Higher taxes or economy is the chief issue in the Michigan legislative session.

The corporation profits tax is being pushed by the governor to avert the growing deficit resulting from returning 75 percent of the sales tax to local governments.

The corporation tax is bottled up in committee. Republicans are said to favor economies instead of a new tax. If they do not advocate what items should be cut the state will be in the red. The trouble with appropriation cuts is that no member wants his favorite appropriation cut. He wants the other fellow to take the cut.

The Mich. Good Roads Federation headed by Senator Higgins would improve highways by increasing the gasoline and weight tax \$29,000,000. The highway's 5/8 cent is at stake they claim.

If the house approves the bill outlawing gambling at horse races the state will lose \$3,000,000 a year. The senate passed it 22 to 2. This is linked to the tangled affairs of the state fair grounds at Detroit. A bill to appoint a board to run the grounds is tied up because the governor has the appointments to make. The advocated celebration is also stymied for the same reason.

Consolidation of state agencies are advocated as an economy measure. Among those are the tax commission, labor dept. and revenue dept. also the hospital survey, state safety commission vocational licensing commission and stream control. Their duties would be given to other depts.

The board of education would be given the duties of the boards for vocational education, state tenure, board of librarians and historical commission. The dept. of health the crippled childrens commission and the tuberculosis sanitariums commission. The hd. of the state police would be abolished.

Conservation Notes



Current Comment

We read with much curiosity the many bouquets thrown the late Gov. Chase S. Osborn who passed away last week. He was governor from 1911 to 1913 and in those days was regarded in the same way that Henry Wallace is now, very able, but a little screwy, and irresponsible. He entered politics by way of appointment being named as a member of the U. of M. by Gov. Fred Woodbridge who preceded him in office. He was elected governor in 1910 and ran on an anti-Warner platform in which he blasted Gov. Warner on all occasions. He defeated Warner's favorite candidate, Pat Kelly in the primaries and was elected. Becoming governor he was usually at loggerheads with the legislature and vetoed every appropriation that body made including money for buildings at practically every Mich. college. Gov. Ferris who succeeded him approved these much needed appropriations. His highest achievement as governor was to get a presidential primary law passed which was later repealed under another governor as delegates to the national convention were ignoring it. In the 1912 presidential election he first endorsed Bill Tait then gave a press interview favoring Woodrow Wilson and finally went over to Teddy Roosevelt. In 1914 he again ran for governor but lost to Woodbridge Ferris a Democrat to whom the Republicans were opposed. Osborn backed in 1918 but lost to Truman who was later indicted for frauds and tried. One of the principal reasons against him. This ended his political career although his name continued to get him front page. He later married a wife of 40 years and she died he again regained enough to again make the front page by marrying his secretary who was 30 years his junior. This bouquet throwing is all right but the Detroit Free Press and News were not throwing any at the late governor back in 1912. Then they greatly resembled bricks.

We read in the papers of a funeral of an Amish bishop in Pa. last week who had 125 horse drawn carriages in his funeral procession. Back in the horse and buggy days the more of these you had in your funeral cortege the more important you were. Many a time have we counted the carriages in these processions. We remember one in which we counted 90. That endured for a number of years until an old handman died. His parade to the cemetery was headed by a brass band and his carriage count was way over 100 carriages. These days are gone except for the Amish who do not use autos.

Oregon theatres are fighting a bill in the legislature there which would ban the sale of popcorn and peanuts in theatres. The reason is that theatre goers make so much noise eating popcorn and peanuts that the people cannot hear the sound pictures. Not only patrons but theatre owners are up in arms over it. The owners say without the proceeds from the sale of popcorn and peanuts they could not break even.

Two hundred barmaids descended on the legislature last Thurs. to demand that the law against barmaids in Michigan be repealed. They brought many witnesses with them who testified that maids behind the bar kept better order and raised the moral atmosphere in such places to a great extent. 
