Michigan Mirror

It is admitted that it costs less to live in a small town than in a city. The workers' dollar goes further.

The worker has less distance to travel. Meats are lower, property is lower and food stuffs are as a rule reasonable.

Now if a factory in a small town is to compete with mass production of the city factories labor costs must be lower.

Where labor has demanded the same wages in small towns as in cities the result has not been so good. A hosiery mill in Belding and a crate factory in Baldwin closed on account of wage demands.

At Oscoda a bee of citizens built a factory for a door co. At Kaleva Wm. McKinnon developed a fish bait. He now has an assembly line and 70 employees.

Montague raised \$5000 for a foundry. Elk Rapids started a canning co. for fruit, canning 4,200,000 lbs. of cherries this year. Birmingham has an asphalt mix factory. Escanaba a plant producing welders, cranes etc. Ontagon a new kind of cement block. Bellvue a lime extracting factory. Vickeburg, air line equipment. Grand Haven 9 new industries, making plastics parts, toys etc.

These examples show that opportunity still exists for industry in small towns.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The waterfowl stamp has been raised from \$1 to \$2 and Michigan 100,000 duck hunters are expected to contribute \$200,000 to waterfowl conservation next year.

The 4 French River Scouts in canoes bearing the flag of France reached Wells state park. Wisconsin last week on their 4500 mile canoe trip following the route of Marquette and Joliet. Arriving in N. Y. in May they started at Three Rivers, Quebec, and paddled up the Ottawa and St. Lawrence rivers to Georgia Bay, then to St. Sault Marie and Lake Mich. to Wisconsin. They will go down the Mississippi and end their trip at New Orleans in Nov. Pictures have been taken along the way.

Eight more trout lakes will be available for fishermen next year all stunted and undesirable fish, having been destroyed. One is on Jackson county. Portage.

438,459 acres of state land in 47 northern counties has been classified. 210,843 acres has been allotted for conservation use. 42 forest fires last week burned 199 acres.

A fisherman was arrested nude at Carp Lake, near St. Ignace last week with only a pair of glasses on. Charge: fishing without license on his person.

A wildlife museum will be erected at the state park at Bay City. It will be financed by a \$40,000 bequest from Lillian Jenson, former Bay City resident.

Railroads plow safety strips along their right of way to cut down forest fires.

Water levels dropped 4 inches last month and are now the lowest in 14 years.

The conservation dept. will use local labor in the upper peninsula distressed unemployment areas. Five state forest projects are listed.

There were 582 arrests in July for conservation law violators. 403 were for fishing law offenses. Reports of a bear loose in Eaton county caused parents to keep their children indoors. It proved to be only a large dog.

59 forest fires burned 145 acres last week. Permits for the Williamston cooperative hunting plan are again at a low level this year so far. It provides for posting of land by co-operative groups and hunting by written permit.

Albert Watson, Chicago.

STATE TOURNAMENT

The Brighton Vagabond softball team won the district and regional finals in this district by winning 4 straight games. This put them in the finals at Lansing last week end. In accordance with a state rule they were allowed to pick two outside players for the tournament and chose Joe Lavey of Pinckney and Glenn Bennett of Hamburg, a catcher.

Sat. Jerry Housner pitching for Brighton threw a 2 hit game and beat the Coldwater Moose team 4 to 0. Brighton scored all 4 runs the second inning. In the second round game Brighton started Houghton in the box. He was nervous but led 2 to 1 up to the 5th inning when a bad break gave the Kolatt Motors of Bay City, (Brighton's opponents) 3 runs. A walk and a hit put 2 men on. The next batter hit a line drive to right field. Housner of Brighton tried to take it on the first bound but fell down and the ball went past him for a home run. Housner relieved Brighton and stopped further. Brighton scored a run the 7th, losing 4 to 3.

This is the second time Joe has been picked. In 1947 Eagers won and picked Joe and Bob Singer, both of Pinckney. They won all 4 games. Bob pitching 3 victories the last 2 days.

BOUND OVER FOR TRIAL

Another chapter took place in the Dexter wild west shooting of last June 10 when Dep. Sheriff Frank Kramer was bound over to circuit court for trial on a charge of felonious shooting by Judge Francis O'Brien on order of Atty. Gen. Harry Jackson, who conducted the case. Pros. Reading being disqualified. The testimony as to whether the shooting was justified or not was conflicting. On last June 10, Lawrence Rousseau and 2 others were involved in a fight in the LaRosa ice cream parlor, Dexter. Kramer was called to stop it. The 3 pitched on him. When Kramer drew a gun Rousseau ran and was shot in the arm. Kramer claims he intended to shoot in the air but slipped. This is disputed. Kramer was released on \$1000 bail. Rousseau has also been bound over for trial on charge of resisting arrest.

