PINCKNEY CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

History Highlights

- The Pinckney Community Congregational Church celebrated its 100th anniversary Sunday with an all day service. Here is a brief history of the church.
- 1840 First Presbyterian Church organized with ten Putnam pioneers as charter members.
 - 1840 Above society affiliated with Washtenaw Presbytery.
 - 1848 Above society changes name to First Congregational Church of Pinckney.
 - 1854 Society severs connection with Washtenaw Presbytery and applies for membership in Jackson Association of Congregational Churches.
 - 1853 Site chosen for house of worship, Lot 1, Block 3, Range 4.
 - 1854 Building contract awarded to Benjamin Eaman, after receiving sealed bids.
 - 1855 New church dedicated.
 - 1858 Part-time use of church granted to Baptist Society.
 - 1905 Church vastly improved and re-dedicated.
 - 1914 Consider a merger plan proposed by Methodist Church.
 - Merger completed under name of "The Federated Church of Pinckney."
 - 1922 Name of society changed from "Federated to "First Congregational Church.
 - 1924 Methodist property purchased, and Methodist Church remodeled and established as a church home.
 - 1924 Elaborate re-dedication services for "new" Congregational Church.
 - 1924 File Articles of Re-incorporation as the Community Congregational Church.
 - 1925 North Hamburg Congregational Society unites with Community Congregational Church.

Present church building (formerly Methodist) was built in 1858. It was extensively remodeled and re-dedicated in 1904. Many changes again took place in 1924 after its purchase by the Congregational Society and another dedication was held. The early official records of the Methodist Church are not available.

BUSINESS DISTRICT FIRE

A fire was discovered here early Monday afternoon at the Pinckney Fabricating building on W. Main St. This building of tile with a wood roof was built about 25 years ago by the late Arthur Flintoft for a Ford Sales room and garage. He was succeeded by Day Bird, then by Slayton & Son and later Ford Lamb had a doorcheck factory there and they were followed by the Doll & Waters Toy Co. The Bob White Lapping Co. got the building 2 years ago and recently the Pinckney Fabricating Co. bought it.

The Fabricating Co. had their Norge Sales room in the front and work shop in the back. There was also a number of lapping machines in the building.

The oil soaked floors made a hot and smoky fire for a time, and the blaze broke through the roof. The Pinckney fire dept. put it out in about an hour's time.

The building is about 200 ft. long, one story with a basement under the rear part.

Michigan Mirror

Is Mich. slipping us a tourist state?

James Walsh of the A. A. A. thinks so.

He travels all about the state and writes articles for the Motor News.

He says Mich. people lack pride in their state and fail to brag about Mich. natural resources, its climate, its white sand lakes, hunting and fishing and its scenic attractions.

However, his statement has been challenged by many Mich. editors.

Robert Furlong of the Mich. Tourist Council says facts deny Walsh's contention. Traffic at the Straits is 20 percent higher than a year ago.

Despite a state advertising budget one half that of other states, Mich. ranks third among 48 other states.

New York leads all states. N. Y. City is responsible for this. Their advertising budget is \$500,000, twice that of Mich.

Mich. has 3000 miles of shore line, 11,000 inland lakes, 36,000 miles of rivers and streams and more game and fish than any other state in the union.

It has 58 state parks, 62 road side picnic parks and 300 roadside picnic tables.

The legislature turned thumbs down this year on a bill to grant blank check authority to bus cabins and hotels on state land.

Walsh may have started something. The result may be a reappraisal of Mich. resources and a more friendly attitude towards the millions of summer visitors.

CONSERVATION

Haven Hill, the 4,800 acre property at Highland Douglas, was set aside as a state park. The educational center last week.

Women non resident must take out fishing licenses, a 10 day one for \$2 or an annual one for \$3.00.

The heat has driven thousands to state parks. So far, 4,024,000 have visited them compared to 2,300,000 at the same time last year.

The dept. has started a new program at Appleton Lake, Brighton and Silver Lake, Pinckney. They will rent tents to week end campers at \$1 a day. Wm. T. Hanks handles reservations at Brighton and Ernest Botke, Pinckney.

The state will receive \$92,500 from the Pittman Robertson fund for 10 game research projects.

State prisoners will begin work on winter sport projects in the Porcupine mts. in July.

Less than 3 acres of forest fire occurred over the July 4 week end.

Ground water levels dropped in June 32 ft.

The dept. has purchased a new 4 place aircraft to use in law enforcement.

