The popular debate is on. Was the 1949 legislature a "Do Nothing" legislature?

Since the legislature is Republican and the executive branch Democratic the possibilities for argument are unlimited.

Legislative appropriations are the largest in history; more than \$36 million more than 1948, \$50 million more than anticipated receipts.

Old age pensions were boosted from \$40 to \$60 a month. Workmen's unemployment compensation was increased and also unemployment insurance.

Sales tax collections were tightened to get better collections. Compromise on penalties and evasion were prohibited and limitation was on penalty was removed.

Bonus applications of war veterans was extended to March 19, 1951. Veterans were given preference on public jobs. A \$170,000 veterans trust fund was set aside for veterans.

The one man grand jury was replaced by a three man jury. A commission was appointed to control stream pollution and flood control.

Betting on horse races in the state fair grounds will be terminated Jan. 1, 1950. Outlawing all betting on horse races in the state was killed.

Liquor cannot be sold on state property including parks, bottle clubs were outlawed, \$1 a gallon on tax placed on imported wines. Liquor legislation referendum limited to states.

Gov. Williams served notice a special session would be called to consider new tax measures. He criticized the legislature for its failure to act on public housing, agriculture seal of quality, fair employment and labor benefits.

Comment is varied. The Booth papers say Williams program is the New Deal, the Free Press says no new taxes were added. Kim Sigler and Rep. Louis Crampton blast the softening of the one man grand jury which they piously blasted the softening of the workable monstrosity.

Michael J. Roche

Michael J. Roche, retired merchant and dairy farmer of Anderson, 3 miles west of Pinckney died suddenly of a heart attack last Thursday.

He had spent the day in Pinckney and had just gotten on the 4 p. m. Lansing bus to go to his home west of town where he lives with his niece, Mrs. Louis Stackable when he suffered the heart attack. The bus was held up some 20 minutes while his relatives were summoned. Dr. R. M. Duffy was out of town and so was Rev. Fr. Schmitt. It was thought that there was a faint pulse so he was taken to the Pinckney fire hall on a stretcher where the fireman worked over him with the resuscitator. They were unable to revive him. Dr. W. C. Wylie was eventually summoned from Dexter said he had had been dead for some time. The body was removed to the Swarthout Funeral Home.

The deceased was the son of the late Michael and Alice Farrell, all Roche and was born near Jackson on what is now the Col. George Game reserve. Now deceased to the U. of M. In his younger days he was one of the best ball players in this section, and was a member of the Ramous Roche and McClear bro's team. He served in the Spanish war and also in World War I. In the latter he was in the employ of the Knights of Columbus. A keen student of the dairy industry for several years he was member of the Mich. Milk Producers Ass'n. from this district. A personal friend of the editor for several years he has accompanied us to most of the night softball games. At Battle Creek a number of years ago where the Detroit Tigers played an exhibition game the deceased introduced us to Chas. Gehring whom he knew from boyhood. The morning he died he gave a \$1.00 donation for the ball team. Although a fine athlete for years he neither drank nor smoked and did not use profane language.

He was a member of a family of 9 children his sole survivor is his brother, William who also lives at the Stackable home.

Funeral at St. Mary's Church Rev. Fr. Schmitt officiating. Burial in St. Mary's Cemetery, Monday.

SCHOOL RE-ORGANIZATION

The Pinckney Area School district has issued circulating petitions and have been given permission by the state dept. of education at Lansing to go ahead and take the second step viz to circulate petitions calling for an election. The following districts signed petitions favoring reorganization: Cady, Pettysville, Hauss, Merrill, Sprout, Pinckney, Marble. None was circulated in the Burgess where there are only 2 pupils. The Hudson Corners district turned it down and will go to Dexter. The Hicks district also rejected it by a small margin. The state dept. wants another set of petitions circulated in this district. A meeting will be held soon at Hicks school where School Com. Agnes McCollum and a man from the state dept. will talk.

MASONIC GRAND LODGE

The annual Masonic grand lodge convention was held in Detroit last week. Hugh Johnston, former mayor of Traverse City and Mich. Bell Telephone executive was elected grand master. This was no surprise as he has been 7 years going through the various grand lodge chairs to arrive there.

