Michigan Mirror

How's Business in Michigan? According to the Michigan Unemployment Commission, employment is 6 percent off the national average in the nation. Muskegon is the top industrial center with unemployment running 23 percent. Providence, R. I. is the only city in the nation with a higher average.

Mining operations are lagging and the upper peninsula has an unemployment average of 18.5. Jackson has 15 percent. Port Huron 13. Benton Harbor 11, and Grand Rapids 10. However, this is all about the same as it was a year ago.

Tourist business is reported to be less than last year. The upper peninsula Development Bureau says it is from 20 to 30 percent off. There are exceptions. Blaney Parks shows a 48 percent increase.

Retail trade is only 1 percent below 1948 and sales are only 4 percent off.

Still there is a bright side. Bank deposits are 3 times as large as 6 years ago. Banks are 71 percent liquid.

Gov. Williams expects to ask the legislature to support President Truman's public housing program calling for construction of 810,000 housing units over a 6 year period. Farmers could get 33 year loans for building purposes.

State Republican Chairman Summerfield will try to bring Senator Vandenberg into closer relationship with the Michigan Republican organization. He believes lack of agreement among party leaders defeated Gov. Tom Dewey last year.

CONSERVATION

Resident fishermen have purchased 392,000 licenses this year 100,000 more than last year.

First half of the state archery tournament is at Algonac Aug. 14.

Conservation law violation dropped from 605 in April to 569 in May. Illegal fishing accounted for 211 arrests.

Release of 20,000 birds in the Michigan pheasant areas will start in August. The stocking ratio is 5 hens to one cock.

Tent and trailer camps have increased 25 percent in state parks and recreation areas.

The biggest fox turned in this year was shot near Lansing. It was 4 ft. long and weighed 11 lbs.

The winner of a four-year scholarship to Clarke college, Dubuque, Ia. from Xavier high school, St. Louis, is Mary Ann Lynch, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Lynch, St. Louis. Miss Lynch, who received the award at commencement ceremonies June 5 in the St. Francis Xavier (college) church, also merited the gold medal for scholarship, having maintained the highest average in her class for four years. Clarke college is conducted by the Sisters of Charity.



Current Comment

In compiling the recent history of the Pinckney Cong'l church Wanda has just observed its centennial many interesting facts were unearthed. Way back in the civil war period the church was much more strict in their views and somewhat narrow. A man by the name of Cook was church clerk at the time and kept a complete record of all proceedings. In it is an account of a man who was churchward for conduct unlawful on a part of a church member. He was charged with four offenses. One was attending a ball and another was playing cards. Found guilty of all four he was expelled from the church. The Cong'l church views were liberalized long before the Methodist views were. Back in 1901 the Methodist was demanding a promise from all new members not to play cards or dance. However, little or no attempt was ever made to enforce it.

There is probably no business in the nation made a greater advance than the insurance business. Starting way back in pioneer days when a small group of New England farmers organized and put so much money a year into a fund to pay losses by fire, it has increased by leaps and bounds until today insurance is to be had on most any thing. Two new forms of insurance are insurance against rain and crop insurance. The 1949 Life Insurance Fact Book gives some interesting figures on life insurance. Michigan families now own \$8,292,000,000 of life insurance, an increase of \$1,688,000,000 in 2 years. In 1948 death benefit payments totaled \$55,812,000 under 41,629 policies. Undoubtedly other forms of insurance also showed an upward trend.

The Detroit News takes the teachers of the nation to task for sneering at a recent convention the statement that the passage of a federal aid bill to education is imminent. The News says such a bill will cost Michigan taxpayers \$12,000,000 and they will only get back \$6,000,000. The News does not understand human nature. The only way of direct financing by the schools is a property tax which is pretty hard to put across as the cost is perfectly apparent to the voters. The federal government on the other hand has a hundred different ways of raising taxes, most of them painless such as the liquor tax, tobacco tax, etc. These are not available to the school districts. So any tax money received from the federal government by the school districts is eagerly accepted as the people of the districts only contribute to it indirectly.

We only have a nazy idea of what Communism is and could not distinguish it from socialism but to us the Communist purge now underway in this country has all the aspects of an old time Salem witch hunt. The recent trial of Roger Hiss was 100 percent political. The idea was to prove that all labor unions and the present national administration were all communist dominated. The charge that Hiss, a deputy of state employee had sold government secrets to Russia, based on the testimony of a self confessed perjurer, Whitaker Chambers, was only a minor item, and almost entirely lost sight of most of the time during the trial. We don't believe anyone could be convicted on Chambers testimony. In the Detroit teachers argument the teachers have appealed the attempt to make them declare whether they are Communists or not. They point out that Detroit City charter expressly forbids anyone asking a city employee what their political affiliations are. The Detroit News admits the only way around the difficulty is to change the charter which would call for a vote by the people.

HARD-WORKING WIRES - Helping to bring telephone service to more farm families is the application of "carrier" equipment to rural telephone lines. This special equipment, used for years on Long Distance lines, enables several conversations to travel along the same pair of wires at the same time and without interfering with each other. Recent developments indicate that, under suitable conditions, extra rural circuits also can be provided in this manner.

RADIO BY TELEPHONE - Radio networks are really networks of special telephone circuits linking groups of radio stations. A program originating in one station is sent out by telephone wires to other stations. From there it is broadcast to you by radio. 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
