Every Mich. city and village is eligible to get a share of federal rent subsidies and federal grants.

This fact is emphasized by Gov. Williams

The governor says many Mich. communities pay more into the U. S. Treasury than they get back. He said at a press meeting at Hucina Lake the state is entitled to half a billion dollars in federal money.

We investigated and found out the following. A 1933 state law permits any municipality to set up a public housing authority. If the voters approve they may issue bonds, build homes and rent them. (Ann Arbor, E. Lansing, Flint, etc.) are the only ones who availed themselves of this law. Grand Rapids turned it down.

The governor asked \$3 million for public housing. He would amend the 1933 act to include counties and townships.

This is the way the act works. If the plans are approved by the federal government the local authority can apply for federal money. This is paid back when the tax free bonds are sold. These are supported by a federal subsidy which makes up the difference between actual rent and below cost rent.

The actual cost to the federal government is as follows: Actual cost \$12 billion, Rent subsidies \$7 billion.

Farm housing benefits are also possible. Mich. is entitled to a fourth of a billion.

The federal government spent \$21 billion in '48 and will spend \$28 billion this year.

CONSERVATION

A new threat to the Great Lakes commercial fishing industry may be the introduction of nylon netting. It increases the catch but all nets were used until war time so depleted the fish supply. Nylon nets were used until war time and then cotton. Cotton however, shrinks. A conference is scheduled at Erie, Pa. to discuss the use of nylon nets which it is claimed depletes the fish supply as much as 300 percent.

Use of state parks for beer parties are forbidden. Broken bottles are a hazard in the drive ways and beaches.

\$14,000 was paid in bounties in June with foxes taking \$12,365 of it.

More than 12,000 forest fires burned 19,000 acres so far this year.

State park visitors are warned not to leave the cars unlocked. Many thefts are reported.

Dog training & field trials will be held in the state parks in the Brighton, Highland and Waterloo areas.

Current Comment

Editor Russell LaCombe of the Brighton Argus-Mirror. Lately an attended the funeral of Frank Murphy at Harbor Beach last Friday. We would have liked to buy a few more up to our neck in mourning. They arrived Thursday unexpected difficulty in getting a room but had none as the citizens threw their homes open to outsiders for the occasion. On the social clubs and others served a free dinner to those who came from away to the funeral. After his death it was revealed Justice Murphy had been engaged to a daughter of one of New York's big publishers. He died practically penniless, the only estate he possessed being heirship property inherited from his parents.

For teen agers life is just one thrill after another. In Detroit recently a number of young people nearly died from eating the contents of menthol inhalers. The use of barbiturates and benzodrine, now sold in drug stores openly has increased to such an extent that a law to place them under jurisdiction of the narcotics bureau will be introduced in the legislature. Pros. Toy in Wayne county is also cracking down on sellers of marijuana cigarettes and a number of arrests have been made. It is unlawful to possess or sell these.

Infantile paralysis or polio has claimed more victims in 1949 than in the worst previous year which was 1944. The Associated Press reports 6,935 cases through July 27 with 337 deaths. In 1944 the figures were 4,176. Although much time and money has been spent in polio research little is as yet known as to its cause and so far only measures tending to relieve are available.

Cardinal Spellman of New York City and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of the late president, are staging a debate on public aid to parochial schools, now supported entirely by the church members. The Cardinal in a recent release accused Mrs. Roosevelt of coming out against tax aid for parochial schools and accused her of being Anti Catholic. Mrs. Roosevelt in her reply denied this and said she was only for the separation of the church and state. This is only a phrase of the long fight being conducted to obtain tax money for these schools. A victory was recent won when the supreme court ruled parochial school students may be transported in public school buses if said busses go by their door. By attacking Mrs. Roosevelt the Cardinal made the front page of every paper in the land and got hundreds of columns of free publicity which otherwise would not have been available.

The free publicity business is an art. George Bernard Shaw, the eccentric Irishman made that from pages last week when he stated that next to himself Joseph Stalin of Russia was the greatest man in the world. Maybe he believes it. Probably he does not but he made the front pages and the sale of his books increased. If he had named Stalin as the worst man in the world his publicity would have been small.

The Dexter wild west shooting affair which was on trial in Ann Arbor last week was suddenly postponed to Aug. 31. Pros. Reading was disqualified and Ass't. Atty. Gen. Jackson is replacing him. Last June 10 Dep. Sheriff Kramer in attempting to arrest Lawrence Rosseau who was creating a disturbance in a Dexter ice cream parlor shot him in the arm when 2 friends of Rosseau picked on him. The latter charged before assault and put up security for costs. Kramer claimed he intended to fire in the air but stumbled. Paul Bell of Pinckney who saw the shooting denied that charging Kramer pointed the gun straight at Rosseau.