Howard Taylor, of Flint, controller for the Gen. Motors, Buick Division was elected grand marshal on the 4th ballot over 5 other candidates. vis Francis Dodge, Detroit; Virgil Lake, Robert VanVlerah of Lansing; Oris Mead, Holt; Robert Douglas, Alpena and John McLaughlin of Marquette.

No big changes were made in grand lodge laws. Lodges of Sorrow were approved. Square clubs were prohibited from putting on degree work unless sponsored by regular lodges. Compulsory Third Degree lesson examinations were turned down. A short form of third degree content was legalized under certain conditions. Another special Masonic Home Assessment to provide for boarding home for Masons on the Ann Arbor waiting list deferred. \$6,000 was appropriated to start a grand lodge sales dept. to handle lodge supplies. An attempt to restore the 1944 monitor failed. The 5 Grand Rapids lodges whose temple burned in 1948 had their temples renewed. Membership in the Masonic Service Ass'n dropped 2 years ago was restored. Recognition of a number of foreign grand jurisdictions who do not conform to established Masonic jurisdiction was again refused. A request in the grand masters address for renewal of waiver of territorial jurisdiction was referred to the General Purpose Bd. who are working on such an amendment.

Grand Lodge will meet in Grand Rapids next year.

Current Comments

Reading our exchanges we see how Memorial Day, observed as a national day, is observed by the departed soldiers and the living with flags and ceremonies. This will be done by special committees and there are events in which uniformed soldiers, bands and firing squads, or speeches by famous men are featured. Memorial Day was the creation of the G. A. R. a civil war veterans organization and as the members of that group passed away the observance of the day decreased. To begin it was part of their creed to contribute to the American Legion. Initiative Day and V-E Day are the big days today. Memorial Day is chiefly noted for the Auto Races at Indianapolis and double header base ball games.

The Detroit Common Council and various unions have offered a total of \$120,000 for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons who severely wounded Victor Reuther there last week. He was hit by a shot gun blast which destroyed the sight of one eye. He was in his home when the shooting occurred. This was similar to the shooting of his brother, Walter international Union leader in Detroit last year. The Reuther boys, 3 in number, first gained fame during the famous sitdown strike in Flint. They had plenty of enmity of the Communists who have waged a constant battle to gain control of the unions. One arrest has been made in Walter Reuther case but the man has not been brought to trial. By the way the murder of Senator Hooper in broad daylight on a much traveled road near Lansing is still unsolved. 4 men were convicted of plotting the crime but no one was ever charged with it.

The state is still making an investigation of Wayne county which has cases mostly in the grand old don't seem to be getting anywhere. Some counties have followed suit. Owing to the fact no welfare aid will be extended to children who drive autos. In other words if you want aid walk. The welfare business always produced such abuses more or less. Back in the horse and buggy days when the townships and cities handle their own welfare problems they cropped up. Certain justices and constables used to arrest vagrants and give them 30 day sentences. During this period they had to be fed. The justice and constable used to make a nice profit on feeding jail prisoners. Township supervisors in those days were sometimes involved. The charge was often made but seldom proved that in return for the vote at the election it was possible to many families to be put on the town as getting welfare aid. At that time was called. In some cases wood and coal was also purchased for them by township funds. There were incidents reported in those days where welfare claimants refused to accept 4 ft. wood when it was sent to them by the town because it was not cut.

The crop storage bill is up in congress with the Republican members fighting it. During the campaign last fall Pres. Truman charged that the defeat of the bill providing for government storage warehouses for grain by the 80th congress cut the price of that commodity. This was generally credited with swinging the western farm states to the Democratic column. Cong. Wolcott of Michigan called the crop storage bill a socialization of the warehouse and storage industry. Lack of warehouses last year forced farmers to sell their grain and take a loss.




Toward a Firm Peace for the Holy Land

Doing Something About the Weather

The St. Stephen (2) is one of 13 weather ships, supplied by eight countries, and financed by 10, which make up a network arranged by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), a specialized agency of the United Nations. The ICAO weather ships are on constant duty, ready to radio passing aircraft late weather information, and to participate in search and rescue operations. A specialist (3) maps weather data coming from a weather balloon and prepares it for broadcast to passing planes and shore stations.

One of the first of hundreds of schools throughout the world which are adding studies of the United Nations, Ms. Charter and its activities to their courses is the high school at Great Neck, New York, near U.N. 