Farmer cooperations report seeding 40 percent more pheasant nests this year and 60 percent more birds.

There are estimated to be from 150 to 300 elk in Mich. mostly in Osego county.

No uranium has been found in Mich. so far but a large amount of rock was sent to Lansing for analysis. It costs \$250 prospect for uranium.

452 oil well drilling permits were issued in June.

Fish caught in the great lakes will be shipped to New York by plane soon.

The dept. is issuing a booklet, with descriptions of 34 different trees.

Rumpus ranges are available in 28 state parks where children can chop trees, build shacks etc.

Donald Gordon, prosecutor of Calhoun county has questioned the action of the board of supervisors there in paying county property taxes out of sales tax diversion funds. The board has been rebating tax debts of 1947-48 out of sales tax funds. One of the beneficiaries is the Consumers Power Co. who received a rebate of \$1,018.20 on 1948 taxes.

The prosecutor admits that there is only a 50-50 chance of getting a conviction and he is getting no co operation from the township or county officials. He says, the state tax laws do not state just how the counties may spend the sales tax funds. Different counties do different things with these funds. Livingston turned over a big portion of them to the county road commission for highway improvement. In Webster they used \$1000 to spread calcium chloride on the roads.

Current Comment

W. K. Kelsey had a very good writeup in the Detroit News last week, that of the seamstress. Back in the nineties the garment makers had not yet adopted mass production methods to turn out ladies dresses and most of the clothing of the ladies were made by the village dressmaker or seamstress. Getting a dress made evolved quite a ceremony. The first step was a trip to the dressmakers parlors, sometimes located over a store but more often in the front room of the dress makers home. Here innumerable fashion books were looked over until a dress was selected. The pattern was then ordered. Then a trip to the drygoods store followed where bolt, after bolt of cloth was taken down from the shelves until a selection was made. Thread, buttons, hooks, and eyes were then purchased. Then followed the fittings where the dressmaker with her mouth full of pins, pinned up here and let down there until a proper fit was obtained. The entire procedure took about a week. Some seamstresses sewed out that is, went to the home and did the work, getting their room and board. This usually happens in a family of several teen age girls or where one was getting married. Around World War I garment makers adopted Henry Ford's mass production system to their industry and the seamstress began to languish. Pinckney at one time had over a dozen dressmakers and seamstresses working at the trade. Now there are but a few. The traveling seamstress was popular for a other reason. She was usually familiar with all the gossip of the community which she related with relish.

How did you stand the hot spell last week when the mercury went over 90 each day and threatened to go still higher? Quite a few deaths from the heat were reported and there were many prostrations. A couple of Pinckney teen agers got so badly sun burned, bathing they were in bed a couple of days. There are many stories and strange enough the best one does not come from Wisconsin home of the famous "Liar's Club." It is from Newark, Ohio. It relates that chick hatchery threw what they considered a bunch of spoiled eggs on the dump but the sun was so hot that in a time at all the eggs hatched out and the dump was alive with baby chicks. Beat that if you can.

Despite the many warnings and pleas the fatalities over the July 4th week end broke all records. In the nation there were 711 accidental deaths. This is the highest ever reported. Michigan led the nation in fatalities with 35. Nearly all of them were due to traffic accidents or drownings. Of course, conditions had considerable to do with this. Michigan is a vacation state and there are many more vacation spots here with swimming facilities etc. All so every week end and more especially when a holiday falls on a week end the highways are jammed with city folks enroute to Mich. vacation spots. We don't know what can be done to decrease the week end fatalities. Apparently we must keep trying to correct this situation through moral persuasion.

The Ku Klux Klan seems to have tailed in its grand comeback plan staged right after World War II. After World War I the Klan which had been dormant for years was revived and spread like wild fire even into the north. They gained such strength that they controlled elections and even elect a mayor in Detroit. Eventually they fell into disrepute and at the time of World War II were dormant. After the end of the war they staged a big revival which flopped as they were unable to make any headway this time & even in Alabama and Georgia their biggest strongholds have had to fight for their existence. A bill was recently introduced in Alabama to forbid any organization from wearing masks. It has not passed yet but has received strong support. If it does pass the Klan is dead.