Pinckney ended her softball season by beating City Service at Howell Friday night 14 to 4. This is the longest season Pinckney has ever had. Starting back last April 20 they have played a total of some 24 games, winning 12 and losing 12. However, they have won 5 out of their last 6 games.

Bob Singer pitched the first game beating Cassidy Lake but went to Detroit and played on an other team. Paul Singer started pitching then but hurt his back and was out a month. Don Amburgey and Gus Ledwidge pitched until his return. Paul Singer won 5 games and lost 6. Ledwidge won 4 and lost 3 and Amburgey won 2 and lost 3.

Their victories include 2 over Cassidy Lake, 2 over U. A. W. Howell; 2 over Eagers Cleaners, Howell; 2 over City Service, Howell; 2 over East Ann Arbor; 1 over Local 959, Ann Arbor.

Their losses were 2 to Munith; 2 to Brighton; 2 to U. A. W. 2 to Dexter teams, 2 to City Service and 1 each to Chelsea and Eagers.

Current Comment

Rev. Clarence Vabinder, pastor of the Court St. Baptist Church in Port Huron has started a parochial school in the basement of the church and has enrolled 30 pupils. He has condemned the moral situation in the public schools and says that they give no Christian training. His classes range from the first to the eighth grades. Now the Catholic and Lutheran have maintained this for many years and have long had church schools. However, from the beginning of this nation the state has been in charge of education and has set up machinery to collect money to finance it. There is not a chance in the world of this function being turned over to the different churches.

Labor Day is of rather recent origin. The first Labor Day observance took place in New York City on Sept. 5, 1882 when 30,000 workers paraded. Still it was not until 1894 that the legislature there adopted a resolution making it a holiday. Since then most legislatures have followed suit to us. Labor Day celebration will always bring up recollections of the Dexter Catholic picnic held on that day. These started back when the late Rev. John Ryan was pastor there and continued for about 40 years. They were discontinued at the time of World War II and will probably never be renewed. One of the features was a big base ball game invariably between Dexter and Pinckney of which Pinckney won their share 47 years ago. Pinckney playing under the name of Anderson, because of the presence of the 4 Roche boys: Mike, Billy, Andy and Malachi in the lineup was billed to meet Chelsea. Chelsea who had been walloped by Pinckney rather bad previously hired the Jackson state league team to replace them for \$100 it was claimed. Anderson lost. The Anderson lineup was Roll Monks and Tom Dolan, battery; Cass Culhane, 1b; Malachi Roche, 2nd; Gene Berry 3b; Andy Roche ss; Mike and Billy Roche and John McClear outfield. Of this team only Gene Berry, Cass Culhane and Billy Roche are still alive. This game drew one of the biggest crowds ever assembled in Dexter. This had an aftermath it being rumored that Dr. Will Gates, the umpire had a bet on Chelsea. This was proved false the better being his brother, Dr. Neil Gates, a Dexter physician. He and Pat Sloan, a Dexter merchant flipped as to who would get Anderson and the Dr. lost the flip. We saw that game and remember the Jackson team all trotted on the field wearing Chelsea Stove Work caps, but Jackson uniforms.

Jackson, Port Huron, South Haven, Muskegon and Grand Rapids have protested their designation as "Distressed Cities." This title was applied to them owing to the fact that the percentage of unemployed people in them was greater than in any other Michigan. They claim the designation will hurt business and start a buyers strike. They admit their high unemployment rate which they lay to wage increases and low production. The above title was applied to them by the U. S. Commerce Dept.

The Michigan legislature next month will start work on a bill to provide alcoholics with medical treatment instead of jail sentence. A five man committee will start hearings on such a bill in the state commission room in Cadillac, Mich. Detroit this week. Rep. Peter Kelly of Detroit chairman says it does no good to send alcoholics to jail and hospitalization is the proper remedy. Noted judges, doctors, educators, and labor rep have been invited to attend the hearing.

The veterans here are busy making out their insurance application dividends. A \$2,800,000 dividend is to be split up among United States veterans. Michigan veterans will get \$115,000. We are told that the maximum to be received is \$300 and the minimum 50c for those who only served 9 days. A number have been kept up their insurance policies well get the limit.
