State Treas. Bruke scouts the idea that consolidation of state departments and agencies will solve the state's financial problem. The only way to do this he claims is for the state to discontinue services to the people totalling some \$50 million. All major consolidation to date has only served to increase expenses.

The state of Mich. received \$462,982,857.58. Of this amount of tax money the state exercised control over but \$221 millions, or 30 percent. The rest of the money went back to the schools, counties, highway dept. cities and townships.

Republicans hope to avert new taxes by gaining \$12 million more by plugging sales tax leaks \$20 more by a used car tax, \$11 million by shifting to the school districts payment on teachers retirement pensions and \$6 by not repealing the old age assistance law. However, this may all be wishful thinking.

Check forgers bilked Mich out of \$15 million last year by getting checks to accept checks not properly identified. Driver's license with a photograph is the only sense card or police identification true identification.

Mich. direct relief load is the highest since Feb. 1942. Living costs have dropped for the 3th consecutive month.

County road commissions favor a boost of \$29,000,000 in gasoline and weight taxes.

Call old age pensions are \$75 a month at the age of 62.

A new type of building block made of concrete and sawdust is being tested at Mich State College. A home was built of it 22 by 24 at a cost of \$1500.

School News

SCHOOL REORGANIZATION

While not a large attendance was present at school reorganization meeting held at the Pinckney school for Putnam Dist. No. 2 Wednesday, a good meeting was had and many points cleared up.

The preliminary meetings have now all been held and the next step underway here is the circulation of trial petitions among the dists. desiring to come into the reorganization. When these petitions have all been circulated those in which over 51 percent of the voters signed favoring reorganization will be taken to the state dept. of public inst. at Lansing and permission asked to hold a reorganization election. The Pinckney school dist. will vote as a unit and all the rural dists. as a unit. We understand that the Younglove and Chubb Corners dists. may not come in but will send their pupils to Howell. The Smith dist. on NW Terr Rd. had a delegation here Wednesday to find out if it would be possible for them to come into the reorganization plan.

Figures compiled by the state dept. at Lansing show receipts of the proposed reorganized dist. would be \$169,055.36 and expenditures for the first year of operation of \$125,200.00. An 8 room building would be needed to house the pupils which cost \$80,000.00. This would cost the taxpayers 12 mills a year, 8 for operation and 4 for school debt. The building would be paid for in 7 years.

In regard to the 4 mills now being levied for school debt. This would be abolished by paying it out of the sales tax. At the present time \$1,000 a year is paid on the principal and \$350 interest.

The people of this section are offered little alternative. If a reorganization plan is not approved the Pinckney high school will be closed and busses will have to be bought to transport the pupils to Howell or Ann Arbor, depending on which place will take them. This cost including tuition would be considerably more than that of reorganization.

So far judging by the vote results, reorganization is favored. Chelsea, South Lyon, Milan, Manchester, Fowlerville, Ann Arbor and Milford have all voted school building programs. Some of the dists. had a high enough valuation to do this without taking in rural dists. Brighton, Stockbridge, Howell and Dexter are working on similar programs.

The Pottsville and Cady districts signed the petitions 100 percent. In the Sprout 33 out of 34, in Pinckney 85 percent signed. In the other districts the circulating of petitions is not completed. Mr. Reader talked before a meeting of 100 at Portage Lake last night and got a favorable reception.

Items of Interest

Detroit police, are holding Theodore Hilles, 19, former Pinckney boarding orphan who is said to have confessed to the slaying of George Counter, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Counter of 825 Warwick Ave. Detroit. The child's dead body was found behind a furnace in the basement of the Murray Hall garage where the Hilles boy lived with his father and an older brother Albert Hilles worked in an auto store on Third Ave. He and his wife separated 6 years ago and their several children were taken over by Catholic Youth Organizations except the oldest, George, 21, who remained with his father. Theodore is said not to have been normal. He suffered from rheumatic fever and was hospitalized for 4 years. He was moody and did not get along with other children. He was listed as a delinquent, once driving away an auto, once for arson and several times running away from boarding homes where the Catholic Society had placed him. About 6 years ago he was placed on the farm of Mrs. Edna Spears west of Pinckney. He was only in the 4th grade in school and a poor student. While here he was in an auto accident and suffered a broken arm. He ran away from here 2 years ago and went to live with his father. He had several jobs including one as usher in a theatre but did not hold them. A week ago he was in Pinckney and stayed all night with a family near Anderson.

After killing the Counter boy he packed his few belongings and hitchhiked to Howell and thence to Pinckney. The alarm went out and he was arrested on M-36 near the Edward Spears home by State Troopers Teddy and Mahon of the Brighton post. He readily admitted the crime.