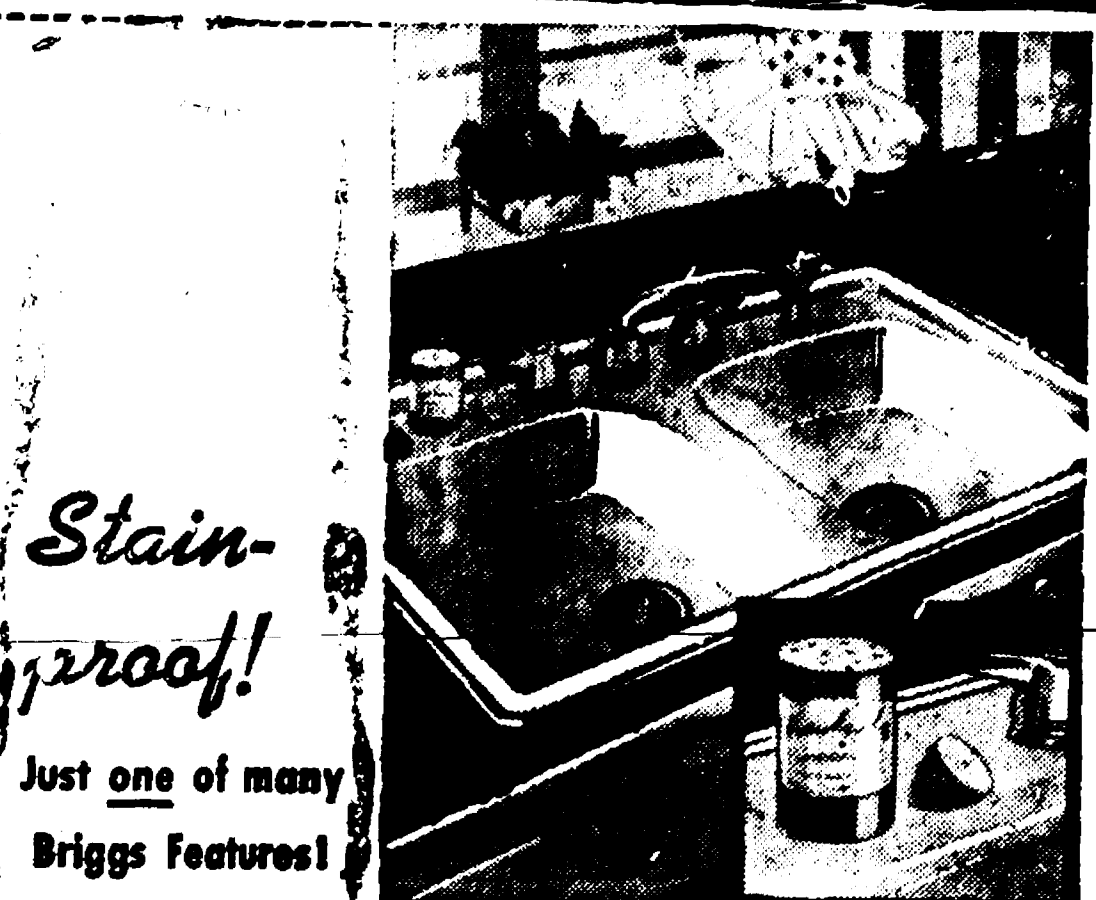

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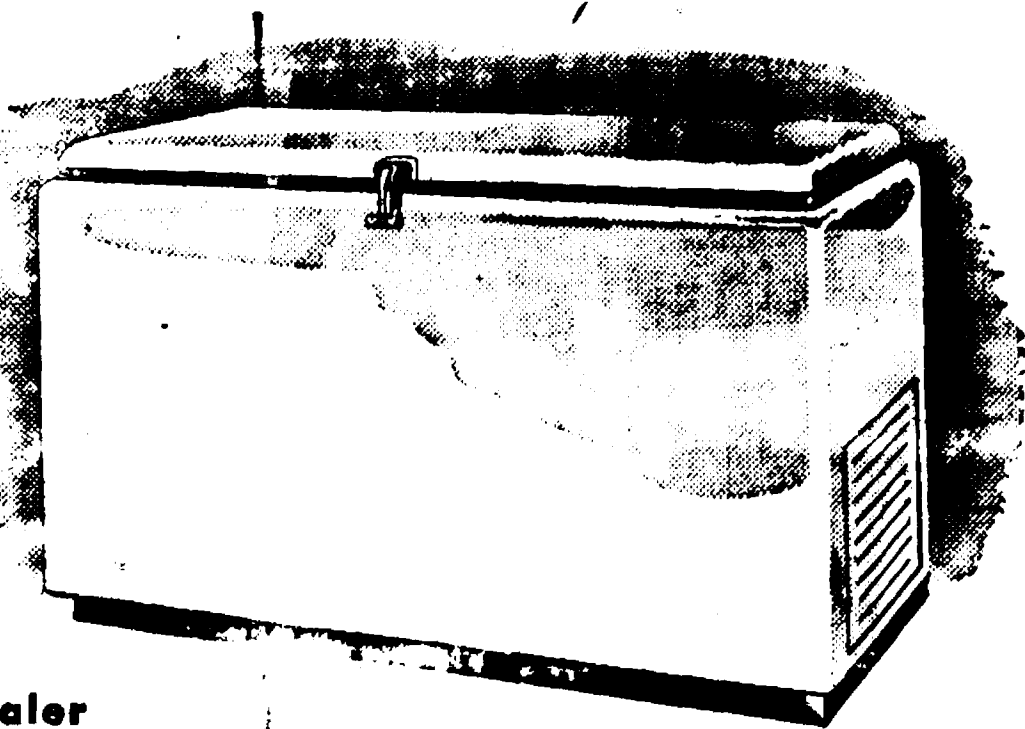

