Michigan Editor

People rely in news papers to information more than any other press concern. These other media Michigan govern. day to discuss state problems with reporters.

Gov. Mennen Williams recently discussed the grape growers' problem with reporters. No grape growers showed up. The growers demand a \$100 a ton the Welch Grape Juice Co., their principal customer offered but \$75. Mike Nelson of the Mich. Agric. Dept. said the crop was normal but not up to par and that Calif. grape growers were only getting \$25 a ton.

Clarence Bolander of the dept. said 26 percent of the grape crop was sold as fresh fruit 6 percent for jam and jelly and the remainder to grape juice companies.

Mich. apple crop this year will be 11 million bushel instead of the 4 million bushel produced in 1948. Mich. apple grower last year, and the 10 year average always preferred to sell their crop in bulk instead of in packages for this reason they have never commanded high prices. They qualify for a limited state aid by raising a matching fund by 1 cent contribution on every bushel sold. They will receive \$4000 this year to promote the apple program. They are now seeking a Fla. outlet where by trucks who haul citrus fruits here will haul Michigan apples back.

The state aid is used chiefly for advertising, inspection and marketing surplus groups.

The Lake Mich. shore is the best fruit belt in the state and is third in the nation in peaches and strawberries, and 4th in pears and apples. Traverse City is the cherry producing center and Romeo is famous for peach crops. 50,000 seasonal workers, many from Mexico worked in the fruit harvest in 1948.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The largest bow and arrow arrow in the history of Mich. will take field after Oct. 1. It is expected to number 12,000 or more. Last year there were more than 9,875 who shot 583 deer. Male deer may be taken in any county from Oct. 1 to Nov. 5. Deer of either sex in most northern counties.

Mich. has a black shale petroleum deposit covering 8000 sq. miles in northern Mich. but most of it is from 300 to 1000 ft. under ground. That of Colorado was mostly in the side of cliffs.

Biologists dispute the fact that the fox is responsible for the pheasant decrease. In Dakota an examination of 72 fox stomachs showed game birds to be but 4 percent of their diet. Mice are 47 percent, 23 rabbits, 14, vegetable insects 2 and non game birds one. Other examinations in Iowa and Mass. showed mice to be dominant diet.

Macomb county has a new law banning Sunday hunting.

The state bounty payments on coyotes & wolves jumped from \$2,270,000 in July to \$8,955,000 in August. There were 520 coyotes and 2 wolves taken. 2 forest fires burned 10.37 acres last week.

LEROY HEATH PASSES AWAY

Tragedy hit this section Tuesday morning in the tragic death of Leroy Heath at his home at St. Joe hospital. Ann Arbor, following a beating he received at Sportmen's Tavern, Hamburg Monday night. Mr. Heath was employed there as bartender. Monday night around 10 p. m. Jesse Campbell, John Brumley of Ann Arbor and a man named Geo. Bennett got in an argument over a game of shuffle board and started to fight. Heath tried to separate them and was badly beaten by Campbell and Brumley it is said. Heath suffered a heart attack and was taken to St. Joe hospital, Ann Arbor by Don Swarthout in the ambulance. Here he died several hours later without becoming conscious.

In the meantime Campbell and Brumley were arrested by Dep. Featherly and Zeigler and taken to Howell jail. On the way they broke the windows out of the car. Brumley claims to have no criminal record. Campbell admits one arrest in Ann Arbor.

The body was brought to Pinckney but later to Ann Arbor for autopsy by order of Coroner Ganzhorn. Campbell and Brumley are still held in jail.

Coroner Ganzhorn after the autopsy said he saw no fatal injuries and death was due to heart attack. The funeral is at St. Mary's church Friday 10 a. m.

Mr. Heath was formerly on the Detroit fire dept. but was retired on a pension due to a heart condition. He leaves his wife, 2 daughters, Anne, at home and Mrs. Robert Vedder, 5 sons Jerry and Mike at home, Charles of Lake land, Joe with the army in Germany and Hoy in the navy in California.

Circuit Court News

CLINE MURDER TRIAL

By last Friday all witnesses had testified in the Cline murder trial. Following the testimony of Mrs. Chevalier who said she had been threatened with being put in jail unless her husband testified against the Andrus brothers, Proe Erwin took the stand and denied her story, saying he had never made any such threats.

Mrs. Ed English, a sister in law, of Wm. English said Att. Stanley Berriman had visited her home and tried to have her influence. Wm. English to change his story so as to make it favorable to the Andrus Bros. saying if he did so he or Colombo would defend him free. Att. Berriman took the stand and denied this. He said he merely said that English should tell the truth and not let innocent men be convicted.

The Andrus boys had numerous character witnesses, including a Detroit policeman who said they had never been in trouble, and had excellent reputations. They were their own alibi witnesses. Wm. Andrus said he talked to Chevalier at the Cline store where the latter was working at repairs the day of the murder. That he took the Chevalier car because his was not working. Don Andrus said he came to Brighton the same day with English after his brothers car to repair it. That he was never in the Cline store and never saw Cline. That he went to Island Lake to pick up another car but did not remember the name of the man who owned it. The wives of the Andrus boys were also on the stand.

Maurice Chevalier had previously testified he had no criminal record. Recalled to stand, he admitted an arrest in Wis. a few years ago.

