Michigan Mirror

LANSING—The Alice in Wonderland aspect of our postwar economic life is illustrated currently in the demand of Michigan's youngest and largest labor union the United Automobile Workers CIO, for a 1949 wage increase of "at least" 20 percent.

That a union is seeking better living conditions for its members via a larger pay check or less working hours, is not news.

That this union is asking the same to "restore the living standards of four years ago is not new either. Collective bargaining, like horse trading, consists of asking for more than you hope to get.

However, it is important that the UAW believes American industry could afford to grant such a drastic wage boost (without necessity of increasing prices, of course) because of one fact: Profits are high.

Nat Weinberg, UAW research director, reasons it this way: Corporations are now paying out wages and salaries at a rate of \$87 billion a year. A 20 percent increase would amount to \$17.4 billions. Since corporation profits before taxes are running at a rate of \$35 billions a year, a wage and salary increase of this magnitude would leave \$17.6 billions.

Then after corporation taxes are paid, the net profit left would be \$10.8 billions. This amount would be greater than the peak war time earnings of 1944. And \$10.8 billions, so Weinberg reasons logically, should be plenty for stock holders.

Now all this makes good sense if you are willing to accept these figures as being the whole truth. However, they are not. Before you reach a final conclusion, please consider the following: Almost two thirds of all corporation earnings (profits) today are being plowed back to finance plants and equipment! In terms of dollars, more than \$13 billions are being spent to buy better tools, to make possible better American products!

Why? Because many persons are reluctant to invest in common stocks and securities when federal personal income taxes may take up to 77 percent of profit dividends. We find ourselves again at the crossroads. If industry try cannot finance its own needs out of earnings, the inevitable alternative is for the government to do it. Such is England's solution for economic security under a labor government.

More state socialism is the choice of the UAW. We are well on the road already. Nationalization of industry is the new pot of gold at the end of the rainbow.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The dept shipped a million and a half 1949 fishing licenses to 3,500 dealers before the Xmas rush. A past season roadside count of cock and female pheasants has been completed by mail carriers in 40 counties.

The fur trapping season ends Dec. 31 except for badger and skunk and some muskrat and mink in the Lake Erie marshes.

Trapping permits went down 15 percent this year as compared to 1947.

Hunters are again requested to send in their game kill report cards for 1948.

Bounty payments dropped to \$6-240.00 in Nov., the lowest since July.

More than 1000 muskrats worth \$3000 have been snared by less than a dozen trappers in the Brighton state recreation area.

According to Bruce Jones, county conservation officer about 150 deer were shot in Livingston county this year. 40 percent were killed in Deerfield. One hunter was wounded and one cow shot by mistake in this county.



Current Comment

Another year has passed and the outlook is not a great deal different than it was a year ago. Prices are still going up, the cost of living has increased and a whole flock of wage boosts are expected to meet rising costs. It would seem that it couldn't be much longer before the peak was reached and then if lessons of the past mean anything the price drop will be about four times as fast as the rise. In the world at large affairs are still precarious. There is intense fighting in Greece. The Holy Land, China and now Indonesia. In Berlin, Russia apparently has the upper hand. She has enforced a blockade of all railroads, truck lines etc. which she has made work. The only way people in the American sector there can be supplied is by plane and all food, fuel etc. has to be flown in. This can not continue indefinitely. In the meantime we are busy preparing for war and the draft has been reinstated. Any overt act could plunge us into another conflict for which we are not prepared. That is why Gen. Clay's offer to break the Russian blockade in 48 hours with a fleet of tanks was not accepted. Just what 1949 will bring forth is anybody's guess.

A crisis has arrived for the U. N. and the manner in which it handles that case will prove whether it survives or becomes a more sounding board like the defunct League of Nations. This crisis is the Indonesian affair. These Java island were held by Holland and the outbreak of the World War II and were captured by Japan. After the defeat of Japan she gave them up and Indonesia republic was formed. Holland was hard hit by the war and the loss of these islands dealt her a much of her revenue such as coffee, coconuts, rubber etc. So Holland pulled a Pearl Harbor and landing a surprise force there recaptured them. This leaves the U. N. in a bad position as so far the Dutch have ingnored their demands that they withdraw from the islands. It has also started much propaganda against the UN here as it is charged that Holland used the lend-lease funds obtained under the Marshall plan to finance the expedition against Java. She got \$300,000,000. The big trouble with the United Nations is that she is powerless to enforce her demands. Jealousy among the members has so far prevented her from being given a suitable force to carry out her orders.

The supreme court has just handed down a decision in the barmaids case. It is that women can not be employed behind the bar in taverns, beer gardens, night clubs etc. unless they are wives, sisters or daughters of the proprietor but they can serve drinks at tables in such establishments. This would seem to be splitting straws with a vengeance. It also upheld the states right to license bartenders at \$2 a year. According to the news report the bartenders union is responsible for this case getting to the supreme court. They have a strong organization and do not want competition from women. The barmaids have not given up the fight. Ann Davison, att. for the Dearborn Barmaids Ass'n. says her organization will try to have the new Mich. legislature pass a law legalizing women barmaids.

STRONG ARMS FOR TELEPHONE POLES—
 Ever stop to think how much extra weight an ice storm can add to telephone wires? Cross-arms on telephone poles must be strong enough to stand up under the strain. 