PINCKNEY ROBBERS ARRESTED

Last Month. The Pinckney postoffice was entered and a note burned through the safe door with a acetylene torch. In doing this the robbers set off a tear gas cartridge and were driven out by gas before they got in the safe. Detroit police arrested 6 men and 3 women last week whom U. S. Postal Inspector O.L. Klein claims are responsible for the robbery of 7 postoffices, vis. Wilcox, Drayton Plains, Lincoln Park, Ecorse, New Hudson, Grosse Ile and Pinckney.

The suspects are Wm. Brown and wife, Robert Brown and wife, Lester Brown and wife, Harold Tolliver, Robert Adle and Francis Roberts. The men are all ex-convicts and out on parole. The 3 Browns are brothers. They are believed responsible for 90 burglaries and safe cracking in Southern Michigan.

The deceased was the daughter of the late Dick and Mary Howard Bell of Dover or Birkett. She married Wm. Gregory of that place in 1904. He died in 1932. For a number of years she has engaged in tulip culture and last year had over 8000 different kinds in bloom. Surviving are a son and daughter, 2 sisters and 3 brothers, Louis, Stanley and Don of Portage Lake.

Current Comment

Since the newspaper article in which the warden of Southern Michigan prison stated he would reduce the canary bird population there by limiting each prisoner to one bird he has received 78 letters inquiring how one may get some of the surplus birds. The warden says there will be no surplus birds. He is trying an experiment in socialism. The trouble was there were not too many birds but that like the wealth of the nation they were being concentrated in the hands of a few prisoners. One prisoner had 65, some none. So the warden will distribute the birds around to the birdless inmates and if there are any left he will allow them to send them to their relatives.

A big battle is brewing in the legislature as to whether the one man grand jury by means of which Ex-Gov. Sigler and Senator Ferguson of Detroit rose to fame shall be continued or the law creating it be repealed. There are strong arguments on both sides. Those for it say it cuts red tape and is the only speedy way to bring political malefactors to justice who would otherwise escape. Those against it claim it gave the judge conducting Hitler like power and rights of the accused are not safeguarded. The report that Ex-Gov. Sigler was to be named special prosecutor to handle the case against his arch foe, Senator Johnson of Mt. Clemens is said to have strengthened the anti-grand jury forces. A compromise bill whereby the number of judges would be increased to 3 has been offered.

European affairs seem to consist of one critical affair after another. The communist forces are forging ahead in China and last week fired on a British warship which tried to run up the Yangtze river past their shore batteries. Some 40 British seamen were killed and others wounded. Two other British ships which came to the aid of the first boat were also driven off. The Communists outnumber the nationals 4 to 1 in China and threaten to completely conquer it. However no country wants war and probably like the Berlin blockade which has endured many months this episode will be overlooked.

This year there will be no debate between the cities and rural districts over daylight saving time as the state has definitely decided to stay on central standard time. However many other states including Ontario, New York, Pa. will switch. The argument was that starting the last week in April the sun comes up earlier and by switching time workers were given an hour more of daylight. This was stressed during World War II as a war economy measure and adopted by many states including Michigan. The big power companies who furnish light and power also supported it. The farmers never liked it as they claimed it started their day before the dew was off the crops. Still the thing that made the time most unpopular was the effort to extend it through the winter months which made people get up in the dark to go to work.

The General Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church has approved the merger with the Cong'l. Christian Church at Cleveland last week by a vote of 249 to 41. The Cong'l plan was the one approved. This is not the end as the 34 synods have to approve these newly adopted articles of the merger. There is considerable difference between the Cong'l and Evangelical interpretations. Still as the opposition to the merger is almost negligible a compromise will undoubtedly be worked out between the two merging bodies. The two merging bodies are also the results of previous mergers. The Cong'l merged with the Christian and the Evangelical with the Reformed.

DR. ANDREW C. ROCHE

Dr. Andrew C. Roche, 74, died at his home in Calumet Monday. He was the son of the late Richard and Alice Farrell Roche of Pinckney and grew to manhood in this vicinity. With his 4 brothers, Malachy, Richard, Michael and William and John, Paul, Lawrence and Louis McCleary, he was an important cog in one of the best ball teams assembled in this section.

He served in the Spanish war with his brothers, Michael and Richard. On his discharge he enrolled in the medical dept. at the University of Michigan and was graduated in 1904. In 1903-04 he played left field on the varsity base ball team with Judge Guy Miller, Jerry Wiley and the late Mayor George Codd of Detroit. Gene Berry of Stockbridge was also a teammate.

After graduation he located at Calumet where he was surgeon for the Calumet & Hecla Mining Co. for many years. Of late years he has been in private practice with his son, Dr. Andrew Roche, a surgeon in World War II. Besides his son, he is survived by his wife, the former Jennie Hopkins of Calumet, 2 daughters, Mrs. Leonard Murphy and Miss Betty Roche of Calumet and 2 brothers, Michael and William of Pinckney. A daughter, Rebecca, is deceased.

The funeral will be at Calumet Friday morning with burial there. Mrs. Louis Stockbridge will go by plane to attend the funeral.