Sergt. Pearce of the state police also denied Chevalier's story of abuse to make him confess.

One of the high lights of the trials was the presence every day of Mrs. Wm. Andrus whose pregnancy is 2 weeks overdue.

Testimony was completed Friday and Monday was occupied by the pleas to the jury and summing up. Louis Colombo made a 2 hr. plea to the jury in which he said the only testimony the defense offered to prove its case was that of Wm. English a weak minded self confessed murderer.

The jury was still out at 3 p. m. today.

PIRATES LOSE TO ANN ARBOR RES. 20 TO 7

Pinckney lost to Ann Arbor high school reserves here Friday night 20 to 7 although they outplayed A. A. Res. on the field making 13 first downs to their 5. The game was a story of lost opportunities for Pinckney. They had numerous scoring chances but failed to cash in on them. Ann Arbor had 3 and made good on all them.

Pinckney kicked off to Ann Arbor who punted on the 3rd. Pinckney on line plays reached the 3 yd. line where they fumbled and Ann Arbor recovered. In the second quarter they reached the Ann Arbor 10 yd. line on a lateral-forward pass but lost the ball on downs.

In the 3rd quarter they elected to pass deep in their territory. Robbins the Ann Arbor colored boy intercepted and ran it to the Ann Arbor 20 where O'Hara went over for the first Ann Arbor score. Cartwright kicked goal. Pinckney quickly evened the score when J. Heath hit the line and went over. He also kicked goal.

Again Ann Arbor got a break when Pinckney fumbled and they recovered. O'Hara again scored and Cartwright converted for the extra point.

The last Ann Arbor score came in the last quarter when Adams intercepted a pass and ran 30 yds. for a touchdown. The conversion kick was blocked.

The Ann Arbor team was not as heavy as some they have sent up here. They tried few passes but circled the Pinckney ends and took advantage of Pinckney misques.

Pinckney's running game was off, Heath being the only consistent gainer. Too many Pinckney passes went into Ann Arbor hands. The Pinckney receivers being unable to judge them in most cases and letting them slip through their hands in other.

The Pinckney line played well and Ann Arbor never could have won on line plays alone. Several Pinckney linesmen were hurt but all but Enquist were able to continue.

Next Friday the biggest game on the season takes place here when Pinckney meets Brighton last years champions. Brighton was affected little by graduation last June and is a favorite to repeat. A huge crowd is expected at the game.

Current Comment

The old grand jury law gave up the ghost last week and we suppose legislators, city police and others who have been numerous among its victims heaved big sigh of relief. True another grand jury law was passed by the legislators after they murdered the old one but it is so unworkable as to be useless in place of 1 judge for a grand jury investigation there must be three.

No grand jury judge can promise a witness immunity for testifying. It was chiefly by promises of immunity that the old one man grand jury got convictions. Further no judge who presided over a grand jury or prosecutor who acts with one can seek other public office for 2 years. Gov. Sigler who was prosecutor on a grand jury and Judge Ferguson who conducted the Detroit grand jury both rose to the offices of governor and U. S. Senator on their grand jury fame. The legislators certainly did a thorough job of obliterating the old grand jury law.

Mrs. Julia St. Clair made the front page last week by pushing her 7 year old son all the way from Jacksonville, Fla. to Detroit in a wheelbarrow, a distance of 1500 miles. Such a feat was ordered off the streets of the police. The Book-Cadillac and Stater refused to admit her but she got in the tulle. There were many such stunts in the old days. The first we remember was shortly after the Spanish war when a man carrying a huge U. S. flag passed through Dexter. He was carrying it on foot from California to New York City. The next one that comes to our mind was an Austrian who was pushing his wife and son around the world in a wheel chair. He had started from Vienna Austria. He sold foreign language papers and pictures of his family.

In later years a chap came down the railroad track pushing a wheelbarrow with a small dog. He had to push it from N. Y. to San Francisco, earn \$100 and get married on the way. If he did so he won a \$50000 bet.

The government has started suit to break up the A. & P. chain store system as a monopoly. Now this system was started with one idea only as its key stone. This idea was mass buying. The idea was that by operating in a great many stores food could be bought in large quantities at much cheaper prices and therefore could be sold cheaper. The idea worked out and since then other chain stores have started up and even independent merchants have organizations to take advantage of mass buying to get cheaper goods. Henry Ford used the same principle in making a fortune in the automobile business to which he added mass production, reasoning the more cars he sold the cheaper he could sell them. The A. & P. was classed as a monopoly a number of years ago but only last weeks was the suit started to break them up.

Ex Coach Fred Crisler of Mich. like all successful retired men has written a book the theme of which is the purity of college athletes in which he comes out 100 percent against subsidization of college football players. It is well written, somewhat on the sermon order but leaves many questions unanswered. Crisler was hired away from Princeton by Mich. because U. of M. Alumni soured on Coach Kipke and he had had four losing seasons and also because they had a football stadium to pay for. He was a success from the start for one reason because Mich. landed the 3 Kick Institute stars. The most famous of these was Tom Hammond, the football glamour boy of America at that time. The boys had been stars on a Chicago high school team and every college in the nation was after them. Crisler might have told in his book how Michigan landed them. Hammond made the AP-American 3 years straight. Since Crisler came to Mich. the flow of star football players to Michigan has been steady and they have won their last 23 games.

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
