extract iron from low grade ore costing \$2 a ton assures employment for thousands of miners in the upper peninsula.

If prices reach their peak as forecast this winter then sales tax collections will soar despite state prophesizing of a deficit.

Conservation Notes

The nations foresters will meet at Blaney Park, upper peninsula, Sept. 27, 28.

Michigan's share of the Pittman Robinson wild life restoration fund is \$539,031, the largest on record.

There are according to a recent bird census 4 times as many grouse in the upper peninsula as the lower.

There are 39 Farmers Williamston Plan hunting areas in Michigan this year with 143,482 acres which is 17000 more than 1947. They have issued 1900 gate signs 29,365 boundary signs 9,685 printed hunting signs, 725 safety zone signs and 600 refuge signs. Hunting is allowed by ticket only.

A "Tree Farm" program in recognition of the Michigan owners of 11,000 acres of woodlots and forests is being launched this week.

JUDGE COLLINS MEMORIAL

In a letter commenting on the memorial service to be given for the late Judge Joseph Sept. 27, W. E. Robb of Howell mentions the different judges who have presided over the Livingston-Shiawassee court circuit. Judge Rollin Person of Howell was the first one and he was appointed by Gov. Ed Winans, Democrat, in 1891. In 1892, Gov. John Rich, a Republican took over and appointed Luke ... Howell. He lived less than a year & Stearns Smith was appointed to succeed him. He was later elected. In 1905 Seldon S. Miner was elected and served 2 terms. In 1917 Judge Collins was elected and served until his death this year. Frank Shields is the only member of the Livingston county bar still alive who was practicing when Mr. Robb came to Howell in 1903. Mr. Robb served two terms as prosecuting attorney.

ROY DARWIN

Roy Darwin, 72, a former Pinckney resident, died at Lansing last Tuesday of a heart attack. He had been to the bank and was on his way home in his car when he had the fatal seizure on Kalamazoo St. He expired almost at once. His car hit another one but did little damage. The deceased was in the employ of the Pere Marquette rail road for years and was agent at a number of places. He had a farm here which he sold in 1932.

Surviving are his wife and son, Seth. The funeral was Thursday at the Estes-Leadley Funeral Home in Lansing Thursday with burial in Evergreen cemetery.

Notes on the Game

Handicapped by injuries, 4 men being sidelined and over zealous officials who penalized them nearly 100 yards, Pinckney was lucky to get a 7 to 0 verdict over Eastern Lansing B team last Thursday night. Pinckney beat this team 26 to 20 last year. They might have amassed the same total this year if the fates had not conspired against them.

Pinckney started with a rush and with Bob Amburgey circling end and Tom Goode hitting the line soon reached the scoring line. Then the penalties started coming thick and fast and soon had them behind the 8 ball. Finally in the second quarter Bob Amburgey went around end for 30 yards to the 6 yard line. He went over on the next play but the ball was called back and Pinckney penalized. Not to be denied, Pinckney continued their assault and Jerry Heath went 5 yards through the line for a touch down. Bob Amburgey passed to Joe Jeffreys for the extra point.

In the second half Pinckney made more first downs but usually drew penalties when they got in the shadow of the goal posts. Pinckney only threw a couple of passes both of which were incomplete and tried no razzle dazzle. Bob Amburgey and Tom Goode did most of the ball carrying with Jerry Heath hitting the line.

Lansing found the Pinckney line tough and gained little on line plays most of their were on passes. One the 2nd period put them inside the Pinckney 30 and in the second half another pass put them in scoring reach but both times Pinckney held them to no gains. Lansing also committed a number of short passes.

The Pinckney line looked good. It is probably as heavy a line as Pinckney ever had. Jerry Clark looked good and made a lot of tackles.

Friday Pinckney plays their toughest game when they meet Brighton there. Brighton beat the Pinckney team last year 32 to 0 and have won both games so far.

Current Comment

Last month at a meeting of the village council a committee was appointed to contact the Henry Ford family and see if a plan cannot be worked out to restore the dam on the Pinckney mill pond which was one of the principal community assets for many years. So far they went to Dearborn last week Thursday and met with the real estate man of the Ford family. They were told the property is for sale and asked to make an offer. They had been empowered to offer \$2500 which was rejected as the Fords have an offer of \$3500 from another person. Now we understand it bought for less than \$6000. This spread on the tax roll would not be such a large amount. Many people seem to have the idea that a plan can be worked out whereby the Ford family will restore the dam and it won't cost the village a cent. Well, they won't. The Ford family have definitely abandoned all rural projects and are disposing of them as fast as possible. Last week at a special election the village of Milan voted to buy the Ford holdings there for \$45,000. The power house they will use for city offices, the soy bean mill for a community hall and the dam and 75 acres of land for park. They figure the Ford holdings are worth that much to the community. In Pinckney a similar situation exists. If the community thinks the Ford property is worth \$6000 as a community asset, then should be taken to acquire it. If they prefer the unsightly dam and dam left by the dam when it went out, then the best thing to do is to forget about it. The proposition will be threshed out at the council meeting on October 12 next.

The senseless killing of a young tax-driver near Willow for a sum less than \$25 again brings out the inadequacy of the average home and the institutions set up to curb juvenile delinquency. Willard Swarout, the 17 year old boy who confessed to the crime was feeble minded and so was his mother, who died 11 years ago at the age of 37 after bearing 6 or 7 children. The father who drank deserted them and the state took charge. Some of the children were placed in T.B. institutions other in mental institutions and young Swarout was placed in the Wayne county training school where he ran away 25 times. Finally he was given a job in a factory and paroled to an aunt. He seems to have done fairly well here until he met an ex convict named Baksi last Labor Day. Baksi had a dishonorable discharge from the army and had served a term in Ionia. He was a coward and a braggart and turned Swarout's head boasting of the easy money to be made in holdups. Swarout quit his job, got a 22 pistol which wouldn't shoot and joined him. Saturday night Sept. 18 was set to start their life of crime. The plan was to rob spooners in River Rouge park, steal their car and hold up oil stations. The plan failed probably because Baksi lost his nerve. Then they decided to rob a taxi driver and steal his cab. Again Baksi's yellow streak showed up and he got panicky and killed taxi driver without any warning. Once more society had paid an awful price for their indifference and failure to curb juvenile delinquency.


