Michigan Mirror

For the first time since the war sales tax collections have slumped. February collections decreased 1.4 percent. Cigarette collections however, went up 3 percent.

A bill has been introduced to give cities to levy excise taxes. The spring election is in 2 one-half weeks. There will be no proposals submitted for amending the constitution. The election is important as the party which wins state high, com. and supt. of public inst. will control the administrative board.

County, municipal and school taxes rose 15.78 percent last yr. They were \$39 million higher than in 1947.

The Hoover commission recommends that the state agricultural dept. take over some of the federal duties to avoid duplication. Also the record system be modernized. It now costs more than \$10 to process a \$10 order.

Howell has a new system of enforcing the parking meter ordinance. In overtime parking the officer puts in a nickel and leaves a note asking the car owner to send \$10 to the police dept. This covers a stamp and cost of envelope.

The Oakland county citizens league wants the state to appoint a commission similar to the Hoover one to cut expense of administration.

The stateman has been made that Gov. Williams 4 percent corporate income tax will drive industry from Michigan. The dept. of Economic Development is making a study of this question.

Angels of Mercy, Ethiopian Style



Only a hundred doctors and a few dozen nurses were available until recently to care for Ethiopia's total population of some 12,000,000. Now, with the aid of the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO), training programs in all parts of the country are turning out the necessary help to relieve the critical shortage of medical personnel.

Conservation Notes

Light snowfall has reduced the winter fish kill from lack of oxygen to the smallest in years. 500,734 small game hunters and 286,651 deer hunters committed a misdemeanor when they failed to file game kill report cards last year.

The conservation dept. favors a closed season on pheasants. The 10,000 deer below the Bay City Muskegon line in Michigan are home grown. They thrive owing to milder climate and food abundance and due to the fact they are protected by law. They are in every county in Michigan including Wayne. For the first time in 58 years they were hunted last year.

A pheasant will eat 4 ounces of grain a day.

Wayne county was second in the state last year with \$15,000,000 worth of salt cement and clay products.

Seventy-five students from Ann Arbor, Dearborn and Highland Park will spend the week of May 6 at Cedar Lake in the Waterloo recreation area studying conservation.

Water levels rose 1 of an inch in February.

Northward migration of larvae, Bluebirds and red winged black birds was two weeks earlier this year.

Current Comment

Judging by the mass trials of clergyman in Hungary and Bulgaria one could conclude that the criminal classes in those countries were composed mostly of members of the ministerial professions. These men of the cloth are pleading guilty to black market speculations, foreign currency manipulation which seems to be the No. 1 crime there. In no instance do we hear of any clergyman being acquitted. Of course such a conclusion is bunk for what is going on in these communist controlled countries is nothing more or less than a program of purge against religion such as Hitler conducted against the Jews during his heyday in Germany. Any organization such as religious groups are classed as enemies of Communism and subject to a purge. Communism is atheistic and there is no room for both it and religion in a Communist country.

A bill has been introduced in the legislature to prohibit the sale of any periodical in which national advertisements appear. The sponsors are Reps. O'Brien and Carey of Detroit. The cause of course are the recent "Lonely Heart" murders in Grand Rapids. We don't know what going to extremes is the right thing to do in such cases. National publications have flourished from time immemorial and because murders have used them to get in touch with victims should not necessarily call for their abolishment. We know of at least two cases in which local people consummated successful marriages through them. Besides here is a question of the freedom of the press.

The robbery of the streamlined Chesapeake & Ohio train in West Virginia last week was more like a movie plot or rather, under Way back in the days of the James Bros. in Missouri after the civil war train robberies were not uncommon and a James took part in several. When the motion pictures came along the first films made was the "Great Train Robbery". Train robbery was extremely hazardous and the robbers soon turned to banks and payroll robberies as less difficult and paying bigger dividends. The W. Virginia affair is only about the second such robbery in the past 40 years and it seems to have been perpetrated by a couple of young desperados on the spur of a moment. Their entire loot totalled only about \$2000.

The late Carrie Nation probably turned over in her grave last week when the state of Kansas wet wet after some 59 years of prohibition. The state went dry in the eighties but the effect was nullified after the supreme court ruled that package liquor could be shipped into it from other states. This made the securing of liquor easy by shipment. Carrie Nation of Kansas was a rabid prohibitionist and recruiting a mob of women, students etc. she armed them with hatchets and raided liquor dispensing places smashing windows, bar mirrors, bottles and kegs of liquor. Although often arrested she never served more than 7 days in jail. Afterwards she went on lecture tour, visited Detroit twice, Ann Arbor once sold tiny hatchets, souvenirs and even went to England. She her lectures and used considerable money which was away.

Base Ball fans are eagerly awaiting to see if Red Rolfe, the new manager of the Detroit Tigers will prove to be the same kind of a miracle man that the late Hughie Jennings was. Hughie Jennings came to Detroit in 1907, replacing Bill Armour. With practically the same team that Armour had in 1906 and finished in 6th place, he added Claude Rossman a slugging first baseman purchased from Cleveland, he won the pennant and repeated in 1908 and 1909. Rolfe is not a Hughie Jennings as he will direct from the bench while Hughie was at 3rd base dancing flags and yelling "E-yah."

New Plymouth on Display



Plymouth's new special deluxe four-door sedan (above). Throughout the new Plymouth line beautifully streamlined bodies are lower and narrower, seats are wider and headroom greater. Brilliant new styling is combined with outstanding riding comfort, increased roominess, and sweeping mechanical improvements in the new line of Plymouth automobiles. Completely redesigned, the new Plymouth has a longer wheelbase for a better ride and more road stability, but less front and rear overhang for easier parking and garaging. While the silhouette has been lowered and the width decreased, there is more head and leg room and seats are wider. Typical of Plymouth's many refinements is the ignition-starter combination, with which a turn of the key starts the engine.

The new Plymouths are sleek in appearance. New rear-end styling provides a graceful balance with the horizontal grille lines which emphasize the broadness of the front. Special deluxe models are: four-door sedan, club coupe, convertible club coupe and station wagon. In the deluxe group are the four-door sedan and the club coupe. In addition, Plymouth offers three deluxe models on a standard new 111-inch wheelbase, a two-door sedan, a three-passenger coupe, and a new body type, the Suburban.

The 97-horsepower engine has improved performance and efficiency with a new design cylinder head which increases compression ratio and detaches, thus avoiding sheet metal panels so costly to repair or replace. Compression piston ring reduces cylinder wear and provides greater protection during the break-in period. There are improved oil rings for greater oil economy, while a newly-designed intake manifold ignites quicker, smoother engine warm-up and produces faster throttle response.

Body styling which produces greater passenger room without excessive bulk also increases visibility. V-type windshield has 57 percent more area and provides excellent vision without reflection. Windshield wipers clear 615 percent greater area and the rear window is 34 percent larger.




