The recent Democrat state convention has provided the republicans with a brand new issue for use in the coming election. It is the use of state highway maintenance.

The new issue is highly explosive and many leaders are again at it but on the other hand other Republican leaders think a sharp attack is the only way to win.

The new issue is the CIO control of the Democrat party, which dictated all the nominations at party convention. It is true the CIO opposed the renomination of Chief Justice Edward Sharpe whose decisions have never favored labor but accepted him because Gov. Williams demanded him.

The Republicans fear that high way and educational issues are not enough to cross the voters and are willing to stir up the unions on the chance they may benefit from a huge protest vote.

\$30,000 will be spent this year to flood 8 state land projects for waterfowl protection. One is the Chilson pond in the Brighton area where 50 acres will be flooded and the other is the Hosley pond in Oak Grove where 12 acres will be flooded.

50 wild hen pheasants trapped in the Thumb area have arrived at the Mason game farm. Only 4 cocks were caught.

The record fish was speared in Mullet Lake, Cheboygan last week when 13 year old Samuel McGunagle reared a 110 lb. sturgeon, 6 ft., 4 in. long.

School News

A meeting of the planning committee consisting of one rep. from each school dist. was held at the school Monday night. All of the 15 schools were represented except the Cnubbs Corners, Marble and Wincans Lake.

The procedure for calling a school reorganization vote was outlined. The first step is to circulate petitions in your district to find out the sentiment for and against it. 51 percent of the votes are required out signatures of at least 60 percent is more acceptable.

After the sentiment has been ascertained in this way by which it is found how many dist. wish to enter the reorganization, the cost of a suitable building to house them is estimated and the tax necessary to build it computed. Then another set of petitions calling for an election are circulated. After this is held another vote is taken on bonding for a building.

Just what kind of a building and how large would be necessary has not been decided. One method suggested is to make 4 class rooms out of the gym* and build a new gym and field house. The present one is not large enough.

A reorganization meeting is to be held Friday night at the Young love school.

The Pinckney school board wishes to deny that any Pinckney grade pupils would have to attend dist. schools if the reorganization goes through. Nothing of the sort is contemplated.

NEW SCHOOL VOTED

Lake Orion voters Monday approved a \$480,000 bond issue to build an elementary school. It calls for a 9 mill additional tax for 20 years.

THE COUNTY JAIL

In the County Press of last week the question was asked, why the County Jail could not be repaired or rebuilt, with the \$50,000 laid aside for that purpose.

The board of supervisors have no choice.

The present jail has been condemned several times by the State Inspector of Jails.

This time they were given to understand that it would be officially closed unless work was started to build a new building.

The present building being in such condition that it is a fire hazard and insanitary and unsafe.

If the county should be left with out a jail, the cost of transporting inmates to other outside jails and back to court would cost taxpayers enough money extra in a very few years to build a new building.

It is the opinion of the board of supervisors that 3 mills levied on the county valuation will complete a new building.

Church Merger

Rev. D. D. Brady of the local Cong'l church does not think the groups oppose the merger of the Cong'l Christian and Evangelical reformed church will go very far. The proposition carried at Cleveland almost 6 to 1. On the merger question the vote was for Michigan to merge: Yes 64; No. 117. On the second proposition to accept the merger if a majority voted for it the vote was: Yes 102; No. 65. This was by church.

In Michigan the vote by members was on proposition No. 1 to merge: Yes 5,843; No. 3,546. On proposition No. 2 to accept it if carried: Yes 6,707; No. 4,181.

Out of 60,000 members only 14,000 voted.

In fact there were several votes taken on the merger. The vote at the national meeting at Oberlin last June was 1000 for and 13 against the merger.

There were two votes taken in Michigan. The first was 64 yes and 117 no. On the second vote after the Oberlin meeting 32 churches switched making the yes 98 no 85. The Pinckney church also voted yes on the second vote.

The anti-merger forces have plenty of money and are making a lot of noise. The report that the Chicago churches are against the merger is refuted by the fact 47 church signed a resolution approving it.

Published statements to the effect that many churches will not enter into the merger are not based on fact as no such action has been voted upon.

RIGHT ABOUT FACE

The state senate reversed themselves and legalized the sale of colored oleo 21 to 7 1/2 cents off 90 days after adjournment. As there is a 10c federal tax on the colored will cost 10c more a lb. than plain.

PYRAMID CLUBS

A new form of gambling has hit Michigan known as the pyramid club. The way they operate is for a person to invite 16 friends in their home for an evening. \$2 each is put up. A pyramid is formed with the promoter at the top. The 16 people in turn invite 16 friends and repeat the procedure. If the chain is unbroken for 15 days the promoter wins \$4,096 and the No. 2 man moves to the first and the procedure is repeated. The clubs are said to have 50,000 members in Wayne county and also exist in Washtenaw and Livingston.

WAS A SUCCESS

The dance at the school given by the Civic Imp. Ass'n Saturday was a success. As all were out and not in yet the financial aspect is not known but it is expected to be a small profit. The orchestra which cost over \$50 gave good satisfaction.

Despite frenzied efforts to hold them up there are indications of a huge price drop. Wheat fell below \$2 a bushel last week for the first time in 2 years. Livestock prices have also slumped, this being hastened by the blizzards in the west which caused the cattle market to be glutted. The gov. has also cut shipments of grain and meat abroad. In N. Y. the price of a cup of coffee has been cut from 15c to 12c and cereal from 25c to 15c. Farmers are demanding more government crop price supports and in N. Y. landlords are preparing to ask the government for a floor on rentals to protect landlords. Well, it was a wonderful joyride while it lasted but all joyrides eventually come to an end.

Current Comment

We had to understand just by what process of obvious reason. Why the other rural members of the legislature came to the conclusion that they should not support the bill which was voted by the people by a big majority. It is interesting to see the law makers who voted for it, the legislators who voted to adopt it, and the legislators who again went to the people for that adoption. If the legislators adopted it they could have demanded that the people accept it. If they can only be demanded by a vote of the people. The Milk Producers led the fight to kill it in the legislature. It shows their shortightedness. Well, very little is made in Mich. and many of the farmers using oleo themselves we cannot see where the support against the sale of colored oleo can come from. In fact he wanted to see the law protects the industry and no longer the oleo. The Milk Producers would have shown more foresight if they had demanded just how they would use oleo in Michigan. They should have pulled their heads out of the sand.

The election last Nov. Condemned Pinckney of the one member, General,ingham and a majority of the voters won by a landslide. The opposition, George Swarthout, had petitioned for a recall. After considerable time was consumed to start on that Monday the Cong'l. Assembly had to go to county and spend a great deal of time stopping Swarthout from opening the ballot boxes. Last night Pinckney lost his own county, Genesee by 100 votes. 