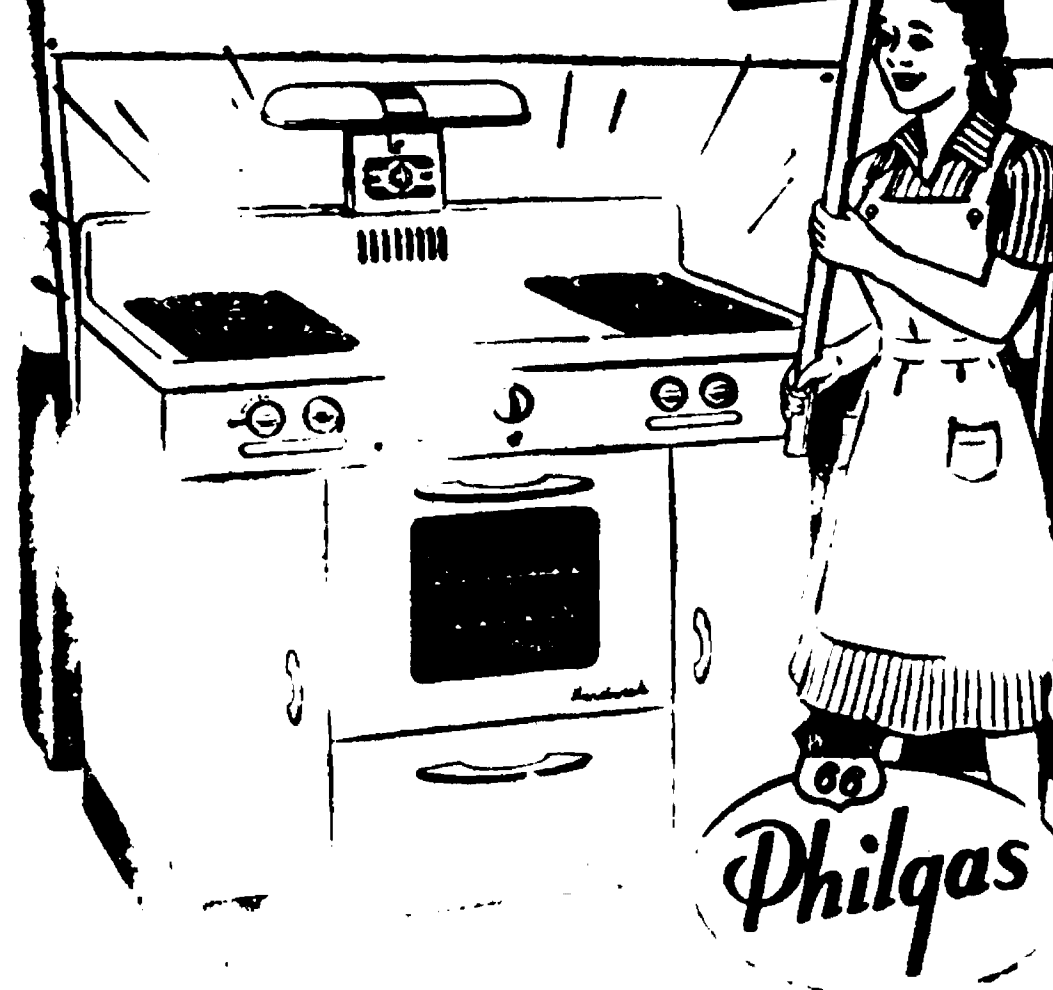
