Michigan Editor

Four months ago Gov. Williams remarked at a press conference "When I get through at Lansing, I trust no one will ever say Williams slept here."

The legislative suit has two weeks to go before adjournment May 20 but little of the proposed program has been enacted.

The program consisted of public housing, liberal workmen's compensation benefits, extension of medical care and disability payments, increased unemployment benefits, fair employment law, more aid for education, increase old age assistance from \$40 to \$60 a month, strict market grading, stream pollution laws. To finance this the governor recommended a corp. profits tax.

Recently he likened the legislature to a bunch of crows flapping their wings over the carcass of the past when they ought to be eagles soaring to meet new notions.

Although the governor was disappointed in the spring election, he still considers his victory last fall a popular mandate from the people. If the state incurs a deficit and it probably will the governor is sure to blame the legislature.

In 1950 the governor will undoubtedly attempt to win reelection by taking a mandate from Pres. Truman's successful attacks on the 80th do-nothing congress. Gov. Kim Sigler in a similar predicament blamed the 1947 legislature for scuttling his program. In a few weeks time the record of the present legislature will be written.



BABY DIES

Last night the Pinckney Fire Dept. was called to Portage Lk. where Phillip Wayne Combs, 4 months old son, was believed to have smothered. The child was dead when they arrived. Dr. W. Wolfe of Dexter said death was due to a heart attack. The baby's father is in Kentucky. The baby and mother were visiting at the Wm. Hoffman home.

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DETAILS OF MURDER

BRIGHTON MERCHANT LES Frank Cline, 83, Brighton court-ly merchant who was strangled and robbed of \$100 by bandits in the late last Tuesday died in Michigan hospital Howell of his wounds Thursday morning. Cline had been in Brighton 17 years most of the time in business. He had 11 children and 19 grandchildren. Tuesday shortly after noon a man came in and bought a polo shirt. Shortly he returned and asked to exchange the shirt. Cline went to the back of the store he followed him and choked him into unconsciousness. Cline was later taken to Michigan hospital Howell, where he was found to have a skull and other injuries. The man was traced to one Walter Andros who has a small store 3 miles west of Brighton. He and another man, Donald Fisher, were seen at Brighton the night before. Andros and Fisher were taken to Michigan hospital Howell about the time of the robbery. Cline could not identify him, saying he only saw one man. Donald Fisher was arrested by Detroit police and is said to have been identified by Cline as the bandit. Walter Andros is 25 and Donald Fisher is 20.

Wm. Andros was reported to have been taken to stand trial for the murder of Cline. The other man, Donald Fisher, was reported to have been arrested in Chicago. The police are said to have some suspicion some time ago on the part of the man who was of high school education.

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Michigan's habitual criminal act

Michigan's habitual criminal act has been wiped out Gov. Williams signing a bill scrapping its provisions and leaving the sentencing power to the discretion of the judge. Under the bill original present way back in the 1920s days conviction of 4 criminal offenses made a life sentence mandatory. About 100 criminals were given the sentences under it. The most famous of these was the case of Mrs. Etta Place of Lansing who was given a life sentence by Judge Collingwood of Lansing on a count of case of selling a pint of liquor. She was known as the 'life for a pint' case. However, the courts intervened and she was eventually released after serving a short term.

Sometimes our mistakes get us into a predicament. It was the case of the Chicago Tribune last Nov. 1948. The Chicago Tribune was the most conservative paper in the nation and was noted for its freedom and scoundrel attacks on Pres. Truman. On the night after election it was so carried away by its venom that it got out a special edition with the heading in large type "Dewey de beats Truman." It had absolutely nothing to base this upon as all election returns from the state showed President Truman ahead.

In a book entitled "The Great Debates of 1948" written by Prof. Harold Luther Mott of the U. of Michigan last place is given to a picture of Pres. Truman reading one of the Chicago Tribunes bearing this heading. It was taken by Al Muto of the International News Service. Frank James of the Dexter Leader came through Chicago that night and also has one of the Chicago papers with this heading.




