Any one who has travelled over Mich. has been impressed by one thing—Industrial decentralization—the splitting up of big business into little businesses putting new payrolls and pep in to many towns of less than 10,000 population.

Even Henry Ford concedes the Rouge is too big to be run efficiently. City traffic does not help any. Hence the trend of industry to small towns.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

James Hislop and Francis Sullivan were arrested last week for using a diving suit to walk along the bottom of Edison Lake, Wayne county and spear Black bass.

Oil and gas leases on 20,907 acres of state land will be offered at Auction at Lansing Sept. 8.

Better than half the projects on 17 stream improvement jobs have been completed.

With television increasing the audience of nearly a million people saw conservation films the first 7 months of this year.

Th bow and arrow deer hunting season is only 2 months away.

The annual convention of the National Conference of State Parks will be held at the Hotel Statler, Sept. 17 thru 20.

A new 1000 acre tract, known as the Stanton game area will be open for hunting this fall. It is on M-57, 12 miles northwest of Greenville.

The odds on locating a producing oil well in Mich. are 1 to 13. Of the 312 wells tapped this year only 10 were producers, 9 extended existing wells and 5 were gas wells. 918 drilling permits were issued.

The state of Mich. has no lands for sale despite many requests. The few it has are reserved by the conservation dept.

## POTATO ELIGIBILITY DATE

A final reminder was given to Livingston County potato growers last week that the deadline date for applying for certificates of eligibility for participation in the 1949 potato price support program is Sept. 1, or harvest, whichever is earlier.

Earl Grubb, chairman of the Livingston County AAA Committee, said that only eligible growers who have been issued certificates of eligibility will be able to participate in the government price support program for the 1949 crop of Irish potatoes. Only those growers who have planted within their acreage goals and who agree to certain marketing regulations will be issued certificates of eligibility.

The individual grower, however, must apply for a certificate. The support price is based on 60 percent of parity, which will range from \$1.50 per hundredweight in Sept. to \$2.15 in March, 1950.

## Items of Interest

### MICHIGAN STATE FAIR

Agriculture will be emphasized at the Mich. State Fair to be held in Detroit Sept. 2 thru 11. Thousands of agriculture and junior livestock exhibits will be featured with a record \$120,000 in premiums.

In the agriculture building will be found two giant refrigerators for dairy and meat displays, also cheese displays from Pinckney area, locking in late years on account of lack of refrigeration. Meat cutting will also be featured. There will be a life size model of a sow and pigs sculptured from lard and one of a cow from butter.

Tents will be erected over the swine pens to eliminate heat and rain. There will also be an animal hospital. There will be a complete and modernized milk house with all the latest facilities. This year all milk produced at the fair will be processed. It is estimated there will be 800 gallons for the 10 days.

Premiums for junior exhibits have been increased from \$10,350 to \$15,442 and the Danish system of judging will be introduced to give every junior a prize. Food and sleeping facilities for the 500 young exhibitors will also be provided. There will be 11 agriculture contests.

Something new has also been added. A contest in team driving to be held before the grandstand. The motto this year is: "Agriculture comes first." This is the policy at the Centennial Celebration.

## Current Comment

Lee Merritt in the Livingston County Press last week bemoans the huge increase in federal burcaus at Washington D. C. He says 20 years ago there were only 300 now there are 1818. There were 570,000 employees now 2 million, and the payroll has risen from 4 to 44 billion. One word explains the whole thing. That is "Centralization".

Back some 25 years ago or more the property tax was the key stone of the tax structure. If a new road was built the money came from the property tax, the same was true of a new school sewer system etc. This put a brake on progress as it was pretty hard to get the voters to increase their property tax. Still this tax increased to the point where it became a burden and the 15 mill limit was adopted. In its place we have the gas and wt. tax, sales tax, intangible tax, social security and many other taxes. Now the townships and village had no machinery for collecting these taxes so the state and federal government did it for them. It was necessary to name commissions for this work. As the government took on more duties, it established more commissions and World War II saw an epidemic of them, mostly to aid veterans. The county employees have also increased at the same time. Not so far back their was no county commission nor welfare or old age pension dept. Now both these depts. have substantial lists of employees. State Treas. D. Hale Brake, a candidate for governor, condemned proposals for wholesale county home rule, a great talking point for politicians. He said many county officials devote most of their time to state duties. He advocated the appointment of a county business mgr. of the bd. of supervisors. Now as long as the centralization trend continues and it shows no sign of abating the number of state and federal employees will increase.

Back in 1937 a group of Black Legionaires from Detroit brought a negro out here shot him and left him in the marsh at Nash's bridge west of here. We took some pictures of the body before the coroner arrived and for that reason were in attendance at the trial in Detroit for 5 days when the men were convicted. The star witness for the prosecution was Dayton Dean, who turned states evidence and helped convict his former pals. He had previously been given a life sentence for killing another man and has already served 13 years. Now he demands a new trial claim ing he was not represented by council at the time he was sentenced. Dean is a talkative 20' lb man who likes the limelight and has the intellect of a 10 year old boy.

Public improvements anyway seem to have opposition. We had thought the \$75,000 veterans hospital, to be built at the edge of Ann Arbor was a sure thing but a bunch of property owners have gotten the ear of Senator Ferguson and filed petitions against it. Opposed to this viewpoint are the Ann Arbor City Council, The Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club and all veterans organizations who have declared in favor of it.

The W. C. T. U. gives some interesting figures on drinking among the women of the nation whom it now claims number 800,000 and who are increasing at the rate of 120,000 a year. These figures were arrived at projection of the percentage of women of alcoholic victims who are committed to mental institutions and hospital wards into the 4,600,000 of alcoholics of the country. One out of every four of the 37,303 alcoholics admitted to institutions are women.
